# **HAPPY NEW YEAR!**

Happy New Year! You may think this is a little premature, especially as we haven't yet celebrated Christmas, but this is the beginning of my year. Not everyone follows the same year. We might mark January 1st as the beginning of the new year but for teachers and others in education the 'new year' begins in September; for those in agriculture the 'new year' begins with ploughing and drilling. The church calendar, however, begins with Advent Sunday. The penitential season of Advent prepares us for Christmas... and the Christmas season moves seamlessly into the Epiphany Season which technically comes to a conclusion with the Feast of Candlemas – The Presentation of Christ in the temple - forty days after Christmas day. There follow a few Sundays (it varies from year to year) before we reach Ash Wednesday and the beginning of the penitential season of Lent. Palm Sunday and Good Friday are the prelude to Easter Day. The Easter Season lasts for 50 days and brings us to Pentecost (or Whitsun as we used to call it). And that's it: roughly half of the year has passed already and we finally enter ordinary time – the part of the liturgical that is Green – twenty-five weeks roughly speaking (it depends how early or late Easter is) that bring us back to Advent Sunday and the New Year. It is a pattern that I have followed for many years and marked out by the colours of the vestments: purple – white/gold – ((possibly a few green weeks) – purple – white/gold – green. There are the occasional 'Red' days thrown in mark certain saints, but that is the basic pattern. It sets a rhythm to the year that provides structure to our lives... and is fairly closely aligned with the agricultural year. I suspect that in antiquity the changing colours of the priest's vestments where as much a marker for ploughing, sowing, and harvesting as the phases of the moon and the length of the day.

But the church year is more important than what I have outlined so far, for this pattern embeds our life in a story. That story is of course the story of Jesus: his birth, baptism, presentation in the temple... the triumphal entry into Jerusalem, the arrest, trial and crucifixion... the resurrection, ascension and the gift of the promised Holy Spirit. The story is told in two parts and each part is preceded by a penitential season (purple), a time of preparation of ourselves to hear again the story of what God has done for us.

At the beginning of the new year we prepare ourselves to hear again the story of Christ's birth – God with us! It is a phrase that can trip off the lips so easily that we sometimes need to stop and reflect on the significance of that fact – the light of Christ is with us now and shines in the darkness to bring into the light things that are hidden. We need the penitential season of Advent to examine ourselves and consider those things that we have kept hidden... for it is only when we are prepared to open ourselves up to God that we can truly celebrate Christmas and be joyful that God is with us.

## TWO STEPS FORWARD - ONE STEP BACK

During November St Denys experienced two events which proved positive and has given encouragement to the "fit-for-purpose" nature of what the building can offer to the wider community.

Firstly, the church is now a lot warmer than the previous winter and, hopefully, will remain so in years to come. Following several years of on-and-off reliability the two gas boilers have been replaced by a more robust and efficient boiler. Very few things in life get me down but the heating in St Denys has always been a cause of great anguish and disappointment. No sooner had we a working heating system in place then something would start to go wrong and finding a company who could effectively look after the system proved difficult. Let's just say the experience has been patchy. Although the new boiler has been up and running since the beginning of October it wasn't until mid-November when the winter cold started to kick in it felt good to walk into the church for a 10am Sunday service and realized the outside temperature was far less than the inside. I'm not going to make claims to achieving domestic warmth but at least you can feel the heat and not end up shivering through a lengthy service.

Second step forward is the old sound system has had an upgrade. Out has gone the two mixing units to be replaced by a single unit allowing users greater flexibility and a far superior sound quality. Instead of relying on an old remote control, music can be selected via a tablet allowing the user to have more control over the system. The original system was installed during 2002 and more than likely past its sell by date - giving a rocky horror drama during a recent funeral service. When funds permit it is hoped to add further enhancements to the system, which may include full video facilities.

So what is the one step back: well, not wishing to be outshone by its siblings in the church the Parish Centre's boiler has given up the ghost. I understand this particular boiler has been on borrowed time for some while so its demise is not totally unexpected - just could have chosen better timing, like next year or the year after that.

#### ... and in the future

Hopefully during 2022 we will have seen off the worst of the recent pandemic and can look forward to getting back to normal - which raises an interesting thought about what is normal. A typical dictionary definition of normal is: conforming to a standard; usual, typical, or expected. Well that just about covers every eventuality. Could be an interesting year.

Finally, if you are able, please support the various services being held during the Christmas festival and many blessings to you all during 2022.

#### "IT'S ABOVE YOU!" - OUR CLERESTORY

The stonework is thought to date from circa 1430 and to be contemporary with the rebuilding of the chancel in the perpendicular style. [The lines of earlier roofs can be seen above the chancel arch.]

The windows are by James Powell and Sons of London. [Powell was a relative of Robert Baden-Powell, the Founder of Scouting.] The firm also began the production of what we know as 'Whitefriars glass', from the location of their factory. Incorporated are sets of initials of significant families connected with the church and the town, and you have probably wondered whom they represent. They have been transcribed and identified by Dr. Wendy Atkin who writes: "Windows of north clerestory bearing initials of those who gave the windows in the 1870s - those on the north side and the three westernmost on the south side are the gift of Mr. Parry and commemorate his godchildren and those of his wife. The remaining five are offerings as thanksgivings for years of happy married life.".

# Bishop's Visitor update

On Armistice Day, 11th November, I was invited to attend the school's special Assembly to remember the fallen. It began just before 11-00 o'clock when the whole school had assembled outside on the top playground in their class groups. It was the first time I had seen all the children and staff together since before lockdown. We had recorded music including Nimrod and the Last Post on loudspeakers and we all stood for the 2 minutes' silence. Each class had made a poppy wreath and they were carried forward and displayed on the fence in front of everyone. It was very moving and the children (all between 4 and 11) behaved really well considering their age. It is one of the memorable events of the school year. The only children missing were a small group who attended the ceremony in the Market Place with teacher Mr Robbins, which was held at the same time.

I have recently been thrilled to discover that one of the teachers now lives in our previous house that we left 22 years ago. Mrs Mason has done lots of research into historical events concerning the school, including the airship disaster and the air raid shelter museum re-furbishment. She recently received an NKDC Community Champion Award for her historical work in the school. The award ceremony took place at Doddington Hall near Lincoln. Congratulations to her!

The children have been busy in recent days raising funds for charity. The school raised £540 for Children in Need and £453-86 for the Poppy Collection. On  $10^{th}$  December they will pay £1 each to come to school wearing a Christmas jumper instead of uniform. This will be shared between Save the Children and Sleaford Larder. Thanks to everyone.

If you went to the Christmas Tree Festival in the Methodist Church last weekend, the school provided a beautiful tree called "We three kings" as part of the display. This event is always a highlight of the run-up to Christmas in Sleaford.

I'm sure the children will be making decorations for their classrooms and other areas of the school in the coming weeks, the Advent candle ring will be out, they will hear the Christmas story afresh as they open windows in their Advent calendars, they will sing carols and rehearse the Nativity play. They are also due to come to church for their annual Christmas service, which didn't happen last year of course. We pray that all will go well and we can all enjoy a safe and Happy Christmas!
