I'm so very thankful for I have received two huge blessings over the last several months. I have been so blessed to receive the gift of vision. On October 20, 2021, I received a donor corneal transplant in my right eye. On March 2nd, 2022, I was so blessed again to receive a donor corneal transplant in my left eye. When the doctor first told me I was going to need a corneal transplant in not one but both eyes of course I became very emotional, and it has definitely been a journey. I have 12 stitches in my right eye (had 16 but have had four removed). In my left eye I still have the 16 stitches. My right eye that I had done in October has crystal clear vision with no correction. When I went back for the follow up on my left eye a couple of weeks ago the doctor said when you follow back up in six weeks on your left eye we are going to remove the rest of your stitches on your right side and your vision will become even more clear. When I got up to the front desk to check out the lady said your next appointment is scheduled for May 9th. I sat there for a moment and tears started streaming down my face. May 9th will be one year exactly after the loss of my Dad. He would be so excited to know about the progress in my surgery and vision journey.

One day at a time on this journey of life. I have to remind myself of this every day. I also thank God each day for my many blessings. I pray for the two families of the donors that lost their loved ones and donated my new corneas to bless someone else's life. So very sorry for your loss. Thank you does not seem enough to say to

express my feelings of gratitude. I appreciate all the prayers and words of encouragement through this journey. My left eye continues to heal and eye drops will be part of my life forever now. Currently about 15 drops a day.

I'm an organ / tissue donor. Thankful and so blessed. Sorry for long post. My journey. I could not have done this without my Lord and Savior Jesus Christ or my precious husband Dwayne Scoggins. He has taken such great care of me and been there for me through every step. Thankful for Dr. Griffith and Southern Eye. My entire precious and wonderful family, including our amazing church family and friends. Although my Dad is no longer here on earth, he has been with me in my heart through every step. I'm thankful for my many blessings and also the challenges that make me stronger. God always has me in his hands therefore I will not be weary or afraid. Just when I feel like throwing in the towel my Savior gives me strength to keep going always.


