Some of my best memories of "dressing up and playing my role" have been made at the school's event. The 5th graders are so bright, generally well behaved and interested in our presentations. Glenn and Corrie Cook (Edge) were there, Tim and Sharleene Richardson, Jimmy Worden, Deb Lewis and several other EARA members to present their programs on some aspect of "living history"

We had a really great Pot Luck lunch in the Library where we were asked to judge the decorated pumpkin contest. Tim had on his stove pipe hat and with his beard sure looked a lot like the Abraham Lincoln pumpkin, and Glenn looked a lot like the Albert Einstien pumpkin.

I heard that teacher Deb Polston who has been the ram rod for this great event every year for this school is going to retire after next year. I sure hope the tradition of this wonderful event continues.

Almost back to back with Cabot School was the Lead Hill celebration. What a great bunch of folks where there in this very historically interesting place in Arkansas, the 200th anniversary of the settlement there. The event was held in the nice little city park with many local artists displaying their wares including a great leather worker and flint knapper.

Keith Armburst amazed the public with fire starting and Glenn showed off his fire arms. Tom had his diamond fly and primitive camp. This may become a yearly event.
