HARVEST THANKFULNESS

Saying thank you for food

Thinking about where our food comes from, being thankful for it and remembering those who don't have as much as we do helps us all to recognise the blessing of 'our daily bread'.

Throughout the autumn, churches across the country will be having Harvest Festival services. These often involve bringing food donations and sometimes toiletries to give to food banks or homeless charities. Often there'll be hymns and songs that say 'thank you' to God for all that he provides, every day. Why not find out whether your local church has a Harvest Festival? Find your local church with <u>A Church Near You</u>.

These are some simple ways to say 'thank you' to God at home too:-

Say a thank you prayer:

A line in the Lord's Prayer asks God to 'Give us this day our daily bread'. When we say that line, we're asking God to provide the basic things in life that keep us healthy and happy. It can start with the food we need to eat each day, but for lots of different reasons, not everyone has enough.

So saying thank you for our food is important – we might thank the person who cooked it, and we might go back further and think of the people in the shops where we bought the ingredients, and even trace it right back to the farmers who grew the crops in the first place.

For children who are old enough, trying talking about this together one meal time, taking each item on the plate and thinking about where it came from and all the people and work that has gone into bringing it to your table.

Saying grace before a meal is a way of saying thank you to God for making the earth and everything in it – all good things come from God, and it's up to us to use them in the very best and most generous way.

Try singing this grace:

One, two, three, four, five, thank you God that I'm alive.

Six, seven, eight, nine, ten, thank you God for food. Amen!

One of the most traditional graces goes like this:

"For what we are about to receive, may the Lord make us truly thankful and keep us always mindful of the needs of others."

Some families hold hands while they say grace – this reminds us that we are thankful not only for our food, but that we can share it with people we love, as in this prayer:

"Thank you God for food, and family, and friends. Amen."

or

"Thank you God for food, and family, and friends, we remember those who have no food today,

and those who have food, but nobody to share it,

As you have blessed us, help us be a blessing for others. Amen.

HARVEST THANKFULNESS continued

Learning to say thank you:

Harvest Festival is a big thank you time: a time of year when for years, those who relied on local farming were thankful for the food that the earth provided and to God for taking care of them.

Today, for most of us, food comes already picked and packed from a supermarket or the delivery van, not our own fields – so perhaps it's even more important now to remember that our food comes from God's creation, and to thank God and everyone who harvests and prepares it for us.

A way to pray for farmers:

Lots of fruit and veg at the supermarket now have the name of the farmer printed on the container. Thanking God and those who make our food can help us remember to be grateful for the other good things in life. Maybe at bedtime you and your child can take turns thinking of things to be grateful to God for – from the profound to the very silly!

Or maybe you can finish each day by thinking about all the people you met that day and thanking God for how they help you: the bin man who clears up your rubbish; the lady at the shop who helps you find what you need; the toddler group leaders who sing and cut up bananas; the man on the bus who helped with your pushchair; the doctors looking after Granddad. There's a lot to be thankful for every day.

So let us all be thankful today for God's almighty blessings. Church of England.




Y3 Archeologists


