

# **Important Points about the Book:**

- II Samuel covers the reign of King David. He was truly the first "good king" of Israel, and there were relatively few. When kings were listed, it was said they "did that which was {right or evil} in the sight of the Lord".
- Chapters 1-10 show David as an excellent warrior and leader who is compassionate to the sick and poor.
- Chapters 11-24, we see David facing tests of his leadership as well as trials in his own family. Some the cause of his own doing - such as his sin with Uriah and Bathsheeba. Others were dealing with multiple sons with different personalities and ways of doing things.

# 2 SAMUEL 19

II Samuel is devoted to the historical record of the monarchy of David over the nation of Israel. The entire book is devoted to him. The book records David's rise to power, his capture and establishment of Jerusalem to the capital of Israel, his desire and preparation to build the temple, the Davidic covenant (God's covenant with the house of David) and its picture of the future reign of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the sorrows in a royal family. **II Samuel 7:12-17**
