Eco-Artist, Grant Maniér

In Honor of Autism Awareness Month The Museum of Special Art (MOSA) celebrates the work of Artist Grant Maniér!

"Autism, Cancer, and Courage"

Eco-Artist, Grant Maniér, Fond du Lac, Wisconsin

At a very early age, Grant enjoyed art and the tearing of paper. Diagnosed with Autism by age 5, he displayed many characteristics of autism as social challenges, ritualistic behaviors in the lining up of toys, echolalia as the repetition of speech, and extreme anxiety, which many individuals with autism experience.

In his early years, Grant attended a private school that specialized in autism and then transitioned to public school by age 9. Oftentimes, the public school system is not a good fit for children with autism, which was the case for Grant. He struggled academically and was bullied, his anxieties increased, and he soon began to lose an interest in art. Because of these factors, his mother Julie Coy made the decision to homeschool Grant and it was in that environment where Grant began to excel. Adding art to the homeschool curriculum, Grant began to rediscover art and create paper collages to help himself cope with his anxieties. It was a form of art therapy for him. His mother Julie focused on Grant's strengths and abilities and created an academic home environment that provided him a platform of success!

The obsessive repetitious behavior of tearing paper was encouraged and seen as a positive behavior instead of viewed as a maladaptive behavior that needed to be extinguished. It was within this homeschool environment that Grant's art began to thrive, and he soon created his first eco-art masterpiece at age of 14 called "The Sun God" which sold for \$8400 in 2017. This piece is made up of 4000 pieces of recycled materials carefully placed and meticulously glued on canvas.

"COOLAGES!"

Each piece Grant creates is simply a masterpiece. The way in which Grant separates his recycled papers and materials and then analyzes them by color, value, tone, and intensity is incredible. He carefully studies these pieces, their textures, and logically affixes the pieces to the canvas in a manner that is simply none other than genius. Up close, you will see an array of colors but from afar, the pieces look more like paintings.

Grant's collages, he calls "coolages" because he uses cool colors, cool shapes, and cool

textures. The complexity seen in these assembled pieces are comprised of hours of work and extreme patience. As an eco-impressionistic artist, Grant uses a variety of recycled materials in his work as torn and cut papers, textured materials, recycled calendars, magazines, posters, puzzles, plastics, lids, metals and more. The puzzle pieces are quite intriguing as the puzzle pieces are also the recognized symbol of autism.

"After being quarantined twice and my art shows being canceled, I felt the COVID strain, like everyone else," says Grant. "Because I couldn't search for recycled materials due to the pandemic, I decided to add jewelry to my recycled art," says Grant. "I used over 5,000 pieces of recycled materials including wallpaper, specialty paper, contact lens cases, jewelry, and puzzles to create 'DIVOC Unleashed," says Grant. "I named him DIVOC because it spells COVID backward. Get it?" (Grant Maniér)

"My disability does not define me ... I define my disability!"

Grant is quite the success story. He is an award-winning artist, author, motivational speaker, philanthropist, environmentalist, and special needs advocate and his eco-art

masterpieces have raised over \$350,000 for great causes. Grant has been featured in several news articles, books, and television programs aired on networks as NBC, PBS, and ABC. He is the author of the award-winning book series called "GRANT the Jigsaw Giraffe and Friends" which shares positive stories of special needs topics, various diagnoses, and the unique abilities and talents of different abled animals portrayed in the stories.

Grant's message spreads "hope" to our community and to families who have children with autism. For Grant, autism is not a disability! He has definitely shined the light on the abilities and immense gifts of individuals with autism who are often misunderstood by our community. The compulsive behavior of ripping papers not only provided him peace and therapy but through the creation process itself emerged these amazing ecoimpressionistic pieces, which illuminates to the world the brilliance of an autistic creative mind.

Grant still lives with some of the behavioral challenges of autism and anxiety, but it does

not define him. He faces it all with such strength, dignity, and positivity. Currently, Grant is facing one of the greatest challenges of his life as he was recently diagnosed with Hodgkin Lymphoma Cancer. Now, he juggles two things in his life both autism and cancer. However, as the great warrior he is, Grant continues to be that beacon of light and a great mentor full of courage and inspiration for others in our community. Even though it seems like his career and dreams appear to be on pause, Grant says, "NEVER GIVE UP!"
