The month was full of festivals, fellowships, and sadly, funerals. Here are some of the events Chaplaincy Care invested time and energy into for March:

Chaplaincy

Care Services:

Chaplaincy Care was actively engaged with the Plant City Strawberry Festival for 11 days. Twice each day, a ministry or presence was provided to encourage, pray over, and work with over 100 First Responders, 147 Vendors, and 232 Festival Staff/Workers. 3 first ever BIONIC Lunches were provided for the PCPD and two for the PCFR during the festival.

From MAR 1-31, the continual “ministry of Presence” of C2 was expressed in:

- 44** Sites visit (HCPS, PCFR, HCPS-S, FBI-Tampa, PCPD, Strawberry Fest)
- 19** Events (Trainings, BIONIC events, Ceremonies, Funerals, Ministry events)
- 34** mentorship/Life Coaching sessions
- C2 Chaplains Report:** 3 sites, 2 event, 7 M/C sessions
- Total Impacts:** **47 sites, 21 Events, 41 M/LC sessions**

Chaplaincy Care Counseling Center (C4):

The Counseling center was able to have Catrina Harr trained in the CVI program tool to assist with her impacts/counseling of clients. She will finish the training in April.

Chaplaincy Care Academy:

C2 was able to provide a CVI trng for the Pasco County Sheriff’s Office Chaplains. CH 101 had 3 complete classes and CH 201 had 2 complete. C2 is working with 3 Chaplains that are possible candidates for the HCPS Security ministry coverage.

Closing Thought: The Strawberry Festival provided for us a tremendous opportunity to expose the ministry and share the impacts on the lives of our First responders. Our thanks to Paul Davis and his team for the open doors provided.
