Pope Francis proclaims "Year of St Joseph"

With the Apostolic Letter "Patris corde" ("With a Father's Heart"), Pope Francis recalls the 150th anniversary of the declaration of Saint Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church. To mark the occasion, the Holy Father has proclaimed a "Year of Saint Joseph" from today, 8 December 2020, to 8 December 2021.


In a new Apostolic Letter entitled **Patris corde** ("With a Father's Heart"), Pope Francis describes Saint Joseph as a beloved father, a tender and loving father, an obedient father, an accepting father; a father who is creatively courageous, a working father, a father in the shadows.

The Letter marks the 150th anniversary of Blessed Pope Pius IX's declaration of St Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church. To celebrate the anniversary, Pope Francis has proclaimed a special "Year of St Joseph," beginning on the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception 2020 and extending to the same feast in 2021.

At the conclusion of his Letter, he adds another prayer to St Joseph, which he encourages all of us to pray together:

***Hail, Guardian of the Redeemer,
Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary.
To you God entrusted his only Son;
in you Mary placed her trust;
with you Christ became man.***

***Blessed Joseph, to us too,
show yourself a father
and guide us in the path of life.
Obtain for us grace, mercy, and courage,
and defend us from every evil. Amen.***

The Baptism of the Lord (B)

His Father's Joy

In the space of a fortnight, the liturgy takes us from the Birth of Our Lord, to the feast of his Baptism and the Magi's visit. These feasts highlight the history of God's Son who came into our world. It is the mystery of the Incarnation, the mystery of Christmas. When Jesus is baptized by St. John, it will be like Christmas again. The Child, born in a manger, has grown up to be the young adult, and the choir of angels heard at Christmas is silent so that the Father's voice can be heard.



St. Mark's Gospel provides us with a brief account: *In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan* (Mark 1:9). The conciseness of St. Mark's words reflects Jesus' decision to be baptized. Yet the Evangelist has taken care to record the meaningful words concerning the One who has come and whose mission will be to gather disciples who will eventually receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. Though St. John the Baptist's words may have left us somewhat in the dark, the Father's declaration sheds light on Jesus' identity and mission. What message should we retain from the double event of Jesus' Baptism and the Father's words?

First of all, Jesus did not need St. John's baptism of conversion. Christ wanted to express his solidarity with the men and women who had come to be baptized, who wanted to experience a conversion, a reversal in their lives, all in the hope of welcoming God's Messenger. Christ, the Greatest of all as announced by St. John, is also the humblest.

Then we read the Father's words which reveal the filial relationship which unites them: *You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased* (Mark 1:11). God reveals himself not as a solitary divinity but as a being of relationships: God the Father communicates and reveals to us the fullness of his love which is found in the person of Jesus Christ, the Beloved. God expresses his joy with the gift of his Son, who will reach out to the hearts of men and women who are searching for a meaningful and better life.

This double manifestation is the origin of the authority that we recognize in Jesus who never taught like other prophets. Jesus' authority comes from two sources: his filial communion with the Father and his solidarity with the men and women with whom he is close and in communion with their joys and sorrows. We are again immersed in the mystery of Christmas!

Throughout the year ahead, the Sunday liturgies will enable us to follow Jesus on the roads of Galilee by listening to and reading the words of St. Mark the Evangelist. From one Sunday to another, we will find reflections which will enable us to learn how to live in faith with the Father's Beloved Son and find our own joy.
