I attended the Justice, Peace and Compassion conference and learned how to identify an injustice, and then work with the community to develop a plan of action to address the injustice. Once a plan is agreed upon then we need to implement the action plan and periodically evaluate if the plan is effective or not. I also stayed over for Sunday's Culturally Proficient Leadership Education hosted by Presbyterian Women; the study guide "Radical Hospitality" will be available from the resources table at the fall gathering. Mission Matters

Are we making progress in creating the kingdom of God in the world? One wonders if we are even making progress in bringing all peoples and lands into a modern or "civilized" and ethical age, regardless of their faith. The following quote was taken from The Hunger Site (The Greater Good Network) on July 11, 2013:

Women around the world live in constant fear of death by burning, decapitation, stoning, or acid attacks for dishonoring their family. "Dishonorable" acts can be simple exercises of free will: marrying the man of their choice, divorcing abusive husbands, or unacceptable dress. They are even murdered for actions beyond their control, including rape.

A Pakistani mother recently doused her 15-year-old daughter with acid for allegedly looking at a boy. She died slowly after suffering agonizing burns to 70% of her body. This is the latest example of a chilling, global phenomenon that arose from the cultural commodification of women and is reinforced by misguided concepts of honor. It's estimated that as many as 5,000 women are killed by members of their own families annually.

Such "honor killings" are as abominable as trafficking. If you cannot be safe from harm committed by your own family, especially by your own mother, how can you be safe anywhere in the world-much less reach for your own goals and potential? We need to make ourselves heard at every forum where action can be taken and awareness raised, whether at the United Nations (its Commission on the Status of Women, the Office of the High Commissioner on Refugees, and all its other bodies) or within our own government. Please pray for women who fall victims of such acts and consider how we might be better advocates for them, given that they cannot always do so themselves.

Many of us heard mission co-workers Rev. Richard and Marilyn Hansen speak at the Summer Gathering at Massanetta. Rev. Hansen teaches in the Ethiopian Graduate School of Theology, and Mrs. Hansen teaches English, leads Bible study, and works with various entities in the country's capital. She spoke of the Addis Ababa Fistula Hospital, which works to heal women who have suffered this childbirth injury and are left incontinent and physically and psychologically impaired. The group listening to her speak was horrified at the extent of this problem, but heartened at the work this hospital is doing-it is the only one in the world devoted to care of these women, and it teaches surgical and care techniques to local medical providers. I commend it to you, and hope you will pray for the work being done there and consider other support: http://www.hamlinfistula.org/our-hospital/history.html


