#### Our commitment to creation care

Did you know that the Earth's average temperature has increased by about 1.2 degree Centigrade in the last hundred years or so? That may not sound like a lot, but very small changes in temperature mean enormous changes in the environment. Global climate change has already had huge effects – glaciers have shrunk, ice on rivers and lakes is breaking up, plant and animal ranges have changed, and some have become extinct. Scientists predict that the planet can only sustain an increase of up to about 1.5 or 2 degrees C – so we need to take action urgently. Specifically, we need to reduce our production of greenhouse gases such as carbon dioxide and methane, which surround the earth and stop the heat escaping.

But why does this matter to us as Christians?

Well, as we read in Psalm 24, "The earth is the Lord's and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it". God made the earth – it belongs to God. And not just that, but as we are told in Genesis, God created humankind and put Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it – and in the same way, God has given us the world to look after.

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We also know that climate change is likely to affect some people more than others – particularly those in parts of the world already affected by food insecurity, water scarcity, flooding, infectious diseases, extreme heat, economic crises, and so on. So those who are already struggling are likely to be affected most. This is also something we should be concerned about – Jesus always demonstrated particular attention, love and respect to those who were marginalised and disadvantaged in his society – and calls us to do likewise in ours.

So this is definitely something we need to take seriously as Christians. The question is, what should we do?

Here at St Martins we marked Climate Sunday on 6 June, with an all-age service in which we considered the environment and in particular the huge problem of climate change. We talked about the many things that we can each do as individuals – the 3R's of Reduce, Reuse and Recycle, and lobbying our politicians, policymakers and leaders for more environmentally-friendly policies in our country, and in our schools and workplaces. But what about our actions as a church community? I wonder, can we make a commitment to become a more eco-friendly church?

One option is to commit to working towards an Eco Church award <a href="https://ecochurch.arocha.org.uk/">https://ecochurch.arocha.org.uk/</a>. This is an award scheme for churches who want to demonstrate that the gospel is good news for God's earth. Churches complete an online survey about how they are caring for God's earth in different areas of their life and work. The idea is to complete

the actions in order to gain the points necessary for an award. For example, using a green energy company or starting to use Fairtrade tea and coffee supplies (when we are allowed refreshments again!) are just two examples that gain Eco Church Award points.

More than 3,500 churches in England and Wales are already part of this network. So I wonder, is something that we can do here at St Martins? I would be delighted to lead or facilitate a group to get involved with this – to do an initial audit of how we are doing, and then see what else we might need to do, to work towards a bronze award in the first instance.

So I wonder, is anyone else interested? It wouldn't be a lot of work – and we can do the survey by Zoom, or sitting around a table outdoors, or whatever best suits... Please do let me know if you would like to get involved!
