# **Last Month's Program** - What a great program we had at our March meeting from Suzan Paron, author of "Barn Quilts and the American Quilt Trail Movement"!

Suzi's wonderful presentation took us on our photographic journey that began in Ohio where the very first barn quilt trail started and led us throughout the rest of the country as the list of trails grew over the course of the past several years which has now spread into 47 states. During this journey, Suzi shared with us her pictures from the trails, the history behind the quilts and introduced us to the families of those she met along the way. Her presentation was so informative and touching that there has already been mention made by several of our members that they would like to place a quilt on their barn, their shop or seen quilt painted on other places in our local area. #### ATTENTION PLEASE! WE ARE LOOKING AT PLANNING A RETREAT FOR OCTOBER.....

At our Christmas party in December, a form was given out asking members what things they would be interested in participating in during 2014. One of the things we asked about was who was interested in attending a retreat. Of the forms turned in we had about 20 members that checked "yes" on attending a retreat. There were some members who weren't at the meeting and we have also had some new members join since the first of 2014.

We will address this again at the April meeting to see who is interested in a retreat in October. This would be a good stress relief after the quilt show in September. You need to be thinking seriously about if you would be interested.

We have looked at the Woodland Christian Camp and Retreat Center in Temple, Georgia. This retreat center is approximately 50 miles east of Oxford near the Carrollton/Villa Rica area. This is a great location for those who would like to come, but are unable to stay overnight. There are two areas that would best suit our quilting needs. These areas require a minimum of 16 or 25 persons depending on the facility. For us to reserve this facility, we would be required to pay a deposit and sign a contract. Woodland has a 3-month cancellation/change policy for Retreats.

We will discuss this more at our meeting!

#### 2014 Opportunity Quilt Update

Our opportunity quilt is in Becky's possession for quilting! Soon we will have it back and as soon as the binding and label is on, we will start selling tickets. Also, we will print cards again for those of you who would like to show what the quilt looks like when you are selling tickets as well as placing the photo on the website. Remember the more tickets we sell, the more we will bring in for our community service projects and quilt show costs! We will sell chances up to and during the quilt show. The drawing will be held at the end of the show.

If you have a quilting technique or a particular quilt pattern that you would like to share with the guild as one of our programs, please let Anita know! We would love to see it and after all, we are here to learn from each other!

Save left over binding from each quilt and join them together until you have enough to bind another quilt. This will enhance the scrappiness of a scrappy quilt!

Keep toe separators from your pedicures and use them to carry bobbins to workshops. The separators will also keep your bobbins from rewinding.



<u>QUILTER'S</u> TIPS **Community Service Update--** As all of you know, our primary community service project for this year will be accomplished at our quilt show. A display of baskets donated by vendors, local businesses, etc. will e displayed with tickets available to purchase for chances to win. You can even donate a basket and it doesn't have to be quilting related! Proceeds will go to charity. If you are interested in donating, please let Mary or Molly know.

If any of you make any of the drain covers that were shown at the January meeting you can bring them in and we will see at Molly gets them to the cancer center. The "Pretty Pockets" are for patients who go home with surgical drains. We decided at the January meeting that we would let this be a project for anyone who wanted to do this aside from the quilt show community service project. A copy of the patterns will be available at the meeting and on the website.

#### Lick Skillet Recipe Corner

#### Scalloped Asparagus

2-3 pounds of fresh asparagus, or 18 to 20 oz pkg frozen asparagus 6 Tbsp butter or margarine <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup soft bread crumbs <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup all-purpose flour <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tsp salt 1/8 tsp pepper, or to taste 2 cups milk <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tsp Worcestershire sauce <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> c grated mild Cheddar cheese 2 oz drained pimiento, <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup chopped

Wash asparagus, remove woody part of stalks and cut into 2-1/2-inch pieces. Cook in boiling salt water until just tender. Drain and place in a shallow baking dish or casserole. Melt butter in saucepan. Mix 2 Tbsp of the butter with the soft bread crumbs; set aside for topping casserole later. Blend flour, salt and pepper into remaining butter in saucepan. Continue cooking and stirring over low heat. Gradually add milk, stirring until thickened. Add Worcestershire sauce, pimiento and cheese; stir until cheese is melted. Pour sauce over asparagus in casserole dish; top with buttered crumbs. Bake at 350° for 20 minutes.

Other than quilting and sewing, Julie also enjoys reading, gardening, antique shopping and spending time with family. She has a pet peeve, which is people not picking up after themselves! When she was asked for one word to describe herself, Julie said, "survivor" and her best attribute, "adaptable". We couldn't have described her better ourselves.

**2014 UFO Challenge** We now have 13 members participating in the UFO challenge! If you are still interested in taking part for a chance to get some projects finished and a chance to win a prize at the end of the year, now is the time! We are already seeing some quilts, at show and tell, that are on UFO lists. If you plan to get quilt project you've had started for some time finished this year, why not take part in the challenge? What have you got to lose? Remember, your mystery quilt can be listed!

For those of you who are new members, the challenge goes like this – you fill out a form and turn it in with your unfinished projects that have been started and you would like to get completed. As you finish your projects, bring them in to show and tell and each one completed gets you a ticket for the drawing for a prize at the Christmas party! The more you finish, the more your chances to win. You aren't required to finish the projects you list; you are just inspired! The only requirement is that the project has to be started which means it has to be at a minimum already cut, not just bought! If you do not have a form, you can get one at the meeting or off the website in the Member Area.

What Do I Want My Quilt Label To Tell? Your quilt is finally finished. The last seam is pressed, your last stitch made and the last thread clipped. Now you can relax, right? Yes, only if the label is on! A label tells generations to come a story about your quilt—the Who, What, When, Where and Why. It is also identification in the event it gets lost or stolen and can even increase the appraised value.

If you are planning to enter it in a show, you should, at a minimum put your name, address and phone number on the label. If you want the quilt to go to a particular person, put their name on it with a nice inscription. Some suggestions are:

- 1. Why was the quilt made? What is the story behind the colors, blocks, etc.? Was any special event occurring at the time the quilt was made?
- 2. When and where was the quilt made?
- 3. What is the name of the pattern or what inspired your original design.
- 4. You may want to include care instructions.

When making your label, it can be --

- 1. A simple signature on the back or as elaborate as a two page story.
- 2. If you don't have time to make a fancy label, just sign and date the back of the quilt with an acid free pen.
- 3. Embroider your name and date on the front as part of the design.
- 4. Consider buying labels already made.
- 5. Make your own. They don't have to be muslin and don't even have to be square!
- 6. Use a leftover block or cut out shapes from the fabric used.
- 7. Put a photo on it!
- 8. Use a clipart source or create a graphic, but remember to mirror image the design! You can use a typewriter but remember to heat set the design when you are done.
- 9. Consider tucking leftover fabric or a block behind the label in case the quilt ever needs repairs.

The choice is yours on which method you want to use. Just don't skip this step in completing your quilt. After all, you want to preserve your place in history so that those in future generations will be able to tell your story to others!

**Quilt Show Update** -- We had a great turn out at our quilt show meeting on March 24<sup>th</sup>! Thanks to all who were able to come. We are making progress and things are really coming together. These are the major points from the meeting:

- We are asking you all to hold your Flea Market items until the morning of set up and to begin to package your items in plastic bags. Remember these items are not regular flea market things; they can only be quilting, sewing and other craft items, books and magazines that are in good shape. We do not have the room or the members to run a normal flea market with what-nots, household items, etc.
- We have our judge in place for the show and the ribbons have been started.
- Publicity is moving along and we are beginning to have inquiries about the show on our website. We ordered 5,000 postcards and they have arrived. Work is in progress to have 2,000 rack cards printed and placed in the eight (8) welcome centers coming into the state.
- A number of vendors have committed to have booths at the show. We have also had some of the vendors who are unable to attend offer to send door prizes for us to give away. Reminder: If you know of any that we may not have thought of, let Carolyn know and get in information to her.
- We have raised the number of quilts each member can enter to six (6) counting the challenge quilt. This doesn't include the vintage quilts. For our first show, we have waived the five (5) year limit on quilts that can be entered. (Don't forget that 200 quilt challenge made by Anita and Carolyn at the March meeting!)

We will continue to keep you informed as meetings occur and we encourage everyone to attend these meetings when you can! You may have an idea that the committee hasn't considered or thought of that could be very useful in the success of our show!

Also, PLEASE, turn in your list of quilts you plan to put in the show so that we will be able to get our layout drawn up! This has to be done long before the quilts are turned in!
