PREPARING FOR EASTER 2022

The Lord cares for the way of the righteous. So we are told in Psalm 1 which talks about the straightforward choices between good and evil, between salvation and destruction, between life and death. Judged by this choice, our faith must be a simple faith, as we affirm in the acclamation we make each time we rehearse the Eucharistic Prayer of Thanksgiving - Christ has died; Christ is risen; Christ will come again. What else do we need? What else can we say? In the Psalm, the Blessed Man is like a tree, firm and thriving, living out God's purpose and intention, whereas the wicked man (of v.4-5) is the opposite - like the husk off the grain that blow away, no substance and no nutrition. The final verses of the Psalm promise God's watchfulness over the righteous, whilst the wicked are left to perish. There is an easy choice - we look to the Lord: delight in his learning, serve him wholeheartedly and find His blessing.

We are reassured in the Easter joy that our loving Lord Jesus Christ willingly takes on His shoulders the wrath and anger of God (that should fall on us) and He bears it all on the cross in order that we may turn to Him and live. There is a simple and straightforward choice for us - but often manipulated by the world if we fail to be vigilant in our journey. We do not need to listen to the world or live to the world's expectations - we can find strength and success in choosing the path with God towards salvation. This is the life Jesus led - not rich in the world, but rich in the spirit.

Just as I am, without one plea but that your blood was shed for me, and that you would my Saviour be, O Lamb of God, I come.

A meditative hymn of our Anglican hymnody (Together In Song 584) is a wonderful resource:

Just as I am - I need nothing else but my focus on Jesus. This is riches, health, well-being.

Can you, in company with the writer of this hymn, state your faith so simply:

Just as I am. O Lamb of God. I come?

TENEBRAE

This service during Holy Week commemorates the suffering and death of Christ and is most usually based on readings of the Passion of Jesus, using music and candles to create a sombre atmosphere, complete with darkness in which the Lord is hidden from view. Candles are extinguished after each of the readings, leaving just the Christ candle alight a stark visual reminder that our Lord was slowly but surely left alone in the darkness of a



world fraught by sin. At the completion of the service the Christ candle is "hidden", signifying the burial of Jesus in the tomb. At the signal of a loud noise (signifying an earthquake), it is finally extinguished. The worshippers leave the space in silence and with no blessing.

CONFIRMATION

It is good to report that planning is underway in the Parish to conduct a service of Confirmation in May 2022. An invitation has been issued to our Diocesan Bishop, the Right Rev Mark Short, to join



us to administer this sacrament. Given the disruptions of the last couple of years, it is some time since we enjoyed hosting a visit from our Bishop and we look forward to this opportunity to share time with him. Candidates for Confirmation (adolescent and adult) will undertake a course of preparation prior to the service, searching various issues of faith and understanding and encouraging them in their growing relationship with Jesus. MARK'S REMARKS

<u>A summary of Rev Mark's words to the Annual General meeting on Sunday 6 March</u> 2022:

Our Church is at a crossroads where the direction we take over the next couple of years has enormous potential to affect the future of All Saints' Parish.

The choice? We can look either to the past or to the future. There is "security" in the past, familiarity, but also stagnation. Inevitably this leads to "death", closing the doors



What is the future we seek? My vision includes worship that recognizes and includes our excellent Anglican traditions as enshrined in the prayer book; a church that is growing and bursting with children and young people and celebrating the diversity of the wider church; teenagers meeting in a youth group; pastoral care at our aged-care facilities; community outreach through various mission activities. I also see our church as a support and resource for all the Christian churches of the Snowy Valley, Anglican and others, maybe even having an office staffed full-time to provide that support.

How do we get there from here? There is no silver bullet solution. As we ponder, remember that the Bible is very clear that it is God who grows His church. - we may water and plant but we need to come before our Father and ask Him to do the growing. It is our job to be God's people in the world. My dream is in Acts 2:42: "[The early church] devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer." What will this look like for us? It will not happen in an hour of two of worship each week.

My dream is that everyone in our church will be meeting together in diverse groups, of different sizes, for a variety of reasons, sharing their lives and growing in God. This includes much of what we are already doing - Lunch with Friends, Bible studies, Friday meditations, community outreach and our new Caring Groups designed and facilitated by Rev Liz.

But it's more than just these. I would love to see, each week, the vast majority of us meeting together in small groups to learn from God's word, gathering with another 2 or 3 to pray, sharing our lives in fellowship over a meal or a cup of tea, then all of us meeting together on Sundays as a great expression of our unity as Children of God washed clean in the blood of Christ.



Is this a lot? Yes, it is. It's probably going to mean there are things we will need to stop doing, even good things, in order to start doing better things. This is what it means to be "Devoted ...to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer." It is what God has called us, as His church, to be. It is what it means to be God's people.

ALL SAINTS' CARING GROUPS

All Saints' Caring Groups have been established in an attempt to ensure that everyone in the Parish is connected with a group that cares about their wellbeing. We would like to aim for all parishioners feeling as if they belong and that someone cares. The groups are to be facilitated by a person already selected and in agreement, who will co-ordinate the gathering of the group and endeavour to select activities and meeting places that are suitable for that group. No-one has to report back to the Parish Council. If needs arise and the facilitator feels it is necessary to pass on information (with the personal approval of the person concerned) to the Rector or myself, as Pastoral Care Co-ordinator, then that is appropriate.

These groups are just a suggestion, you are not obligated to attend. However I suspect you may find them helpful and enjoyable. So give them a try.

Your facilitator will be in touch with you soon, if not already.

SHEPHERDING is CARING for OTHERS

Jesus said, "I am the Good Shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep." Jn 10:14

There are many biblical texts naming Jesus as the Good Shepherd. He is the guiding hand that loves us, protects us and cares for us always. The shepherds in Jesus' time (and still today in Israel) had small flocks. They moved their sheep about the land seeking the best feed and water they could find. They knew all their flock individually and were protective of them.

In Jeremiah 3:15 the Lord says to Jeremiah regarding the Hebrew people, "I will appoint you shepherds after my own heart, who will shepherd you wisely." The Lord knows the people need love, direction, care and compassion and signals the gifting of some to especially care for others.

There are many caring roles still today where some are called to "shepherd" others. Parents, and often grandparents, need to love and protect those in their care, guiding them on the right track, helping them to make good choices in life. Teachers, doctors, clergy, counsellors, employers all have shepherding roles in caring for those in their charge, or who come to them for help.

I think that often during our lives we are called to shepherd others. It may be for just a few minutes, or it may be a life-long caring role. All we need will be provided by God as He calls, then enables us, to carry out His work. We may be gifted with kindness, mercy, compassion, understanding, tolerance, patience or wisdom - whatever is needed for the task. Jesus is our primary role model in caring sensitively and effectively.

Psalm 23, a much loved psalm, speaks of the Lord shepherding his people through life's challenges. Here is a contemporary version of that Psalm:

The Lord is my constant companion. There is no need that He cannot fulfil. Whether His course for me points to the mountain tops of ecstasy or to the valleys of human suffering He is by my side. He is ever present with me. He is close beside me when I tread the dark streets of danger.

And even when I flirt with death itself He will not leave me. When the pain is severe, He is near to comfort. When the burden is heavy, He is there to lean upon. When depression darkens my soul, He touches me with eternal joy. When I feel empty and alone, He fills the vacuum with His power. My security is in His promise

to be near me always,

and in the knowledge that He will never let me go.

LENTEN SYMBOLS and PRACTICES

Imposition of ashes

This happens during the liturgy on Ash Wednesday. Palm crosses from the previous year are burnt and the ashes used to make the sign of the cross on each penitent's forehead, symbolising the beginning of the Lenten journey of repentance and self-denial.

Palm crosses

These remind us of the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem and are distributed to worshippers on Palm Sunday, marking the beginning of the Holy Week journey to the cross.

Maundy Thursday

Silence follows the liturgy on Thursday evening in Holy Week and in thatsilence the Sanctuary is stripped of all furniture and decoration, reminding us of the stripping of all dignity and humanity from our Lord prior to His crucifixion. The Sanctuary Lamp is extinguished.

A SEASONAL MEDITATION

The Feet of Jesus

Small and perfect and bare the feet, play in the dust of the village street; paddle and splash in the tingling chill of the springing stream at the foot of the hill. Feet of a child that shall journey far to the hammer and nails of Golgotha.

Brown and sandalled and hard the feet, walk where the wind and waters meet, wrapped in the surf of the restless wave, swift and certain and strong to save. Feet of a man who is travelling far to the hammers and nails of Golgotha.

Tired and bleeding and torn the feet, came to a halt with their work complete; for a moment firm on the hilltop stood and were laid at last on a cross of wood. The feet of God which have travelled far to the hammer and nails of Golgotha. This poem was created by Bishop (ret'd in 2019) Timothy Dudley-Smith (b.1926) who is a prolific hymn writer of our time. In 2003 he was awarded an Order of the British Empire "for services to hymnody" and his work appears in published hymnals throughout the English-speaking world and in translation.

Well might we meditate on the challenge from one of our wellknown hymns: "Were you there when they crucified my Lord?" (*Together in Song* 345)

MOTHERING SUNDAY 2022

On Sunday 27 March (Fourth Sunday in Lent) All Saints' commemorated "Mothering Sunday", reflecting a tradition maintained since the sixteenth century of families gathering for worship at their "Mother Church", either the nearest important church or cathedral, or the church in which they were baptised. Many folk were given the day off enabling them to reunite with family for the occasion. As time went on, servants and apprentices were still given the day off, but instead of specifically going to their "Mother Church", they spent time with their families and, indeed, their mothers (often resident in the place of their baptism anyway).



Associated with this "festival" is the Simnel Cake, a rich fruit cake made with dried fruit and marzipan, blessed and shared on this one day in the middle of lent as a festive respite from the 40-day Lenten fast. It was traditionally decorated with eleven marzipan balls representing the eleven disciples of Christ (excluding Judas). Given that the festival fell towards the end of winter, the cake was created from what was available the dried fruits and flour of the previous year's harvest.

All Saints' celebrated National Christian Heritage Sunday with costume, music, reflection and much fun on Sunday 6 February 2022. We reflected on the situation

of the First Fleet passengers as they experienced a new land and on the responsibilities of Chaplain Richard Johnson as he encouraged the convicts, the troops and the free passengers to understand their experience and their environment through the lens of their established faith. Rev Mark's sermon for the day was based on the same text as was used by Chaplain Richard at the first service at Sydney Cove in the new colony (from Ps 116) on 3 February 1778.





The following is an excerpt from a history referring to the occasion:

"The sense of relief and gratitude at having finally landed in an area that at least looked comparatively promising would thus have given the Chaplain the opportunity to speak to the

situation of both convicts and soldiers in a meaningful way and this would account for the manner in which the congregation responded. The service was well received. Tench wrote that the behaviour of both the troops and convicts was 'equally regular and attentive'."

(From Neil K. Macintosh: Richard Johnson Chaplain to the Colony of New South Wales p 49 Library of Australian History Published 1978)

In the church a most wonderful display of Australian vegetation set the scene for Sydney Cove and banners representing each of the ships of the First Fleet, carried by the younger members of the congregation, were deposited at Sydney Cove for the duration of the service. It was a joy to have the children lead the intercessions on the day.

Thanks to all those who contributed to the success of the commemoration - Lorraine Wysman, Rev Mark, Bonnie Carroll, the children, musician Kate Stuart, the music group and all who created appropriate costumes.



NEW FLOWER STANDS

The Parish thanks parishioner, David Wren, a member of the Tumut Mens' Shed, for the crafting of new flower stands now in the church. There are two to stand at the chancel steps (as at left), one in memory of Kathleen Johnston and one in memory of the Wren family. A third is in the West porch (right), donated by the Mens' Shed. They are beautifully crafted and very much sturdier than those which had been in use until these were received. The stands were placed in the church on Heritage Sunday and blessed and dedicated by Rev Harvey Sloane on Mothering Sunday, 27 March 2022. Various timbers were used in the crafting, - poignantly, in the feet of the pair of taller stands, some rescued sugar pine from the Laurel Hill sugar pines burned in the 2019/2020 firestorm.

SYMBOLS IN OUR CHURCH

There are so many examples in our worship and our church environment where symbols are used to direct us, to focus us, to explain for us, to represent ideas, to challenge us, to signify parts of our journey through the liturgical year, and many, many more. In this and future *Spire* issues some of these symbols will be examined.

If there is a symbol which you would like examined, please let the Editor know.



<u>The Alpha and Omega</u> - a Christian visual symbol representing Jesus and the Father as the First and the Last, the beginning and the end - they are the first and **second second**.

Instand the Last, the beginning and the end - they are the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet and appear in many Christian contexts. We meet the expression first in the Book of Revelation (written in Greek), where they are used to denote Christ and God (Revelation 1:8), reflecting the words in Isaiah 44:6, "I am the first and I am the last; beside me there is no God." In All Saints we see this symbol on the altar front, on priests vestments and in some windows.





<u>The Paschal Candle</u>. A new, large, white candle is lit every year early on Easter Day at the ceremony of the Lighting of the New Fire, the candle representing thenceforth the resurrected Christ as the Light of the World who overcame death and darkness. The candle is a steadfast presence, its flickering flame of light and warmth illuminating our shadowed world, and it is used in worship services in the Easter season (until Pentecost) and thereafter throughout the year at baptisms and funerals. At baptisms, another candle is lit from this flame and the small candle given to the newly baptised with the words: "Shine as a light in the world to the glory of God the Father." Various symbols can be used on the candle: the Alpha and Omega (as above) the Cross (often with nails), the "Chi Rho" (see below) and the year.



<u>The Chi Rho</u>. This is one of the earliest forms of Christogram (a sign to represent Christ), using the first two letters (XP) of the Greek word Christos, superimposed upon one another. It was emblazoned on the military standard, coins and medallions of Constantine the Great and widely accepted in later Roman life with the general recognition and acceptance of Christianity. It is now used on vestments, church furniture and other items.



<u>IHS</u>. This Christogram has been used since mediaeval times, representing the first letters of Jesus in the Greek alphabet (iota-eta-sigma). In modern times a useful back-acronym has been applied to it: *In His Service*. The symbol appears on the alms dish used at the altar in All Saints' to receive our offertory during services and on the baptismal font.



<u>Sanctuary lamp</u>. This is used in churches as a perpetual light, indicating the presence of the Reserved Sacrament and/or God's eternal presence. It is only ever extinguished on Good Friday and is always relit on Easter Day. It reflects the Menorah from the Temple in Jerusalem and the continuously burning fire on the altar of burnt offerings in front of the Temple.



<u>Altar candles</u>. The minimum number of candles on the altar is two - representing Jesus as human being and God, one called the Epistle candle (right hand side - south) and the other the Gospel candle (left hand side - north - in early Christianity the heathen to whom the Gospel was to be carried were mostly in countries to the north). The candles are lit from right to left and extinguished in reverse order - so that the Gospel candle never burns alone. A third candle is added to these when the Bishop visits and shares in worship.



<u>The Eagle</u>. The eagle appears as a representation of faith and energy in Isaiah 40:31. It flies highest in the sky (closest to heaven!), is believed to be able to stare into the sun (as a Christian can gaze at the revelation of the divine word) and capable of carrying the Word of God to all four corners of the world. It has been used from mediaeval times as a lectern to carry what is traditionally a book too heavy to be held by hand. In Christian iconography it also represents St John the Apostle whose writing is said to most clearly witness the light and divinity of Christ. His Gospel is the one most occupied with Jesus' divinity, thus represented by the eagle. The lectern in All Saints' is remarkable because it is carved in one piece from wood from the prow of a ship.
