Restored Hope

April 18th 2021



Grizedale Forest in the Lake District has always been a favourite place for Ruth and me to walk and talk and generally put the world to rights. So, it's easy for me to identify with these two people walking from Jerusalem to Emmaus.

The story is an account of a walk where two people went from disappointment to renewed hope because they met Jesus. It's a journey towards faith in Christ. As we join this journey we can see some 'stepping stones' along the way that we can identify with.

1 They were searching for the truth about Jesus.

As they walked, they talked about all the things that had happened concerning Jesus. They were trying to work it all out, they were grappling with the events of the last few days: the betrayal, arrest, conviction, crucifixion, death and burial of their friend Jesus...and failing to make any sense of it: 'We had hoped...' (v21). Have we ever felt like this, lacking hope and trying to make sense of what God is doing?

2 Jesus explained the Scriptures to them.

Then a stranger joined them and asked them what they were talking about and, after they told him, the stranger began to explain to them what the Scriptures said about Jesus. This was not theological study, Jesus was speaking to their hearts as well as their minds and they remarked later, 'Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us...' (v 32). It is when we read the Bible and allow God to speak to us through what is written that we see Jesus more clearly.

3 They invited Jesus to stay.

They want to know more so they invite the stranger to stay and eat with them. Even though they did not know the true identity of Jesus they asked him to stay with them. We can never know all there is to know about Jesus because he is God, but we come to a point where in order to know more we have to invite him to stay with us.

4 Jesus is revealed (the penny drops).

The penny dropped for these two people when Jesus blessed the bread and broke it. Last week we saw the penny drop for Thomas when Jesus appeared and asked him to place his hands into the wounds in his hands and side. Thomas 's response was immediate and profound, he said 'My Lord and my God'.

My penny dropping moment came in an Evening Communion service in which I felt myself drawn to ask Jesus to come into my life; to stay with me. This penny dropping moment is difficult to describe: it's like the words of the hymn 'Amazing Grace': 'I once was lost but now I'm found, was blind but now I see.'

Within the hour these two people, re-energised and filled with fresh hope, were heading back to Jerusalem. What a difference for them as they retraced their steps to share with their friends their own extraordinary story of how Jesus had appeared to them.
