We here at the HMPS wish to extend our appreciation for their hard work, creative talent and positive attitude. It is truly a blessing to have such a delightful team showing their support.




#### Messick's Donates Lawn Trimmer

In the process of reorganizing, two boxes filled with teaching aids once belonging to Prof. Samuel S. Haldeman were discovered. These items varied from a large quantity of tree cuttings to fossils and petrified wood. It was especially exciting to find the professor's hand written labels still attached to several of the items. We are proud to announce the items are now on display for the first time in the parlor museum of the Haldeman Mansion.

Although looking much better, the parlor museum is still a temporary setup. In the future, when the mansion is in its completion, we can then work toward having professional museum display cases.


