### Opportunity Quilt Update

Our quilt will be given away in a few days at the quilt show! Don't forget to bring your ticket stubs and money to the September meeting so you don't have to worry with it at the show. Ticket sales will continue during the show and we will draw the lucky winner's name at 4:00 p.m. on Saturday the 13<sup>th</sup>!

<u>Quilting Around the World</u> — We are going to take a look at other countries throughout the world as related to quilting. Who knows what we might learn! First of all, let's discover <u>INDIA!</u> In their country --

A quilt is one of the most evocative, ubiquitous metaphor and icon for conservation. It's an example of how to do more with less. All over the subcontinent, so many women, like good fakirs, have to work towards making ends meet, to do the most with the least. It's important to see a quilt as not just an artistic act, but as an act of imagination, poetry and ingenuity of skills that are inherent in the maker. The value of a quilt is determined by its need and consists of piecing together and putting all parts back into the whole, and structuring it for ongoing use. A quilt is also evocative of a goddess, Chitthriyah ki Ba. There is a temple at Bikaner that only accepts a chaadar, a quilt, as an offering. It has a spiritual value to bring all parts into the whole.

Quilting is an act that has a religious and a spiritual dimension. Why do fakirs only wear clothes that have been pieced together? Because they can live with so little; they do not waste. Why do we cremate a person? We return him to all the five elements, for a wholeness, a completeness. The patterns itself are very interesting. For instance, Kasutis in Karnataka piece together the whole quilt depending on whether it is for a child or an adult. Then they make a kind of fishbone or footsteps of a bird, which is a structural innovation that gives a spine to the whole quilt. Another beautiful emotion resonant in a quilt is "gudri ka lal", an analogy for a diamond in the rough, a child that grows up wrapped in the smell of his mother's clothes, like saris. There is a great emotional connect about a child's safe passage from a childhood of poverty to a secure adulthood. The way a woman threads a needle is her act of commitment to the progeny.

In the modern scenario, piecing together is seen as a fashion statement, a style of mix and match, but basically it is an act of very deep emotion, spirit, aesthetics and common sense. It comes from all parts of the country and has different names. It is a very important artefact that is slowly disappearing from the skill subset of the country because either people don't have time or they don't see the value in conservation. The sense of abstraction that's visible in a quilt is often asymmetrical, playing with the landscape of the mind, of geography, making deep connections with form and colour. It is very modernist, yet the most traditional. — As told to Ritika Bhatia

### Educational Corner -- Small Borders, Huge Impact By Addy Harkavy, Pinetree Quiltworks.

Ever finish a center medallion or a set of patchwork blocks and think you're ready for borders or something different but don't know quite where to go?

A very narrow strip between the central part of the quilt and the borders or additional blocks that will surround it can focus and pizzazz to your center while permitting you to change gears (a little or a lot). Solid black is often stunning, but bright and pale fabrics can work, too. The narrow band frames the center and gives the eye a break before it goes on to the next section of the quilt. It's a great way to change gears between triangles and squares or hexagons and other shapes, and it can separate one kind of blocks (e.g. Ohio Stars) from a pieced or block border (such as log cabin blocks). Such a transitional frame can be very narrow, no more than 0.5" to 0.75" works nicely in many cases.

Another way to use this technique is to finish a small quilt by using a solid border (black, for example) that's a couple of inches wide, then a very skinny contrasting border, and then another solid border that's slightly wider than the inner solid border. You could even piece a variety of bright or pale fabrics in the skinny middle strip or alternate contrasting pieces with the same color as the two wider (black in this example) borders to make a ladder or checkerboard effect.

If you're in doubt about the effect these frames would have, just fold long piece of fabric alongside your center medallion or group of blocks and play with alternatives until you find something that has the effect you're looking for.

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There will be some T-shirts available in various sizes at this month's meeting. If you don't have yours to wear during the show, see Becky to get one! We want everyone to wear them on the days of the show so that we can be easily identified. If you haven't gotten one yet, the cost is \$10.00. Members pay \$5.00 and the guild will pay \$5.00.

The quilt finally got finished in 2004, and Brenda entered it in the Quilting Across Alabama show at the Gadsden Museum of Art in 2012 where it won a Blue ribbon. Her goal for the future is to improve her piecing skills and to work on more challenging quilts. (Anyone who has seen her quilts at show and tell would say she has achieved her goal!) Her hobbies and past times, other than quilting, are collecting miniature clocks and Fabric Acquisition Road Trips.

### Lick Skillet Recipe Corner

### Basil Lemonade

½ cup sugar mixed in 1cup cold water

- 4 whole basil leaves
- 4 limes, quartered
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup sweetened condensed milk
- 4 cups cold water

Put sugar and water mixture in a small saucepan and bring to boil. Remove from heat, stir in basil and chill. When cold, pour it into blender with limes, condensed milk and 2 cups of cold water. Blend 4 seconds on high. Strain into pitcher. Rinse blender with remaining 2 cups cold water and pour through the remains in the strainer into the pitcher to get the rest of the juice. Pour mixture into glasses over crushed ice and garnish with basil or watermelon stars.

\*Watermelon Stars: Cut out stars with cutter; thread onto wooden skewers. If you freeze them, the stars will adhere to the wood and won't slide around on the skewer!

In October, we hope to get everyone back on track for the UFO challenge! We will get those updated as soon as the show is over. Those who are entering quilts that are on the UFO list need to be sure you remind Anita if you don't plan to bring them in for show and tell so you will get a ticket for them to go in the drawing.
