Showing Etiquette Reminder

A couple of issues have been bought to the attention of the committee over the last season, so the following is just a gentle reminder of some basic showing points.

The Pony:

- Ponies are to be Registered, or have an appropriate Foal Pre Naming with NZSPBS.
- The pony must be entered under the registered owner's, or lessee's name, but can be shown by anyone you choose, however they should ensure that anyone showing the pony on their behalf is familiar with the recommendations and rules for showing.
- Ponies must be clean and not over-processed, keep it clean and simple remember they are a Native Breed.
- Ponies must be shown in full feather and natural coat, they are not to be dyed or wear make-up and should not be clipped.
- Do not plait ponies manes, tails or forelocks, tails should be long around fetlock length (use a tail bag to keep tails clean), do not cut bridle paths.
- Show ponies in a suitable bridle with a bit. Youngstock may be shown in a halter (exception Colts over one year), preferably a leather halter with a leather lead. It is not recommended to show in a rope or a "paddock" halter, or use every-day lead ropes for leads.
- Stallions and colts must be identified by an S badge on each side of the bridle from a yearling onwards.
- Ensure your gear is clean, brass should be shiny!
- Avoid bling bridles, simple plain brow-bands are preferred.
- If your pony is not well, then **do not** bring it to the show.
- Forbidden substances are not to be used any animal may be tested for drugs or forbidden substances at any show, refer to the RAS rules and regulations.
- Height certificates are not required for Shetland ponies competing in the Shetland Pony Section at A&P Shows, however Shetland ponies competing in open ring(s) will need to comply with the RAS rules stipulated for that particular ring.

The Exhibitor:

- Wear appropriate attire, there is no specific dress code but jeans, western attire and casual attire are not recommended (exception shows are winter woollies or fun days, unless otherwise specified)
- It is recommended to wear dress pants or a skirt that is contrasting in colour to the ponies legs, some judges prefer this as it is
 easier to see the ponies' legs when they move out. A matching or contrasting dress jacket is a popular choice. Tops and
 skirts should not be skimpy or revealing. The outfit chosen should be suitable to run in and the overall look should
 complement the pony.
- Wear appropriate shoes, black or brown leather shoes with a good sole flat sole are recommended sneakers, high heels etc. are not appropriate. You will need to be able to run in them on slippery / muddy ground.
- It is recommended to wear a hat, gloves, buttonhole or brooch (women on the right lapel, men on the left lapel).
- Carry a show cane or a cut down dressage whip no longer than 68cm in length including the flap which is not measure more than 2cm wide and 4cm long.
- Wear an appropriately sized arm number holder on your left arm, do not use a breast plate number holder on the pony.

- If you are showing a stallion or colt ensure you have the appropriate identification arm-bands (one for each arm) and bib, refer
 to the RAS rules and regulations.
- Tie long hair back or tuck it up under your hat.
- Keep jewellery and make-up simple.
- Be confident and smile you are supposed to be enjoying yourself and this will feed through to your pony, you are there to show your pony off.
- Do not abuse your pony or you may be "yellow carded" refer to the RAS rules and regulations.

In the Ring:

- Both you and your pony should be standing facing the judge unless asked otherwise, ensure the pony is standing on all four legs and you should not be slouching you should both look attentive.
- Follow the instructions of the judge, if you are not sure of the instructions ask the judge to repeat them when it is your turn to work out.
- Move the pony out well, don't amble along make the pony walk and trot out enthusiastically, be confident in your work out and
 use the arena to show your pony off.
- Lead out the pony so that the pony is on the judge's side and not you, unless you are asked to change the rein.
- If you have a faster pony, overtake the slower pony on the outside, it is considered rude to pass them on the inside and may block the judge's view of your fellow competitor. If you have a slower pony or one with shorter legs it is advisable to enter towards the end of the class, you should not be the exhibitor to lead out the class if possible.
- Try to control naughty behaviour quietly and firmly, a badly behaved pony can upset other ponies and ruin someone else's
 day. If your pony is behaving badly allow room plenty of between you and the competitor beside you or move you pony to the
 back or out to the side, especially if it is a stallion or colt. Remember we all have bad days in the show-ring, shrug it off and
 move on!

Ring Etiquette:

- Refrain from talking in the ring.
- Smile and make eye contact with the judge it is polite to say good morning and politely answer any questions asked, however the conversation should be kept professional.
- Don't follow other competitors too closely, give ponies room or you or your pony may get kicked.
- Allow plenty of room for stallions and colts these are identified by an **S** on the bridle, be mindful of these ponies both inside and outside the ring.
- Those not selected for a ribbon line-up should discreetly leave the ring when indicated by the judge or steward.
- Once the ribbons have been given out by the judge the first place recipient will lead the ribbon winners in order of their placings from the ring, usually at a trot.
- Congratulate fellow competitors whether you agree with the placings or not, do not voice your negative opinions.
- You should attend the show's Grand Parade, this is especially important for those winning Reserve Champion, Champion and Supreme sashes, it is also nice to support the person with the pony that won Supreme.

Foal, Yearling, 2 Year Old, 3 Year Old, Gelding, Mare, Stallion, Paced, Mannered and Best Presented or Turnout.

Lead Rein, Ridden and Harness

Exhibitors please send your results recorded on the "NZSPBS Shetland Pony of the Year Result Sheet 2016/17" to the Secretary Lesley Lewis, 530 Marshland Road, Christchurch 8083, **by 15**th **May 2018** if you have not already done so.

Junior Handler Award (Formerly Young Exhibitor)

This award is open to any Junior Handler aged 5–18 years (age as at and including 15th May 2018) exhibiting a Shetland pony registered in the NZSPBS Stud Book. **Participants do not need to be members of the NZSPBS**. All in-hand shows held during the show season from 1st October 2017 to 15th May 2018 with Shetland classes (e.g. A&P, Breeders, NZSPBS, and Regional Shows etc.) are eligible.

The classes eligible for the award are, Breed and Conformation classes, Best Presented or Turnout, Best Paced and Best Mannered.

A trophy is awarded to the Junior Handler with the most points throughout the show season, however if the recipient or their family is not a financial member of the NZSPBS, the Society shall retain the trophy. 1st to 6th place-getters shall receive a sash and certificate.

As I write the rain is pouring down. Typically in Canterbury we have gone from summer to winter in the space of a couple of days.

I had my last show of the season at Malvern A&P and the last Canterbury show was Oxford A&P in Easter weekend. The Canterbury Breeders Foal Show is the very last event for Shetland breeders before we hunker down for winter. Looking back on the showing season for this year, numbers for our Shetland classes have been fairly consistent. I think the largest number of entries for a class this season was the Paced and Mannered class at Banks Peninsula Show. There were 15 ponies competing. Pretty impressive effort! We are also getting consistent encouragement and good feedback from judges about the difficulty they have judging large numbers of quality ponies. A good problem for the society to have and good feedback for Shetland breeders.

Many of us in Canterbury are looking forward to trekking south for the AGM and catching up with all you members who can make it to enjoy some southern hospitality. Keep warm and invest in some good gumboots. I think this winter we are all going to need them.

AREA REPRESENTATIVE REPORT - KATHY DRAKE, WAIKATO UPPER NORTH ISLAND

Not a lot to report this time around. It's just been a case of hunkering down and trying to avoid what has been a very hot humid summer. Thanks to well above average rainfall for January and February, the grass didn't stop growing so waistlines have had to be watched. Luckily plenty of hay was produced in December and January, despite the rainfall, as the rainless days were hot enough to dry grass guickly. So we have a lovely full hayshed which is always a comforting thought going into winter.

The ponies got a few washes—not to get them clean, but simply to cool them down and to remove the build-up of sweat in their coats. I have a new favourite product—Bee Kind Naturally White soap bar. It's all natural and brings the white/pale ponies up sparkling and my black pony has had a wonderful sheen on her all summer. I thoroughly wet their coats, manes and tails and then use the bar straight on their coats with a massage pattern. They love it and my hands feel lovely and soft and silky for days afterwards. The ponies are left with a soft silky coat which naturally repels dirt for a while afterwards. One bar normally does three Shetlands, but for their latest pre winter wash I used almost a bar per pony as their winter coats were starting to come through and I wanted to make sure I got all the last residual sweat out of their coats.

I also use the Bee Kind Kawakawa massage soap on my two old retired ponies—33 year old Welsh pony Fanci and 35 year old Norwegian Fjord pony Dannii. Dannii has an amazingly dense coat winter and summer—much denser than the Shetlands, and she tends to get skin rashes if sweat builds up in the coat. Over the years we have tried all sorts of remedies including steroid creams which the vets recommended, but nothing works like the Kawakawa soap. I haven't had a single issue of skin rash since using it, and she has stopped rubbing against anything she can find! And once again—it's magic on my hands!

Another product which Rod and I are loving is Equi -Lise all-in-one lime based equine fertiliser. This is a pelletised product produced in North Canterbury specifically for equine pastures. It is really easy to apply using the spinner on our tractor, but just as easy to apply by hand or using a hand held spinner. In the past we have had difficulty applying lime in our spinner as it just keeps clogging up. This is a great new product which has given really good results in our paddocks in a short time. We buy it from our local horse feed merchant in 25kg sacks, but you can also buy in 1/2 ton or one ton bags. It is great to be able to do a paddock or two at a time and we usually time it just before heavy rain so it gets absorbed fast. We are often reminded of a friends summing up of what living on a lifestyle block is all about—it 'Blocks your Lifestyle' as there is always something else needing your attention! So when you find a product that cuts down your workload and gives really good results, it pays to share the knowledge.

We have had a few cyclones come through this summer and each time we get a good blow, the neighbour's willow trees deposit heaps of branches into our paddocks, which are immediately hoovered up by the ponies and cows. It just reminds me how dependent the animals are on roughage/fibre. They demolish the leaves, twigs and then work their way through the bark and even quite large pieces of branch. Just a reminder that grass alone is not enough for our ponies and a varied diet of non-toxic herbs and even hedgerows and trees helps keep them healthy.
