



Paris Haldeman & His California Gold Rush

Installment 3

Oct 28, 1849

Reading's Dry Diggings (CA)

Letter from Paris Haldeman to one of his brothers (age 18)

Reading Diggings Oct.28th 1849

Dear Brother,

We are now located in Reading's Dry diggings two hundred miles north of Sacramento City near the Sacramento River, we will winter here although the diggings are now poor, there has been so many here that the creek bottoms have completely torn up and it is difficult to find ten feet square to dig on. I do not think the average amount made by the miners exceed five dollars per day, many do not make sufficient to pay their boarding, some may strike a pocket and take out two or three hundred dollars in a few hours. The largest amount that has been taken out in a day here was three hundred and eighty five dollars. The creek runs through canon's have a great fall and are very rocky, the mode of digging is to get down on the base rock in the bed of the stream (now dry) which lays from one to six feet below the surface in the crevices or pockets you get out the gold with a spoon or a knife, it is very coarse(one lump was taken out a short time ago of two and half pounds). You may work for days and not see the color as it is termed or you may strike a lead and take out a great deal in a short time. The sand and gravel in the creeks pays but very little to wash as it only contains a few particles of gold. We expect to wash the earth out of the small vanes where the vanes commence which may pay very well. There is a great deal of sickness, three fourths of the people have been and are sick and many have died, they are greatly discouraged with the prospect, most every one that makes sufficient slopes for home, and the rest intend doing the same as soon as they made enough, ten to one wish they had never seen the d****d country. Companies which come from Oregon put right back, saying they can do better there, common labor being five dollars per day and every thing cheaper. Very few who have settled in Oregon ever think of returning to the states, the country is beautiful and climate delightful and healthy. A great many have been out prospecting or hunting new diggings, but none have been found, I among the rest have been in one of these excursions for eight days, we went mounted, provisions and well armed on account of the indians which are very bad, the second day we were out we were surrounded by about a hundred who lay in ambush for us as we passed between a creek and the mountain side, they raised a yell but we retreated to open ground and made ready for fight, their chief came forth to make peace with us, finding we were prepared for them, which we did making him a few presents, and soon left changing our course. They are great rascels and will kill and steal from the whites. They never attack only when they have the advantage. These indians are well built and very strong, they are nearly all naked, live on roots, acorns, fish and some game which they kill with their bows and arrows, their only weapons we call them diggers. We found no gold after all our trouble. I have worked but two days here on the mines, the first day I raised the color and the second I took out four dollars and this is sunday. I wanted to work all winter make or not make, I may strike a lead if I am lucky. The country is so crowded that I fear the lower mines are torn up so much that little is to be made.

The reason of our coming up so high was the report of the mines being so very rich, but by the time we arrived here, we only saw what had been. There will but few winter here and the chance will be better

for us. We all work in our own bank, There are few of us in the mess Henry, Guy Haines, Peter son of Marsiella & myself, Herm left us on the road and got into these diggings some time before us. He struck a lead and took out four hundred and fifty dollars in a few days, since that he had not been able to raise the color. He has given up mining swearing never to try it again, and has left for Sacramento city to dentist. Henry is going home as soon as he can make sufficient to take him. I expected to make five thousand but the chance looks rather dull unless I can dig out a little capital here this winter. If you see any fair prospect for me in the states write and I shall return home immediately. We are all tired of the dogs life we have lead since we left the states. I shall be indeed glad when I am on my road home. If a person would come into the mines well dressed, he would be a perfect show, the ragged devils would stare at him with perfect surprise. Sunday is holly day here for some others work in the mines, we have preaching which I do not think does much good, as gambling & fiddle playing goes on all day, nearly everyone gambles in this country the mexicans and Californians could not live without playing monte, I do not think I shall take such a degree of interest in the game.

The only thing this country affords are beautiful horses, which are here in any quantity. The spaniards are the greatest horsemen I ever seen, the Californian saddle, are the best in the world for both horse and rider, it is scarcely possible to be thrown out of it, they laugh at american saddles. The bridle bitts are clumsily made but very severe the horse must obey the slightest pull on the rein. The spurs are of immense size the wheels from two to four inches in diameter, they are used to excite the horse, also to enable the rider to maintain his seat in lassoing wild cattle. It is a perfect show to see a California vaquero with his horse trappings, his sarape and blanket. The most beautiful sight is to see them lasso wild cattle, which the valley is covered with, beef which was formerly worth nothing is now worth from 25 to 30 cts. per pound. The prices in the mines for flour and pork is 1\$ per 1b. sugar & dried fruit, onions & 2\$ per 1b. these prices have been reduced, so many leaving who sell out.

Tell brother Samuel that I saw but very few insects on the road, and since I am in California I have not seen a bug I suppose there will be plenty in the spring. There are any quantity of lizards here, and I saw thousands on the planes but my alcohol has nearly all evaporated not being properly sealed and I could not collect them.

I am very anxious to hear from home I have sent to San Francisco by a gentleman for our letters if there be any. I hope you are all living and in good health, I have heard of the cholera being so bad in the states, that I am anxious to know it did not reach you, hundreds died on the planes with it, we were fortunate enough to keep ahead of it.

Give my love to all at Chiques, the Grove, Columbia, Harrisburg, & the rest of my friends.
