Pentecost Sunday (C)

June 9th, 2019

This time in our lives ...

There are several expressions that mark the end of the celebrations of the first week of Easter. The Sunday following the Feast of the Resurrection has special names. Some come from Latin as "Quasi modo", the first words that are used in the entry song for what has been called Low Sunday. There is also "Sunday in albis" referring to the white dress (alba) of the newly baptized during this liturgy. Another of these names has always surprised me. It also designates this Sunday as "Closed Easter," as if the tomb that opened on Easter morning suddenly closed.



Yet history did not end at the Resurrection. On the contrary this is where it began and is what the liturgical feast of Pentecost celebrates. With the gift of the Spirit, the promise of Easter opens to us and spreads throughout the earth like a fire or a great wind. Easter has been firmly established.

This means that the Church will fulfill its mission by meeting people everywhere. The Church realized early on that it is vital to speak the language of the people whom she meets every day. Even in the Acts of the Apostles, St. Luke evoked this event that took place fifty days after Easter. He has recorded many events that happened after the Resurrection. A breath of fresh air engulfed the Mediterranean basin. The Apostles who, enabled by the gift of the Holy Spirit, could broadcast the Good News. God's wonders were accessible to all cultures: Parthians, Medes, Elamites, Cretans, Arabs and many more. Each could hear and understand the Apostles' proclamations in their own language.

At this first Pentecost, the Apostles received the gift of the Holy Spirit who, following the Resurrection brought in a new regime for the Church: a call to a universal encounter. As St. Paul paraphrased, this is the Church's legacy. This highlights the Church's ability to reach out to people everywhere and continue the work of evangelization so that she remains the *salt* that our earth requires.

Our world desperately needs peace and fraternity. It needs light and comfort; its wounds need healing. Our world needs God's Word to be proclaimed in words that people can understand and relate to today.

Our Sovereign Lord and Comforter, the Holy Spirit guides us in our tasks, but we acknowledge that evangelization requires our efforts.

With Pentecost, Easter opens us to Life and relationship with God. Let's begin now.
