NATURAL DISCIPLES?

WE BEGIN THIS NEW YEAR with an attempt at practicing true, authentic religion.

And so what is "true religion" you ask? At its most basic level, all true, authentic religion is what <u>moves us outside ourselves</u> (and our own egos) and connects us with God and with others. Considering the root word for "religion," Father Richard Rohr (in his classic <u>Immortal Diamond</u>) puts it this way:

Re-ligio (" rebinding, re-ligamenting") is not doing its job if it only reminds you of your distance, your unworthiness, your sinfulness, and your inadequacy before God's greatness. Whenever religion actually increases the gap, it becomes antireligion instead. I am afraid we have lots of antireligion in all denominations.



Rebinding. Re-ligamenting. <u>*Reconnecting*</u>. For several reasons, churches always seem to forget this basic purpose, this core reality. Is this because following Jesus- <u>being a disciple</u>_just does <u>not</u> come naturally to us?...

* "Following Jesus does not come naturally to us. It must be learned through a constant process of visioning, listening, communicating, and practicing. This is why the act of worship is so important. Our worship services are classrooms in which we receive a vision of God's Reign, in which we learn the words, actions, and attitudes of Christ, and in which we develop the habits that shape our lives according to Jesus' way. When we allow the habits of our worship to become the habits of our lives, we become true followers of Christ, and we enter into the abundant life that he promised."

We <u>need</u> to develop better habits, and find more abundant life! Please take some time to look up and **First John 4.20-21**; then ponder those verses for a few moments. They are very important verses for our church right now. We are in a stressful time—and the stress is taking its toll on our relationships...as stress always does.

Of course, some of this is unavoidable. We've spent over a year now in the *New Beginnings* process: we have discerned <u>a new spiritual DNA</u> for our church, and we have a *"future story"* (*VISION*) which we must work hard to live into. We have taken several key votes to begin some new initiatives, including: welcoming Head Start to SPUCC, and approving a new digital sign—which <u>has been ordered</u> and is <u>on the way</u>!

All this naturally means <u>change</u>...and change is <u>always</u> stressful. It is stressful to think about, it is stressful to plan for...and then, even when you have planned for it and are expecting it, it is still even <u>more</u> stressful when you actually start to <u>feel</u> it.

And, we most certainly are feeling it.

Furthermore, exacerbating this normal and natural stress of change is the history here at St. Paul UCC of several major traumas, several historical (and ongoing) stressful relationships...and many strong personalities. To be sure, this church is not unique in suffering from stress and trauma, in dealing with a number of unsettled relationships, in dealing with inevitable clashes between strong leaders, and in general a sense of shifting ground and anxiety. But though we are not unique in the tensions and pressures we face, we must deal with them in a way specific to our congregation's "personality" and to the "season" in which we find ourselves. What better time to ponder all this and <u>resolve to make significant positive change</u> than at the start this still young new year!?

With that in mind, we find the writer of First John powerfully reminding us about a crucial reality: <u>the way</u> <u>we treat one another is the most important consideration in our Christian life</u>. It is more important than <u>anything</u> else! It is more important than our theology, more important than any project (small or large, old or new), more important than how/what we think and our opinions, more important than church by-laws and procedures, more important than any new or continuing jobs/tasks one might be undertaking in the church...indeed <u>nothing</u> is more important in congregational life as a whole—or your individual life as a Christ follower—than how we treat each other. St. Paul, our church's namesake, puts it this way: "**Everything should be done in love**" (1 Cor. 16.14).

In order to strengthen our resolve to handle our stress more effectively, we are beginning this year (Jan-Feb) with a new group study and devotional time <u>(*it is for the WHOLE congregation*</u>). This daily devotional is called "<u>Learning to Belong.</u>"

Of course, I cannot compel all our members to take part in anything! I can only ask and encourage. We must <u>choose</u> to participate, just as we must choose how to live together in community; indeed, this is a major theme of **Learning to Belong**. One of the most astounding and eye-opening teachings from week one of the study says this: "We do not become a community once we have found healing: we are healed when we choose to be in community." At least in part, this means that our gathering as a worshipping community, done with purpose and proper perspective, makes all of us better, more whole, more healthy, and more spiritually mature. And if course, the opposite is true as well....

If you have chosen not to participate in *Learning to Belong*, or just did not get the book ordered in time, <u>it</u> <u>is not too late</u>! (call me or the church office if you need help getting a copy of the book). I still encourage you to go ahead and take on this 4-week daily devotional study for yourself. Use at your <u>own</u> pace, but by all means, use it. The more of us who are working together and learning together <u>prayerfully</u>, the more we can all look forward to a new year of greater, stronger Christian community at SPUCC. Together we must faithfully follow the biblical injunctions to love one another and treat one another with compassion, tolerance, and respect. Our future demands it. The community around us needs it. And our calling as disciples compels it.

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Will We Answer The Awesome Call? By Rev. Carl Robinson SONKA Designated Association Minister

I sometimes wonder if SONKA, the Heartland Conference (formerly the Ohio Conference), or even the United Church of Christ, is up to the challenge of repairing centuries of self-serving theology and replacing it with a theology that more faithfully reflects the calling of Jesus Christ. Can we manage the massive challenge? Will we answer the awesome call?

Let's back up a moment. Perhaps there are those who do not take it for granted, as I obviously do, that we are called in the Church to engage wholeheartedly in the mission and ministry of Jesus Christ. That ministry, to me, is more important than historic buildings, full pews, overflowing coffers. It is more than holding sacred the organizational configurations, institutional claims, or social advantages of the far and recent past. There may be those who hold these things as holy, as representative of divinity, as a link to the realm of the spiritual.

We must acknowledge that there exists among us, perhaps even as the majority of those with whom we share membership in local churches, those who honor form over function, those who see the shape, protocols, and patterns of church inner workings, as of prime importance to the calling to which the Church of Jesus Christ is called.


The crisis of today's Church has nothing to do with numbers or dollars. It has nothing to do with decades of sharp decline and loss of cultural hegemony. <u>It is, instead, a crisis of vision and purpose</u>. It is a loss of focus, where we spend our time and spiritual energy honoring the tools and trappings of ministry, while ignoring the purpose for which we have created those tools and trappings.

Jesus Christ calls us to be in allegiance with the suffering and the poor, the excluded and the rejected, the poor and the lame, the demon-possessed and the sick, the widow and the orphan, the despised, the cajoled, the blamed, the scapegoats, the refugees, the lost, and the "other." We are called to fight for their justice, peace, and equality. We are called to shape the world as a reflection of God's grace and love, exhibited most clearly in Jesus Christ. If we are not doing this work, then we are not the Church of Jesus Christ.

Are we up to the tremendous challenge of altering theological vision and redirecting spiritual energies? Can we manage the daunting call of representing Christ Jesus in and through the Church that bears his name?

We are facing the challenge and managing the call throughout SONKA. While not quite perfect, we are struggling together to focus our spiritual energies and spend our time doing that which represents the mission and ministry of Jesus Christ. We are changing. We are moving. We are progressing. I am thankful for your ministry and your service.
