5th Sunday in Ordinary Time (B)

Life is not always easy ...

Some days, as described in the first reading, we feel the weight of the world on our shoulders. The Bible never dismissed the words of someone who cried out to the Lord. How many men and women could echo Job's words as they face their trials and tribulations? For many people life is a chore. Others hope for better times which may or not happen. Life is not always easy ...



Jesus experienced a marathon session on the day spent in the Capernaum synagogue. He healed Peter's mother-in-law and all the sick people who came to see Him, including those who were possessed. The whole city of Capernaum had come to see Him. The next day, well before dawn, Christ retired to a secluded spot to pray. When Simon and his companions found him they said: "Everyone is looking for you!" It could have been a great temptation to stay in Capernaum, as the city warmly welcomed Him and He could stay with Simon who was very hospitable. Yet there were always other hands reaching out for His attention. People echoed Job's long complaint about a life of misery and loneliness.

In today's world, many people find that life is very difficult. We should not be surprised to read that Christ moved on to the neighboring towns and villages to proclaim the Word of God. Then, as now, Christ reaches out to those who are neglected, experiencing illness, suffering and the inequalities of our world.

But though we cry out, is there an answer?

There is an answer, but it is not an easy one. Neither is it to be found in the final verses of the Book of Job. Christ suffered and died for us. He protested against every evil that damaged people, everything that sought to degrade and destroy them. God's response to evil and suffering can be seen in the cross which stands not as a sign of failure or worse, even resignation, but as one of protest, a sign of victory! Life is not always easy ... and Jesus remains with us to the end.

Christ did not come only for the citizens of Capernaum. When Peter and his companions searched for him because other sick people had just arrived, Christ said: We must go on to the other villages round here. I have to preach in them also, because that is why I came (Mark 1:38).

Life is not always easy. But Christ is here and He reaches out to us.
