

We have decided to sell our 1955 Plymouth, so we can devote our energy and some of the "kids" inheritance over to completion of the 1949 Willys/Overland Jeepster, started in 2005. The completed rolling chassis has been located at a friends large "Man Cave" at South Head, only twenty minutes from Parakai

and all the items requiring painting, i.e. body, guards, doors etc. are currently being painted by Mark McAlpine in a stock "Jeep" colour, "Flame Red". He still hasn't been able to find the ignition electrical problem with his Triumph Speed Twin that happened on his last ride.

If any of you are working on restorations or have finished one and you don't mind sharing the story with our members please let me know.

I have been doing some work on my farm bike, a 2003 Suzuki TS 125. It's a great little bike with plenty of power and it was the first mono shock version. I have had it for 9 years and have never done any work on it, mind you it doesn't do a lot of mileage on the farm. Anyway a few weeks ago I took it down to the bottom of the farm with grand kids Riley on the back and Isabella on the front but just as we were coming back to the garage the bike died. So I decided to strip things down. I removed the tank, seat, side panels, all the electrics, handle bars, levers, all cables, exhaust, carb & air filter, mudguards, then water blasted the bike and started to de-rust everything I came across. I have repainted the frame, exhaust, air filter, handlebars, chain guard and the underneath of the tank. I have also cleaned the fuel tap, stripped down and cleaned the carb as well as the two stroke oil tank. I then put everything back together and the bike started first kick and runs well again.

#### **Our First Cars**



Our first car was Lynda's Dad's (Tom) 1962 Ford Popular 100E. Tom's Popular had clocked up100,000 miles, when he gave it to us in 1970. Tom's replacement car was a 1969 NSU 1000 Prinz just like the photo below, this had a rear air cooled 4 cylinder engine.

The photo above is of our 1962 Ford 100E Popular, in which we did a further 80,000 miles. We sold the Popular in 1978 for 50 pounds and bought a new 1978 Skoda Estelle120 LS, which had a 1200cc water cooled rear engine. At that time you could pay around two to three thousand pounds



for a second hand Ford or any other British car that was already starting to rust away. The Skoda cost us 2078 pounds and then another 50 pounds to have it undersealed. When we emigrated here in 1982 we brought the Skoda and my BSA Golden Flash with us. The only things that went wrong with the Skoda in 15 years was a broken speedo drive gear and the 2nd gear lost a couple of teeth. Finally the head gasket blew. By then the Skoda had done 97500 miles, we sold her to a Skoda enthusiast who had around 10 different Skoda's models, we got \$300 for her. See photo below.



From then onwards we had a Mazda, Subaru, Nissan, Mitsubishi, Holden and another Subaru.

Our club eligible cars are 1939 Morris 14/6, 1963 Hillman Minx series 5, 1983 Citroën GS.

#### **Covid Constructions**

One commodity that I have had lots of in the past little while has been time, so putting it to good use has been the challenge.

My mate, Lyndsay Whittle, is into trucks (that is an understatement) and he is currently restoring a six cylinder petrol 'D' Series Ford. Why he would choose to do this is a mystery to me as he has three lovely old Bedford projects sitting in the shed.

This particular model had problems with the exhaust manifold and most operators scrapped the original and fabricated a new one. Lyndsay's truck was no exception, but when he started the motor, the rusty old creation leaked like a sieve and every time we put a torch near it the holes got bigger!

Go back to early 1962 (not that long ago) and Yours Truly had bought an ex rental Mini and was dead keen to go motor racing. The little SU carb had to go and so did the restrictive cast iron exhaust manifold. My efforts at making headers for the Mini probably didn't add a lot of horsepower, but they did sound good. So, seeing that I was 'experienced', I volunteered to see what I could do for the truck.

The engine was in the truck and very inaccessible, so I started by making a jig which replicated the inlet and exhaust ports of the head and all the studs. This was made out of a chunk of 3/8" steel plate and took longer to make than the headers themselves, but I couldn't see any other accurate way. New flanges were made and bolted on to the jig and matched to the ports. Lyndsay bought a couple of mandrel formed bends (very expensive) which got us off to a good start, but the quite complex shapes required (to avoid the alternator) soon had me making 'pie cut' bends – cut out a wedge, bend and weld. My Mini headers were gas welded but now I have a Mig which I am still struggling to master on tubes. Fortunately, my skills with an angle grinder make up for my rather ugly welding.

The result is strong if not pretty and I am looking forward to a healthy burble.

## A Story from Peter Alderdice



I knew this day would come when I needed to confess that my motorcycling started on British machines. The photo to the left is of me at age 15, with my mum on the pillion outside the back door of our house in Beckenham, Christchurch. I bought my first vehicle aged 14 in partnership with a schoolmate. It was an unregistered, unwarranted Austin 7 Special. Colin Miles and I would drive this thing around after school until the day when I dropped the clutch to do a

wheelie and sheared the woodruff key on the back axle. My Dad refused to fix it and we were forced to sell. I sat my driving test the day I turned of age (15) and had a series of mopeds to go to school on. First was a Ducati Cucciolo. Then a Crescent, then a terrible device called a Piatti, made in the UK but in the shape of a torpedo. I then bought a Triumph Terrier which I thought was a motorcycle but it wasn't really. The Matchless was a 350cc single and it really gave me the freedom we all looked for at the age of 16. I had a nasty accident on the bike on the Desert Rd and ended up in Taumarunui Hospital and after recovery convinced myself that cars were the thing. I got back into bikes in 1987 when the barman at my club in Melbourne asked if I'd made any New Year's resolutions, to which I said, yep I'm going to buy an old motorbike and restore it. Oh he said, I've gone through that stage and bought an old Harley but never did anything with it. So I bought it, but left it behind when we transferred to Auckland.

I met Colin Tomkins at the Pukekohe swapmeet and he arranged for me to purchase a 1926 model J Harley Davidson from Bert Fisher. That's the bike I took back to the USA in 2003 and I finished the restoration of the 1924 Harley in 2005. Its all gone downhill from there and I can't seem to get rid of the collecting bug!
