1st/2nd: I hope everyone had a fun and safe Halloween. This week first grade will be working more on word endings and their spelling words will be their numbers. They will also be working on how plants grow in science. They have a math test today and will have a spelling test on Friday. Second grade will continue learning new spelling patterns this week with "wh" and "ph" being emphasized. They will also be beginning a new science unit this week on how living things grow in different ways. They will have a math test on Thursday and a spelling test on Friday. – Mrs. Hird

7/8: In social studies, 7th grade will be moving from learning about ancient Greece to ancient Rome. In eighth grade, students are continuing to study about the unrest between England and the English colonists. In math, seventh grade is learning about computing with decimals including decimal divisors and sales tax. In pre-algebra, students are working on more difficult part/whole problems and surface area of more complex 3-dimensional objects. In algebra, we are working on factoring out the greatest common factor of algebraic expressions and various rules for exponents. **Tests this** Week: 7th & 8th Social Studies: Tuesday, 7th Science: Wednesday, 8th Science: Thursday 5/6 Math: In fifth grade, students are working with polygon characteristics and strategies for comparing fractions. In sixth grade, students are continuing with decimal-percent-fractions conversions, expanded notation of decimals, and circumference. **Tests this Week:** 6th Math: Tuesday, 5th Math: Friday - Mr. Ewing

Bystanders are the key to preventing and stopping bullying. When those nearby do nothing, bullies often feel encouraged to continue (or increase) their bullying. If you see someone being bullied, here's how you can help.

- 1) Tell the bully to stop what he/she is doing. How this is best done depends on the situation and the people involved. It may take something as simple as, "Hey, Jake, come on, leave him alone."
- 2) Ask the person who is being bullied to walk away with you and your friends.
- 3) If it seems dangerous to step in, or if you don't feel comfortable saying anything, talk to the student who was being bullied later. Let him/her know that you are sorry for what happened and offer your support.
- 4) Report any bullying you witness in school to a teacher, counselor or principal.

MASKS: All students and staff must wear masks beginning Tuesday, 11/2, so only sick students and staff must miss school due to a close contact at school.

Good morning,

As of today, October 27, 2021, the following is the updated guidance that Bates County Health Center will recommend for quarantine for community and K-12 settings, which are within the CDC, DESE/DHSS guidance:

Household and community close contacts:

*Quarantine may end after Day 10 (released on Day 11) after last contact/exposure with a positive case if no symptoms have been noted. We will begin the 10-day quarantine period today with any new contacts received. Any close contacts that have already been given the 14-day quarantine period will remain on the 14 day until staff is able to review each case—if the individual may return sooner, the school & the parent will be notified.

Schools have the option to accept the following:

*Test to Stay for K-12 classroom settings may be chosen by school districts as this would keep students in class as well as being monitored. Unfortunately, this option does NOT apply to preschool so they would be on the new 10-day quarantine. Any school that plans to implement Test to Stay should contact us so we are aware and can assure consistency for students/staff/teachers/district.

The following will not have to quarantine if they are close contacts of a household or community positive case:

*Individuals that are fully vaccinated -

*Individuals that have had a positive PCR or antigen test within the last 90 days (no home tests accepted)

*Individuals within the school setting that have a mask mandate policy in place that is being followed

Persons who test positive should not be in school until cleared by local health department. Persons who develop symptoms of COVID-19 need to test and isolate and not be at school or around others.

Individuals exposed in this category not participating in a test to stay program will need to quarantine at home.



Can participate in extracurricular activities, under specific testing protocols. Quarantine outside of school setting. Monitor for symptoms for 14 days.
