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"EXPONENTIAL HOPE" [PART ONE]

HAPPY 2018!! Did you make a "resolution" to start this new year? I did...but more on that later! Stick with me—this is a long column, but it's what God is all over me (dagnab it!) to put out here.

An old friend of mine posted online the other day that her new year's resolution was to read 52 books in 2018 (of any type/subject)—an average of one new book per week! This woman helps pastor a local church <u>and</u> works as a professor at a seminary; she therefore has a <u>lot</u> of "work" reading to get done every week. So, her taking on that weekly reading challenge quite impressed me!

I don't average a book a week—might try it sometime! But, I am almost always reading several books at once. My bedside table always has three or four (or more) books on it. Right now, as the new year begins, I am hooked into two new books. One, a Christmas gift from my step-daughter, has the ominous title <u>Christianity After Religion: The End of Church and the Birth of a New Spiritual Awakening</u> by Diana Butler Bass. The second one is an e-book which I recently purchased online: <u>Dream Chasers: Immigration and the American Backlash</u> by John Tirman. Both are nonfiction books. Butler Bass is an historian and prolific author, focusing on the history of Christianity, and she is a leading voice in progressive Christianity, American religion and culture. I try to pay attention to most of what she writes. Tirman is a new author for me; he is Executive Director & Principal Research Scientist of the Center for International Studies at MIT, and has written 14 books (<u>Dream Chasers</u> is the most recent).

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Also on my "current read" list is a book I borrowed electronically via *Hoopla* from the Cincinnati Public Library (need to re-borrow it because I didn't get it finished!): <u>The End of White Christian America</u>, by Robert P. Jones (CEO of the Public Religion Research Institute). Also ominous sounding!

In addition to sounding ominous, the titles of these books are rather <u>startling</u>—especially for us church folk! The <u>end</u> of the Church?...and of White Christian America? Wow. Really?? Heavy, <u>scary</u> stuff!

They deal head on with common perceptions vs. reality, <u>fear</u>, and <u>hope</u>. They deal with the <u>unavoidable</u> fact that our world and our culture have gone (and are still going) through enormous, unsettling, history-making, ground-breaking, tradition-shattering, institution-ending <u>CHANGE</u>.

All three of these books address the END of white Protestant-dominated culture in the U.S.

9:50 AM Traditional Worship in Sanctuary Sunday School The end of WASP America...the end of WASP's (and WAC's—white American Catholics, my own term) long reign of both formally and informally "running the show"...since before America was an independent nation. For almost 400 years, since the Mayflower made landfall at Plymouth Rock, WASP's—especially WASP males—have been establishing the moral bedrock and holding/managing the moral compass for our country...along with running almost all of its institutions: business/industry, religion, education medicine, the press...you name it. WASP males, like me, have been "large and in charge."

But indisputably, undeniably, and inevitably, that is all changing.

Butler Bass calls this "exponential" change...change that is rapid, that is increasing, and is increasingly rapid! She writes in her blog (about the time Christianity After Religion came out):

"Something startling is happening in American religion: we are witnessing the end of church or, at the very least, the end of conventional church. The United States is fast-becoming a society where Christianity is being reorganized after religion" [https://www.huffingtonpost.com/diana-butler-bass/the-end-of-church_b_1284954.html].

And Jones says that, especially since the 1990's, America is no longer demographically or culturally a majority white, Christian nation. Census data and demographic research seem to bear this out:

America is getting more diverse every year. By mid-century, it looks as if the United States may become a majority-minority nation, a place where whites make up less than half the population — while African-Americans, Asians, Hispanics, and other minority groups together account for slightly more. [Evan Horowitz, February 26, 2016 at bostonglobe.com].

And Tirman (who is not at all religious)? His book is summarized thus by its publisher (emphasis mine):

Illegal immigration continues to roil American politics. The right-wing media stir up panic over "anchor babies," job stealing, welfare dependence, bilingualism, al-Qaeda terrorists disguised as Latinos, even a conspiracy by Latinos to "retake" the Southwest. State and local governments have passed more than 300 laws that attempt to restrict undocumented immigrants' access to hospitals, schools, food stamps, and driver's licenses. Federal immigration authorities stage factory raids that result in arrests, deportations, and broken families -- and leave owners scrambling to fill suddenly open jobs. The DREAM Act, which would grant permanent residency to high school graduates brought here as minors, is described as "amnesty." And yet polls show that a majority of Americans support some kind of path to citizenship for those here illegally. What is going on?...Tirman shows how the resistance to immigration in America is more cultural than political. Although cloaked in language about jobs and secure borders, the cultural resistance to immigration expresses a fear that immigrants are changing the dominant white, Protestant, "real American" culture.

Of course, <u>any</u> kind of change brings fear, especially fear of the unknown. But this kind of <u>exponential</u> change? This kind of social paradigm shift? As Tirman, and the other two authors both note, it surely brings <u>huge</u> amounts of fear and dread...exponential fear!

Especially to the people in charge: we WASP's. And most of all to WASP males. Like me.

But you know what? I am not afraid; not in the slightest.

Oh, to be sure I certainly do <u>struggle</u>, almost constantly it seems, with the <u>consequences</u> of this radical, exponential change in culture. As a minister of the Church, watching the very institution crumble which is his meal ticket? That is disconcerting, to say the least! To have watched, from the inside, of both the local church and the regional/denominational level how we have DWINDLED horrifically, and lost almost ALL our influence (not to mention money and political clout) in my lifetime—this is gut-wrenching, and disorienting. So much so, that sometimes I <u>envy</u> my retired colleagues! It is frustrating, often <u>wearying</u>, to daily, weekly, monthly, annually battle the effects of "exponential change," especially in the Church.

The Church, by the way, and in case you hadn't noticed, is an <u>innately conservative institution</u> that does not much like change, of <u>any</u> kind!—and that, also by the way, is not necessarily to mean "politically" conservative, but by definition: holding to traditional attitudes and values and cautious about change or innovation, typically in relation to politics or religion (Google Online dictionary).

But given all that, I repeat: <u>I AM NOT AFRAID</u>...of the end of the Church, of white Christian America, of WASP dominion, or any related "end." And here's why...

"Exponential change creates exponential fear along with exponential hope" (Butler Bass, p. 6).

The old-school way of saying that is "you can't make an omelet without breaking a few eggs."

You see, change is necessary...even <u>vital</u>. We literally can't leave home without it. Without change there is no LIFE. Without adaptation there is only staleness, *rigor mortis*, death. Without new air exchanged for old in your lungs, you would not be here. Without taking in nutritious food and eliminating wastes—which once <u>were</u> good food and, that after use, the remnants become detrimental to the whole of your body (even poisonous)...again, you'd die. So it is with culture, with institutions...even with (especially with?) the Church. So, I am not afraid of change. I even embrace, as your pastor, the role of <u>change agent</u>.

And I am not afraid of the future because I trust that God works for good in all things for those who love God (Rom. 8.28)—and who radically trust God. And, I believe perfect love—God's love—casts out all fear (1 John 4.18). Further, I trust in/believe Jesus when he says "whoever seeks to save their lives will lose them, but whoever who give up their lives for me and for the gospel will save them" (Mark 8.35).

A few weeks ago I mentioned in a sermon that we are in a time of great reformation—great change—and that this has happened regularly, repeatedly every 500 years throughout recorded human history (see Phyllis Tickle's ground-breaking work The Great Emergence—which is on my "to read ASAP" list!). Halfway through and then again at the turn of every millennium, there is a "massive transition;" this transition—I like to call it a paradigm shift—is always many decades, even a century or two, or three, in the making. We are in such a time right now—and these times always bring a certain social chaos.

YET—remember, there is no life, only death, without change. No new wine contained in old wine skins.

Member and Friends of St. Paul UCC... <u>PERHAPS WE NEED TO LOOK AT CHANGE</u> a bit differently. All of it, at every level. Butler Bass says (again my emphasis):

This awakening has been under way for some time and has reached a crucial stage, as a new "Age of the Spirit" has dawned. Theologian Harvey Cox points out that this turn toward spirituality" as the new form of faith started in the previous century. The 1970s were a significant period in a long process of moving away from old-style religion toward new patterns of faith. In the last decade, this shift has accelerated exponentially, sweeping millions more into both discontent and the longing for change.... Exponential change creates exponential fear along with exponential hope. Massive transformation creates the double-edged cultural sword of decline and renewal. Exponential change ends those things that people once assumed and trusted to be true. At the same time, upheaval opens new pathways to the future. Change is about endings and beginnings and the necessary interrelationship between the two. Most people accept that technology, politics, and social conditions change. But many also think that religion will shield them from the consequences of change in these secular arenas. Others think that a return to the "faith of our fathers" will slow or stop worrisome or unwanted social change. Neither of these perspectives is true. Faith can neither insulate from nor prevent change. Instead, faith is swept up in the waves of global change, as every aspect of human experience is undergoing profound rearrangement. In some arenas of contemporary life, especially in Africa and South America, religion is actually leading other sorts of change. Religion rarely protects people from change. Perhaps a call to return to older forms of faith may delay change—only, however, in the way that Roman persecutions slowed the spread of Christianity or late medieval inquisitions turned back the advance of Protestantism. History teaches that the "faith of our fathers" may have won some battles, but has lost many a war.....Will there still be Christianity after the end of institutional religion? Yes, there will be. But it is going to be different than what Americans have known, a faith responsive to the longings of those who are expecting more spiritual depth and greater ethical integrity rather than more conventional church. Indeed, I suspect that the end of church is only the beginning of a new Great Awakening.

Bottom line time: as servant disciples of Jesus, we need not, MUST NOT be afraid of what the future will bring. This "great emergence," or "age of the Spirit," whatever you want to call it, must be seen as an <u>OPPORTUNITY</u> for St. Paul UCC. Should we <u>grasp</u> this opportunity and shift our view of change, I believe great things are ahead for us. Should we miss—or ignore—this opportunity, well, to use that "body" analogy again, the air will go out of our lungs, and we'll be full of, uh, crap. And, Lord knows, there's already way to much of that in our culture and social discourse today.

Last, for my <u>new year's resolution</u>: I resolve from now on to ceaselessly preach <u>exponential hope</u>. I will not let myself—nor our church, its leaders, its members, or any part of it—become sidelined, disillusioned or hamstrung by fear. I will tirelessly seek to <u>banish</u> fear from our common life! I will engage in better physical and spiritual discipline for myself, in order to be strong with the Spirit and up for this task...and I will not stop urging, cajoling, inducing the same for your lives.

When those disheartening, disorienting times happen, I will pray more, and tell you about it—TRUSTING that you, learning to embrace change, trust deeply in God, and let go of fear, will partner with me for a "great emergence" here at SPUCC.

And Vision Team...get ready. Your time has COME.
