## The NoVA Community Resource Team (CRT)

In 2015 a cross-sector of community leaders, social service providers, and law enforcement formed CRT to jointly identify and solve community safety issues. CRT works to reduce crime, build collective efficacy, and stimulate development along the Prospect Corridor. This initiative was developed as part of the Byrne Criminal Justice Innovation (BCJI) grant, a 3-year grant from the U.S. Department of Justice received through the Kansas City No Violence Alliance (KC NoVA). Planning for the CRT began in 2013 when KC NoVA, Greater Kansas City Local Initiative Support Corporation (LISC), and seven neighborhoods surrounding Prospect Ave partnered to develop the Vision for Community Safety. This Vision identified CRT's 3 focus areas:

1. Vacant properties
2. Neighborhood beautification along Prospect
3. Attracting/building job and businesses.
