Preschool: Welcome Back! I hope you all had a refreshing Easter break. We will wrap up all things Easter this week. We have a couple of crafts left to finish. Then we will move on to learning about different animals. We will learn the difference between animals that fly and animals that only travel by land. We will continue to review our letters and numbers that we have learned. I am working on a field trip for the end of the year. Please let me know, if there are dates that don't work for you. Kind: This week is all about Chickens! We will discuss the Chicken Life Cycle and other animals that have a life cycle similar to a chicken. We've also been given the opportunity this year to incubate eggs in our classroom! I am so excited to watch their knowledge come to life as we can apply what we are learning as it's happening in our classroom. Please help your student remember to have their folder signed nightly. 1st/2nd: Welcome back! This week in **1st grade** we will be reading the story (along with several others by Ezra Jack Keats) <u>Whistle for Willie</u>. We will talk about how the character showed perseverance throughout the story and how we can relate this to our own life. We will continue working on vocabulary, the main idea in a story, and story elements. In grammar we will continue working on poetry. In math we will be counting quarters, and working on subtracting without regrouping. We will also work on addition with regrouping. In **2nd grade** we will be reading the story <u>Old Elm Speaks</u>, by Kristine George. We will also be working on poetry. We will go over lines and stanzas, as well as alliteration, ono-matopoeia, similes, repetition, and personification. We will also be learning about famous poets. In math we will create a survey, locate and graph points on a coordinate graph, and show change for a dollar. Please continue working on spelling bee words. Have a great week! – **Mrs. Thomas**

3rd/4th: Welcome back after the lovely 4-day weekend! I hope everyone was able to enjoy the time off. Our class is jumping right back into the swing of things. This week is our second week of MAP testing. We will be completing the math portion of the test. Even though it is a short week, we will have two Spelling tests on Friday. One will be over our regular words and the other will be over Spelling Bee words. Both grades will have a math test on Thursday this week. Third grade will have a Science test over chapter 16 on Friday. Study guides should have gone home last week.

5th/6th: 5th and 6th graders will be taking the Math section of the MAP test this week. Please make sure to eat a good breakfast and get plenty of sleep so you can do your best on the test! Since it is a short week, students will take their Spelling test on Friday. In Science, 5th grade will test over Ch. 17 on Friday and 6th grade will be reading about food chains and the energy pyramid. In Reading, students will present roles over parts 7 & 8 of our Lit. Circle book on Friday. In Social Studies, 5th grade will read about immigrants and the growth of cities during the Industrial Revolution and 6th grade will start a new unit on Ancient Rome. Both grades will have a label Africa test on Wednesday.

7th / 8th Grade Comm. Arts: Students will continue EOC practice this week and will continue a unit in their textbooks over argument and persuasion. We will also start a new Lit. Circle book called "The Scorch Trials" which is the second book in the Maze Runner book series. Don't forget, 4th Quarter AR Requirements are due today! Have a wonderful week! – Mrs. Foster

5/6 Math: It will be a fairly light week on new material with our math MAP tests beginning this week. Fifth grade will be working on reading and ordering decimal numbers, looking at part/whole relationships involving percentages and multiplication of decimals. Sixth grade will be working with symmetry, area of complex shapes and corresponding triangle parts. **7/8:** In math, seventh grade will estimate square roots, turning sentences into equations and transversals. In pre-algebra, students will be working on parallelogram and trapezoid area, the Pythagorean Theorem, and unit multipliers on volume problems. In grammar, both groups will be finishing reviewing complex sentences to include adjective, adverb and noun clauses and the different types of verbals. **Tests This Week: 7/8 Health: Wednesday**
