## **Benazir Bhutto**

"Pursuing peace means rising above one's wants, needs, and emotions." Benazir Bhutto was a confident and smart woman; she attended many colleges such as Oxford University, Radcliffe College, and Harvard University. She inspired people all over the world with her confidence, bravery, and intelligence. She was the Prime Minister of Pakistan twice. Although she wasn't liked by everybody, she wanted to send a message to the world that feminism is important and, as Prime Minister, she started many projects for the improvement of Pakistan. Her early life, contributions to society, and achievements have really changed people and made her a powerful woman that many people look up to.

Benazir Bhutto was born on June 21, 1953 in Karachi, Pakistan. Her family followed the Muslim faith but she received her early education in a Catholic school. She received private Arabic lessons and learned nonreligious subjects. She was very interested in her father's work. Her parents were often away on trips related to her father's jobs in the Pakistani government. She pursued her college education in the United States. From 1969 to 1973, she attended Radcliffe College in Cambridge, Massachusetts. She went to study at Oxford University in the United Kingdom from 1973 to 1977. She studied philosophy, political science, and economics at Oxford University. In the United Kingdom she completed a course in International Law and Diplomacy. She graduated with a degree in comparative government. Her parents were Zulfikar Ali Bhutto and Nusrat Bhutto. She came from a very privileged family. She had three siblings Murtaza, Shahnawaz, and Sanam Bhutto. She had three children Bilawal, Bakhtawar, and Asifa Zardari.

She stood for women's education so women could have the ability to work. Her daughter's Bakhtawar and Asifa encourage girls to go to school in Pakistan. As the prime minister of Pakistan she set free political prisoners and worked towards providing fundamental human rights. She is the author of two books, *Foreign Policy in Perspective* and her autobiography called *Daughter of the East*. Her legacy includes The Benazir Income Support Program which assisted women in Pakistan with financial help. She became a leader in exile of the PPP (Pakistani People's Party) which was her father's party. She had made it clear to people who were with her in a struggle for restoration of democracy that Pakistan could be saved by maximum autonomy to the provinces because the country had been problematic. She was assassinated on December 27, 2007. Benazir was addressing a rally and she had appeared on the sunroof to wave to the crowd and was shot in the head. Her death was declared at Rawalpindi General Hospital. Her untimely death has created a vacuum in not only her party but also in Pakistani politics. She was sometimes controversial, but she remains an inspiring figure to those who see a role for women in civil society in democratic Pakistan and in other societies around the world.

#### Sir Allama Mohammad Iqbal: the architect of Pakistan

Dr. Mohammad Iqbal (1877-1934) was not just a poet, but also a Muslim thinker, philosopher, and a scholar of Arabic, Farsi, Urdu and English. He was born in Sialkot (now in Pakistan) and is buried in Lahore. He was a descendent of a Kashmiri Brahmin family. His father, a Sufi Muslim, told him "Son! When you read Quran assume it has been revealed on to you and God is talking to you directly. Only then you will get its message." This advice changed Iqbal's understanding of the Quran. He was educated in a missionary school, then at the Government College in Lahore where he studied law. He was admitted to bar at law in London, and did his PhD in philosophy in Munich, Germany. There is a chair named after him at the University of Heidelberg. His dorm room now has been converted into a museum. He was knighted in 1922 by the British Queen. He went to Europe to study philosophy and came back to the colonial India transformed as a committed Muslim thinker, poet, and philosopher. He challenged Indian Muslims to rise up to their potentials as a Muslim Ummah. He was not only influenced by many European philosophers including Sir Thomas Arnold but also by many Muslim thinkers including al-Ghazali, Jalaluddin al-Rumi, Jamal al-Din al-Afghani and Shibili Nomani. Iqbal is claimed as an inspirational figure in India, Pakistan, and Iran. Allama Iqbal is also called al-Rumi al-Thani or the second Rumi. He said of himself "Brahmin zadeh rimaz ashnaye Rum Tabriz ast" meaning the son of a Brahmin is well versed in the knowledge of Rumi and Shams in the secrets of life.

In 1986, the first International conference on Iqbal was held in Tehran, Iran and addressed by Ayatollah Ali Khamieni who said of Iqbal, "The greatest advice of Iqbal to humanity is: have a heart like Jesus, thought like Socrates, and a hand like the hand of Caesar. He went to Europe and became a philosopher but he did not surrender to the West; rather he conquered the West." In 1930 he became president of the All India Muslim League which under the leadership of Mohammad Ali Jinnah led to the birth of Pakistan in 1947.

## **Book Reviews**

## Between The World and ME, By Ta-Nehisi Coates

The business and pleasure of reading books tends to be intensely personal. For that reason joining a book club can be a proposition of dubious merit. What makes it worthwhile is the company of intelligent people and, let's face it, amazing snacks. We have met for the last couple of years on a quarterly basis to discuss what we have read. One valuable take-away, now more important than ever, is to learn about different points of view, and not just tolerate them but use them to educate your own opinion and worldview.

Our last book was "Between the World and Me" by Ta-Nehisi Coates. It was an attempt on our part to read something that speaks to the recent history and cultural struggles that define contemporary America. Mr. Coates is a well-known (some might say, notorious) figure in the arena of cultural commentary. He is a longtime contributor to The Atlantic. The book takes the form of a letter to his adolescent son. As a literary device it works well and conveys the raw emotional punch of an African-American father sharing his indescribable anxiety and fears with his young son who will find his place in an America where post racial utopia now seems as distant as it once seemed at hand in 2008, where the police are seen as predators by young black men, and where one misinterpreted physical gesture or angry outburst can be your last. The book is a long letter from a father who recounts his own coming of age to his son, and wants him to know that ultimately his father can only do so much to protect him in a world that is wary of black men. This is the part that will make real the struggles of people whose lives may seem very distant to the "dreamers" living in complacent suburbia. Where the book has garnered much praise for its articulation of the existential nightmares of survival and stigma of secondhand citizenship in African-American communities, it has also come under criticism for sloppy analysis and over generalisations of issues and their purported solutions. While I leave it to the reader to decide the balance of praise and criticism, my opinion is that the book was not meant to be a sociological analysis; instead it follows a long tradition of African-American intellectuals who have looked at the wider society and have felt as outsiders. It is a book about belonging with strings attached.

It is a book that provides an illuminating insight into a vibrant intellectual culture that too often is only viewed through the lens of popular entertainment and sports. It held a special appeal for me as part of a group that also strives to be part of the melting pot but finds that there are obstacles to navigate. I will end with the words of the doyen of American prose, Toni Morrison: "This is required reading."

Prof. Syed likes books, sometimes more than people and is aware that this is not a good thing. He is a founding member of Azad Book

## Forty Rules of Love, by Elif Shafak

A novel within a novel, The Forty Rules of Love tells two parallel stories that mirror each other across two very different cultures and seven intervening centuries.

Forty-year-old Ella Rubenstein is an ordinary unhappy housewife with three children and an unfaithful husband, but her life begins to change dramatically when she takes a job as a reader for a literary agency. Her first assignment is a novel intriguingly titled Sweet Blasphemy, about the thirteenth-century poet Rumi and his beloved Sufi teacher Shams of Tabriz. The author is an unknown first-time novelist, Aziz Zahara, who lives in Turkey. Initially reluctant to take on a book about a time and place so different from her own, Ella soon finds herself captivated both by the novel and the man who wrote it, with whom she begins an e-mail flirtation. As she reads, she begins to question the many ways she has settled for a conventional life devoid of passion and real love.

At the center of the novel that Ella is reading is the remarkable, wandering, whirling dervish Shams of Tabriz, a mystic provocateur who challenges conventional wisdom and social and religious prejudice wherever he encounters it. He is searching for the spiritual companion he is destined to teach. His soul's purpose is to transform his student, Rumi—a beloved but rather complacent, non-mystical preacher—into one of the world's great poets, the "voice of love." Rumi is a willing student, but his family and community resent Shams deeply for upsetting their settled way of life. Rumi is admired, even revered in his community and Shams must lead him beyond the comforts of his respectable way of life, beyond the shallow satisfactions of the ego.

In essence, both Rumi and Ella, through their relationships with Shams and Aziz, are forced to question and then abandon the apparent safety and security of their lives for the uncertainty, ecstasy, and heartbreak of love. Neither Shams nor Aziz can offer anything like a promise of lasting happiness. What they can offer is a taste of mystical union, divine love, the deep harmony that arises when the false self—constructed to meet society's demands for respectability—is shed and the true self emerges.

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Along the way, Shams imparts the forty rules of love, essential Sufi wisdom that Shams both preaches and embodies. He repeatedly defies social and religious conventions, putting himself in danger and drawing down the scorn and wrath of the self-righteous, literal-minded moralists who surround him. He inspires Rumi to become the poet he was meant to be, one of the world's most passionate and profound voices of wisdom. Similarly, Aziz—and his story of Rumi and Shams—inspires Ella to step out of a marriage that has become emotionally and spiritually stifling for her.

It is not an easy story that Elif Shafak tells, nor an entirely happy one. There are costs, she seems to say, to living an authentic life. But, as the novel shows, the costs of not living one are far greater.

About the Author: Elif Shafak was born in Strasbourg, France, in 1971. She is an award-winning novelist and the most widely read female writer in Turkey. Critics have hailed her as one of the most distinctive voices in contemporary literature in both Turkish and English. She is also the author of the novel The Bastard of Istanbul and her memoir, Black Milk. Her books have been translated into more than thirty languages. Married with two children, Elif divides her time between London and Istanbul.

# Urdu Corner

There was a request from a fellow Program Director for some poetry related to Ramadan and/or Eid for this newsletter. Religious festivals have long held a special place in the cultures of South Asia and so are often evoked in Urdu poetry, be they Ramadan, Eid or even Holi and Diwali. The readers will undoubtedly have their favorite poetry on Ramadan and Eid al-Fitr, possibly from very well-known poets too. However, I found the following quatrain to be most apt for two reasons.

First, it introduces the readers to satirical/humorous poetry, an art-form that has always had a very strong following. Satire and comedy play an important role in South Asian literature and have deep roots in the Islamic Arabo-Persianate world (Who says Muslims can't have fun or even poke fun at themselves?). One amazing element of humorous poetry is that it sticks closely to all the principles of Urdu poetry (and is often delivered in poetry recitals with all the etiquettes and gestures appropriate for non-humorous poetry). The following quatrain from Athar Shah Khan "Jedi" follows all the rules of a standard ghazal, and is in fact in the same meter as the famous naqsh faryaadii, the first ghazal of *Divan-e-Ghalib*.

Second, the quatrain refers to a long tradition associated with Ramadan and Eid al-Fitr, the sighting of the new moon--a festive occasion in which entire neighborhoods participate, often by ascending to the roofs and balconies of their homes and apartments. Of course, the intentions are not always innocent. I shall let the quatrain explain.

پکوڑے مختلف شکلوں کے بنانے جاتے ہیں سب سے مشہور شکل کوئی شکل نہیں ہےگول چکور لمبے نیز ہر قسم کے پکوڑے یکساں مقبول <u>و مشہور</u> ہیں پکوڑوں کو مختلف چٹنیوں کے ساتھ کھانا ثابت ہے لیکن عصر جدید میں کیچپ وغیرہ کا استعمال بھی سامنے آیا ہے۔
