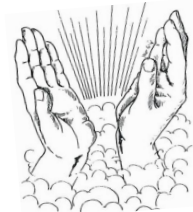

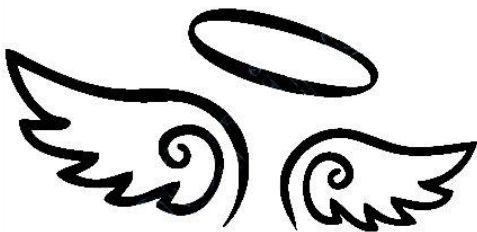
Greetings favored Congregation! The Lord is with you...

This month I feel the highest gratitude for all of you and for the greater community of Christians all around this part of the Kingdom of God. As you know I had a health scare at the end of August and beginning of September. It all started with a sinus infection that my doctor treated with antibiotics. As the sinuses cleared up my chest began to hurt and every time I took a deep breath I had pain in my chest. I didn't believe it was a heart attack, but then I've never had a heart attack before, so what do I know. I tried to get an appointment with my primary care doctor, but as soon as I mentioned chest pain they directed me to the Emergency Department. As it turned out I did not have a heart attack, but rather something called pericarditis. This is an inflammation of the sack that encloses the heart. I spent three days in the hospital, but now recovering nicely.

I'm telling you all this medical history because I'm so blessed to serve with you here at Trinity and in the greater Darke County ministry. During the time when I wasn't sure what the problem was, I felt the power of your prayers. I heard from so many people both from Trinity and from other Christian friends around the county who were praying for me. I'm not sure how most of them even knew I was ill. I know people aren't the same as Angels from heaven, but that doesn't mean we don't act like angels. An Angel is a messenger from God and that is exactly how you all acted toward me when I was ill. The Angel Gabriel came to Mary and reminded her, or maybe told her for the first time, that she was favored by God. You all remind me of that fact every day. When I'm tempted to start feeling sorry for myself, God sends one of you, maybe unknowingly, with a message to remind me that I am His precious child. Thank you for being willing servants of our great and merciful God.



The second thing Gabriel told Mary was the Lord was with her. Sometimes my ego thinks I can do this ministry on my own. Every once in a while, God reminds me I can do nothing without Him. This past month was one of those experiences. When I was hospitalized, I quickly realized I would not be able to lead worship that Sunday. It was August 25th and one of the biggest Sundays of our Church year, Rally Sunday. I had been looking forward to seeing all the children back from vacations and seeing what they learned and what they could remember from Vacation Bible School. In my mind, I had to be there to lead this important worship service... And God laughed... Thanks to Dean Thompson and everyone else who stepped in to make Rally Day happen this year, without me. You are all like Angels reminding me that God is always walking with us ready to pick up where we cannot.



I believe in actual, literal Angels, but I also believe you, who were created a little lower than the Angels, can have very angelic moments. It's both exhilarating and humbling to be the recipient of angelic intervention. I thank God for you all who are constant reminders, not just for me, but for all this broken and hurting world, that we are all favored children of our Heavenly Father and that God is always right there beside us in the good, the bad and in all the times of our lives. I am forever grateful for your thoughts and prayers and for your many good works that you do serving God and our neighbors. I'm most grateful that God allows me

the joy of serving along side each and every one of you, seeking, welcoming, and serving all. Amen.

2019 Churchwide Assembly Actions

Gathering under the theme “We are church,” voting members of the 2019 Churchwide Assembly of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) made a number of key decisions to further the mission and ministry of this church. The assembly, the chief legislative authority of the church, met Aug. 5-10 at the Wisconsin Center in Milwaukee.

More than 900 voting members:

- Reelected on the first ballot the Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton to a six-year term as ELCA presiding bishop.
- Elected Deacon Sue Rothmeyer to a six-year term as ELCA secretary. Rothmeyer, currently serving as executive for administration with the Office of the Secretary, was installed during the assembly's closing worship on Aug. 10 and will begin her term Nov. 1.
- Approved the social statement “Faith, Sexism and Justice: A Call to Action” and its implementing resolutions. The social statement, in part, names patriarchy and sexism as sins and calls the church to action on a range of issues, including gender-based violence, workplace discrimination and economic inequality.
- Adopted “A Declaration of Inter-Religious Commitment,” which will serve as church policy for inter-religious relations. The policy statement was adopted with the witness of 39 ecumenical and inter-religious guests in attendance.
- Approved the triennium budget for 2020-2022, which includes a current fund spending authorization of \$68,378,325 for 2020, a current fund income proposal of \$68,442,034 for 2021 and \$68,507,018 for 2022; and an ELCA World Hunger spending authorization of \$21.5 million 2020, and an income proposal of \$21.5 million for 2021 and for 2022.
- Adopted the “Strategy Toward Authentic Diversity in the ELCA,” which consists of a report and recommendations on how the ELCA exhibits authentic diversity and formulates goals for racial diversity and inclusion.
- Witnessed the presentation of the “Declaration of the ELCA to People of African Descent,” which was accepted by the Rev. Lamont A. Wells, president of the African Descent Lutheran Association (ADLA), and members of ADLA.
- Adopted 26 memorials en bloc, ranging in topics from gun violence to engagement in the Holy Land and gender identity to seminary tuition.
- Adopted a memorial that affirms the ELCA's long-standing commitment to migrants and refugees and declares the ELCA a sanctuary church body.

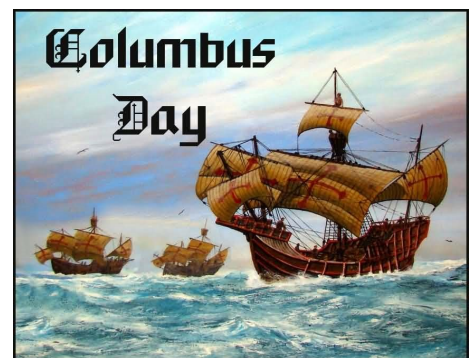
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- Adopted a memorial that calls for the development of a social statement and social message on the relationship of church and state.
- Adopted a memorial to encourage all synods and congregations to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the ELCA's ordination of women in 2020, the 40th anniversary of the ordination of women of color in the Lutheran tradition and the 10th anniversary of the ELCA's decision to remove barriers to ordination for people in same-gender relationships.
- Adopted a memorial to support the vision and goals of the Poor People's Campaign that align with the ELCA's social teachings.
- Adopted a series of amendments to the "Constitutions, Bylaws and Continuing Resolutions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America," including one that makes ordination the entrance rite for ministers of Word and Service, and an amendment to no longer count deacons as laypeople for representational principles.
- Adopted a resolution that committed the ELCA to support the World Council of Church's "Thursdays in Black" campaign toward a world without rape and violence.
- Adopted a resolution to commemorate June 17 as a day of repentance in the ELCA for the martyrdom of the Emanuel 9—the nine people who were shot and killed June 17, 2015, during a Bible study at Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church in Charleston, S.C.
- Adopted a resolution to condemn white supremacy, calling all ELCA congregations to engage in a "study of the structures and rhetoric that empower and fuel racism and white supremacy and to take to heart the teaching of Scriptures, so we may all be better equipped to speak boldly about the equal dignity of all persons in the eyes of God."
- Celebrated the end of Always Being Made New: The Campaign for the ELCA, which concluded June 30 with nearly \$250 million raised in cash, multiyear commitments and planned gift commitments. At the 2013 ELCA Churchwide Assembly, voting members approved the \$198 million campaign to help sustain and grow ministries of the church.
- Elected members to serve on the ELCA Church Council, churchwide committees and churchwide boards, including Portico Benefit Services, the Mission Investment Fund and 1517 Media.

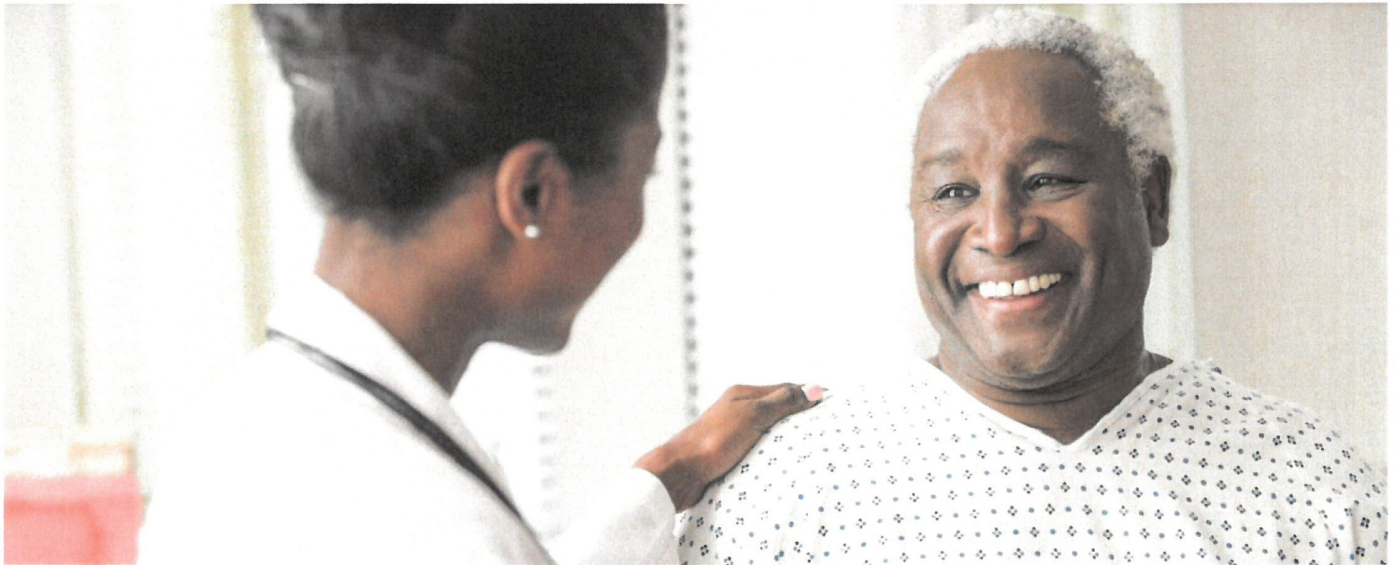

Men Need to Know Breast Cancer Isn't Just for Women



Breast lumps shouldn't be ignored or passed off for something incidental

Breast cancer may be widely known as a woman's disease, but that doesn't mean men are immune from developing it. Men and women are both born with breast cells and tissue that are susceptible to breast cancer. It is uncommon for men to develop breast cancer, but it does occur. Less than 1 percent of all breast cancer cases include men, and only one in a thousand men will ever be diagnosed with the disease, according to the National Breast Cancer Foundation (NBCF).

"For every 100 hundred women who get breast cancer, we'll have one man who does as well," said Thomas Heck, MD, a surgeon with Gem City Surgical Breast Care Center. "Obviously, the odds of a man getting breast cancer is a lot less, but it's not zero. Men need to be aware that breast cancer does occur in the male population."

Unlike women, men do not have yearly physical exams specifically for breast cancer nor do they undergo regular imaging such as a mammogram. For that reason, a man will often discover he has breast cancer by seeing or feeling a lump underneath the nipple or areola.

Unfortunately, men often delay having a lump evaluated because they may think it is a result of an injury or an issue that will eventually go away, said Dr. Heck.

“Men who may feel a lump in the breast shouldn’t ignore it,” he said. “Because men don’t typically see breast cancer as a type of cancer that can develop on them, they may delay getting that initial exam.”

The likelihood that a man will develop breast cancer in his lifetime may be low, but it’s important for men to keep the following in mind:

Prevention applies to you – Women aren’t the only ones who need to take steps to reduce their risk for breast cancer. A man can reduce his risk for cancer by focusing on three key areas of his life. This includes maintaining a healthy weight, making sure alcohol consumption is at a moderate to low level and exercising regularly.

You can’t afford to ignore – Talk to a health care provider as soon as you discover a lump or mass in your breast tissue. Don’t wait to see if it will go away or shrug it off as a minor bump. Men carry a higher mortality than women when it comes to breast cancer simply because they wait to be diagnosed, according to the NBCF.

Genetic testing may apply to you – Dr. Heck recommends all men diagnosed with breast cancer consult with a geneticist. Men who have breast cancer have a much higher risk for carrying a genetic mutation such as the BRCA gene, BRCA1 or BRCA2. The presence of a gene mutation can change his surgery to include a double mastectomy. It also increases his risk for prostate cancer, and means his children carry a 50 percent chance of carrying the gene as well.

Dr. Heck says, “Breast cancer may be thought of as a woman’s disease, but in the end the reality of cancer helps men to quickly overcome any struggle with stereotypes.”

“Yes, breast cancer is widely seen as a disease that affects women, but from my experience, men who discover they have it accept it for what it really is – cancer.”

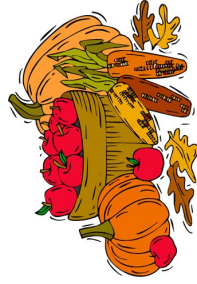

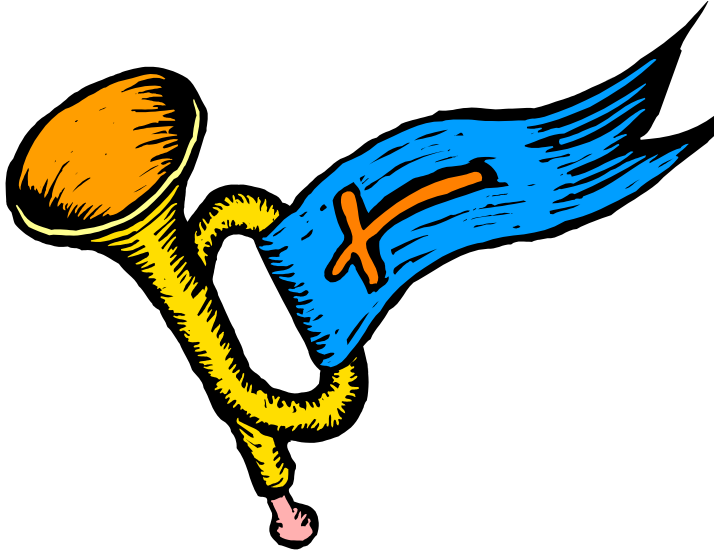
