Hello Sarasota Shellers!

Don't forget our trip planned for this coming Saturday, March 3rd, to Fort DeSoto Park on the south end of Pinellas County. ANY ONE can come! I didn't have a sign-up for this one at the January meeting because I forgot it. If you wish to go, just meet

me there at 8:00 am at the park gate. I believe the cost will be \$8 per vehicle to enter the park. Bring your towel, shelling gear and water shoes.

Directions: Take I-275 North across the Skyway Bridge, (the toll is \$1.50 now!) to 54th Ave S/Pinellas Bayway. This exit is on the LEFT side of the highway so make sure you are in the LEFT lane! Go left at the end of the exit and follow the Bayway until it turns left at a red light. (There will be signs for the park). You will have to go through two small toll booths between the exit and the park so have change handy. Follow Pinellas Bayway right into Fort DeSoto Park and when you get to a stop with only a left or right, GO RIGHT. Keep following it until it dead ends in a round about. Park in the last parking area by the round about. We will be able to reach both the Gulf and Bay sides of the island from this point. We can also back track a couple of lots and go to a large Gulf side area.

Olivancillaria urceus (Röding, 1798) March's Featured Shell

Our recent shell show held many surprises as I toured the exhibits and dealer tables spanning three days. A "FLS" (funny looking shell) caught my eye on SSC member's (Paul Lamb) table—it was this squatty-looking shell that fell in the olive family. Originally described as *Porphyria urceus* Röding, 1798 it is now known as *Olivancillaria urceus* (Röding, 1798). It is, of course, in the Olividae family.

This shell is known as the Pitcher Olive (Eddie Hardy in his *Internet Guide to Marine Gastropods* calls it the Bear Ancilla). I also

found it listed as Oliva cónica. It is indigenous to Brazil and Argentina. This shell measured 50 mm (it rarely gets

any bigger than 60 mm). It lives its life on sandy bottoms.


A part of the physical description in *Guide to Seashells of the World* notes: "Solid and squat. Almost flat, broad, callous spire with sharp, pointed apex and wide, deep suture. Swollen just below the suture then narrowing sharply." This certainly describes my FLS.

25 Years Ago

The regular business of the March 11, 1993 SSC meeting began with a treasurer's report that showed a balance of \$6169.32

In anticipation of a field trip to Peanut Island, it was noted that low tides were in early May.

The mini educational report was on the APAC fossil site.

The program was entitled "Miracles of the Sea."

Interesting Items in the New York Times

Below are a pair of capsule readings on articles that have appeared in the *New York Times*. Both dealing with marine invertebrates and their "eyes." Your Editor thought you might enjoy these tidbits . . .

Scallop Eyes

Do the scallops have eyes? Sort of—*The New York Times* (11/30/17) ran a story by Carl Zimmer entitled: "The Scallop Sees with Space-Age Eyes—Hundreds of them." The story goes to say:

It's hard to see what's so special about a scallop. It looks a lot like a clam, mussel or any other bivalve. Inside its hinged shell lurks a musclebound creature that's best enjoyed seared in butter. But there's something more to this ubiquitous entree: the scallop sees its world with hundreds of eyes. And so on . . .



It is important to know that the scallop eyes detect motion and light changes but are not eyes like we have/know them. Attached is a screenshot that details the many eyes of the scallop.

"Starfish See Pretty Well in Deep Ocean By the Way, Starfish Have Eyes

In the February 7, 2018 edition of the *New York Times*, Joanna Klein authored an article dealing with the way starfish (*sea stars—ED*) can see, deep in the ocean.

Hundreds of feet below the ocean's surface, some starfish make their own light. And they can look right back at you too, with a teeny eye on the tip of each bendy starfish arm.

The article went on to say that scientists:

sampled 13 species of starfish, which were representative of the diverse ecologies of underwater life. They found that all but one species that burrows in the ocean's sediments had eyes. Two from the deep glowed in the dark. One, "Novodinia americana," had a whole body that lit up when stimulated, and its eyes, with bigger pupils, were capable of detecting even sharper images than their shallow water relatives.




