Bethel Shotokan Karate Club

As part of ISKF Alaska Region's 25th year celebration, this month we will highlight the Bethel Shotokan Karate Club headed by Sensei Ted Berry.

The Bethel Club was accepted into the ISKF in January. The dojo is located in Mikelnguut Elitnaurviat Elementary School gym (M.E. for short) and training is on Mondays and Wednesdays (6 pm juniors, 7 p.m. seniors) and Saturdays (10:30 and 11:30). Visitors are definitely encouraged.

The club has humble beginnings. In October 2006, after a break of 4 years, Sensei Ted Berry (1st Kyu) started training on his own in his original style (ShoKu-Kai). He was trained in Cairns, Australia, under Sensei Matsumoto on and off for twenty-five years. People would walk past the M.E. gym and say things like, "if you ever decide to teach, let me know." Ted's wife, Pam Lau, was the first to join him. By the end of last summer there were a handful of adults training with Ted and the style had changed to Shotokan. Ted had been in contact with Sensei Pat Andrews (5th Dan) and was greatly impressed with his technique and style. After Ted returned from the summer camp at Eagle River, sempais Andrew Stemp, Myrna Peter and Pam Lau met and decided to form a Shotokan club and open up enrollment to students. Andrew has been admirably assisting teaching basic kihon ever since. Pam is also a great help, especially with the younger students.

The enthusiasm from the community is a welcome bonus that we did not expect. Bethel, population about 6000, is unique among US cities in that it is 400 miles off the road system and to get around the area we use the rivers as ice roads in the winter and for boats in the summer. We also use snow machines and, of course, light planes, weather permitting. Even though Bethel is a hub for all the surrounding villages, there are only four grocery stories, a couple of quick stop shops and no shopping malls. There are plenty of open spaces for snow machine riding, hunting and fishing; however, there are virtually no recreation opportunities for young people such as skating rinks, bowling alleys, movie theaters and so on. There are boys and girls Scouts and a Judo club; other



than that, there is not that much for young people to do, especially the boys. Even in temperatures in the - 30° s and -40° s with a wind chill down to -70° , student still come to training.

There is tremendous parents support for this program. We have a monthly meeting where parents and club members brainstorm fund raising, ideas and form committees for various activities. At Christmas we had a celebration attended by parents, friends and community members. Students demonstrated what they had learned and we had a Japanese feast and Japanese arts and crafts. The parent involvement was the key to the success of the function.

Saturday the 16th of February was a day we had been looking forward to for some time - Sensei Pat Andrew's visit. He was busy the minute he set foot here. He led both junior and senior sessions and in the afternoon mentored us on various karate issues and the upcoming tournament. His workshop was invaluable and inspirational. Even though he was here for one day, his teaching lingered on long after his visit... well, the videos helped.

Two weeks after Sensei Pat left, we had our own tournament. From the process, we selected four members to go to the March 29 State tournament in Anchorage. Currently we are busy doing fund raising for the airfare to Anchorage is about \$540 each person. The rest of the club will, on the same weekend, provide a kata and kumite demonstration at the Camai Festival in Bethel. The Festival is famous throughout this area and brings dancers and performers from all over the world to dance and to perform various movement, music and dramatic arts.

Right now we are all white belts with the exception of Sempai Andrew Stemp (7th Kyu) and Sensei Ted Berry (1st Kyu). However, what we lack in rank, we make up in ambition and enthusiasm. Please visit us when you are in Bethel.

Sensei of these sessions will be Sensei Nakazawa, Andrews and Jones. The focus will be on advanced kihon, kata and kumite. If you have any questions please see your instructor.

The Way Continues excerpt by Sensei Catherine Pinch

In this newsletter we are pleased to again have a short article by Sensei Catherine Pinch, 6th Dan. Sensei Pinch is close to publishing her book about Master Yaguchi <u>The Way Continues</u>. In this issue of the newsletter, Ms. Pinch presents an excerpt from her forthcoming book. Below Master Yaguchi is relating a story about how Master Okazaki injured his knee:

Some of the people I trained and competed with back then were amazing athletes. Teruyuki Okazaki, who is now the Chief Instructor of the ISKF in the United States, was at the time a true

phenomenon. Normally, when I sparred with someone, I could read body movements and anticipate the technique my opponent planned to use. Most people make subtle movements with their bodies when they are going to kick, and you can tell what they will do just by watching for them to telegraph their intentions. However, with Okazaki Sensei, there would be absolutely no warning. We would be facing each other, moving around and looking for an opening, and suddenly *Whack!* A foot would land on the top of my head, the side of my face, or somewhere else on my body. No matter how hard I tried, I could never see it coming. He was equally good, fast and powerful with both sides of his body. He seemed to have no weaknesses. His punches and strikes were blindingly fast and strong. He did not specialize in any one technique – he could do everything better than anyone else.

One time, Mr. Okazaki was showing a young student how to make a correct front snap kick to reach someone who was a long distance away. He went into front stance, and then kicked forward very hard with his back leg. There was a "pop," and Okazaki went down, clutching his knee. Those of us watching thought he was joking, and we laughed, "Get up, Sempai! Quit fooling around!"

Mr. Okazaki got very angry – he was really injured. When we realized he wasn't joking, we quickly took him to a doctor. The doctor, after looking his knee, told him he had broken a tendon behind his knee. The doctor asked, "How in the world did you do this to your knee?" We told the doctor what had happened, and showed him how Okazaki had been moving when he injured himself. The doctor didn't believe us. "There is no way this massive type of injury could have happened the way you are describing. Something had to have hit his knee. Just moving the knee like that would never have the kind of force required to separate that tendon like that." We protested that it had, and that Mr. Okazaki was a special case, but I don't know if that doctor ever believed us. His knee was still broken at the time of Sensei Funakoshi's funeral.
