## Information for the Educational Session

My portion of the Educational session on January 20th will be about identifying shells Here are some terms you should learn:

#### **Gastropods (from top to bottom)**

- Spire, Apex: The top part of the shell, which comes to a point.
- Whorl: One complete revolution of the spiral shell.
- **Protoconch**: The very first whorls of the shell, usually 1 1/2-2 1/2 whorls.
- Suture: The edge formed by the bottom of each whorl.
- · Body Whorl: The last and largest whorl.
- Siphonal Canal: The tube formed at the base of the shell to protect the animal's siphon. Many people call this the "tail", but it's really a "nose!"
- Aperture: The opening through which the animal emerges.
- Outer Lip: The outer edge of the aperture. In many species it is thin when the animal is growing and thickens to a varix when it has completed the new whorl.
- **Siphonal Canal**: The top edge of the outer lip may form a U-shaped channel.
- Columella: The central core around which
  the shell grows. At the inner edge of the
  aperture, it may have a depression like a
  dimple. In shells with a flat bottom it may
  form a hole going up into the shell, called an
  umbilicus. This may be partially or even
  wholly obscured.
- Operculum: The horny or shelly "door" of a shell. Most are large enough to close the opening, but some are tiny, "vestigial."
- **Periostracum**: Skinlike or hairlike outer covering of a shell.

#### **Bivalves**

- **Beak**: The place where the hinge of the shells is located.
- Umbo, Umbones: Swelling part of shell near the beaks.
- Hinge Teeth: Central toothlike projections and depressions on the hinge. They merge with the teeth on the other half of the shell to keep it closed.
- Escutcheon: A regularly shaped depression on the hinge margin behind the umbones. Usually heart-shaped.

- Lunule: An impressed area, often crescentshaped, on the upper edge of some bivalves.
- Anterior End: The front end of where the animal emerges.
- **Posterior End**: The rear end, opposite the Anterior End.
- Base: The part opposite the hinge.
- Dorsal Margin: The upper edge of the shell (where the beak and hinge are.)
- Muscle Scar, Adductor Scar: Depression marks on inside of shells showing where the muscle (what we eat in a scallop) was attached.
- Pallial Line: The Muscle Scar often has a thin, line starting at the scar and tracing the edge of the shell, then curving upward towards the beak.

#### **Terms for Identification**

- Attenuate: Long and tapering, slender, thin.
- Cancellate: Crossed by horizontal (spiral) and vertical () lines which produce a latticelike effect.
- Carinate: Having a keel shaped, elevated edge.
- Channelled: Grooved or deeply furrowed.
- Compressed: Flattened from side to side.
- Concave: Dished or incurved.
- Convex: Swollen or outwardly curved.
- Crenulate: Wrinkled or scalloped.
- Denticulate: With toothlike points.
- Flamulations: Flame shaped spots of color.
- Growth Lines: Lines on the surface showing where there was a former lip.
- · Imbricated: Overlapping like shingles.
- · Incised: Having sharp grooves.
- Maculated: Spotted.
- Nacreous: Pearly.
- Reflected: Bent backwards.
- Reticulate: Resembling a network.
- Rugose: Rough or wrinkled; Strong-looking.
- Shoulder: Top or largest part of whorl outline.
- Spines: Stiff outgrowths.
- Spiral: Coiled in a cylindrical manner.
- · Striate: Marked with fine lines.
- **Tubercles**: Small, round projections: knobs.
- Varices: Raised ribs showing former lips.

### Terms for Identification (Bivalves)

- **Byssus**: Strong fibers by which some bivalves fasten themselves to solid objects.
- Equivalve: Valves same size and shape.
- Gaping: Having a gap where valves do not fit together.

## Rare Archaeological Find of Cloth Dyed using Shells

Israeli archaeologists have uncovered three rare, Roman-era fabrics believed to have been dyed using murex snail extracts in unique colors mentioned in the Bible.

Israel Antiquities Authority researchers say they have identified three pieces of cloth dyed in colors considered the most valued at the time, including special shades of blue, purple and crimson-scarlet — colors cited in scripture. The textiles are believed to have been used in the clothing of wealthy residents 2,000 years ago.

"The importance of this fabric is extremely significant as there are practically no parallels for it in the archaeological record," Yoli Shwartz, Israel Antiquities Authority spokeswoman said in a statement.

In the book of Exodus chapter 25, God gives Moses instructions for building the tabernacle during which blue and purple and scarlet yarns were specified. These were also the colors to be used for the making of the priestly garments, as described in Exodus chapter 27.

The fabrics were discovered in the Wadi Murabba'at caves south of Qumran, the area in which the Dead Sea Scrolls were found during the 1940s and 1950s.

The unique make of the fabrics was discovered during a wider study of 180 textiles found in Judean Desert caves conducted by Dr. Naama Sukenik.

"Among the many textiles, most of which were dyed using substances derived from plants, were two purple-bordeaux [crimson] colored textiles – parts of tunics that were double dyed utilizing two of the most expensive materials in antiquity: *Murex* trunculus and American Cochineal\* insect," the Israel Antiquities Authority spokeswoman added.

The Tazpit News Agency further explained: "A third textile, made of wool, indicating the thread fibers were dyed by exposing them to sunlight or heated after having been dyed, represent another use of the murex snail for achieving a shade of blue, and it is possible that the item in question is an indigo fabric made by means of a technique similar to making the tekhelet (blue) in tzitzit, the four-fringed garment worn by Jews."

The purple shade was considered to have been the most valued of the pigments used during the period, the Hebrew website Walla reported.

"Fabrics dyed purple testified to the prestige of the garment and to the social status of its owner. In some periods, purple clothing was permitted to the emperor and his family only," Walla reported, adding that the price of the dye at times reached the price of gold.

Israel Antiquities Authority researchers say they still don't know how the pricey fabrics got into the caves. One theory is they may have belonged to Jewish refugees on the run during the Bar Kochba Revolt which began in 132-136 A.D., during which the Jews rebelled against Roman Empire rule of the Holy Land. Alternatively, the clothing may have belonged to a Roman military unit living in the caves.

\*Cochineal would not have been available until the discovery of the New World!

## **Those Were the Days**

Shell photos by Bill Frank, Jacksonville Shell Club Liguus is a genus of tree-dwelling snails



that is found only in Florida, Cuba and the island of Hispaniola. There are

Liquus virgineus, from Haiti about five species but there are dozens of forms of Liguus fasciatus, most of which are in Florida, and endemic to (found only in) certain stands of hardwood in the Everglades.

These are color forms, which range from pure white to nearly black with yellow, orange, gray-blue, striped, checked solid colors and other mixes. They have long been sought for their beauty and variety, and some people,

The "Lig" country stretches from Pompano Beach across to Marco Island and south to Key West. In the early 1900's, snails were abundant in their stands of hardwood (called "hammocks"), each separated from other populations by Everglades water. Just before WWII, there were 25 collectors in one area,

and their weekend take could be 1,000 shells!

like Archie Jones, collect no other kind of shell!

When the Everglades National Park was being contemplated, many collectors rushed to get the best shells before collecting was banned. Some even transplanted rare forms to other hammocks or their own Miami yards to preserve the form. They also created "hybrid" forms by putting two colors of Ligs together. However, some of the collectors conceived of the idea of planting endangered forms in Everglades hammocks to protect them when the Park was established.

Many hammocks have been destroyed by development and, with them, the Ligs.

## **Ligging with Archie Jones**

Some years ago I had the opportunity to go "Ligging" with Archie Jones in the Everglades. The Park rules said we had to list all the shells

we took, and we could only collect because Archie had a special permit. Permits are no longer available and all Ligs are on the Endangered Species List.

June Bailey, Marilyn Barkley and I and a few others met at a remote area in the park. After getting our gear ready, we marched off, following Archie down barely seen trails, through water and beside Seminole chickees to two or three hammocks where we collected



amongst the spiders, mosquitoes and snakes.



To collect, you carry along a series of screw-together poles, each about 5 feet long,



the top one with a small cup attached. When you spot a snail, high up in the trees, you assemble your pole a section at a time and try to knock the shell off the tree and into the cup.

I think I netted a couple of dozen shells of several color forms. I have never ligged again, and I don't want to; once was enough!

#### SARASOTA SHELL CLUB MEETING, December 12, 2013

The meeting was opened at 7:03p.m. by Sally Peppitone, at the Waldemere Firehouse in Sarasota. 23 members and 1 guest were present.

Donna Bartels, Recording Secretary read the November meeting minutes. They were filed with one correction with adding Terri's name as Goz Gosselin's wife.

Treasurers' Report – Bruce Paulsen announced total of bank account is \$12,187.92. The Holiday auction brought income of \$939.00. Bruce reminded everyone that there are events and classes going on at the Chamber of Commerce. We can access their website and be entitled to attend now that we are members. Bruce went to an educational meeting at the Chamber that gave information on how smaller businesses and clubs can have a higher visibility. Bruce is also looking into having a Facebook page to help promote the club.

It will again be at the Marriott Courtyard and the final deadline for a dinner count is 1-31-14.
