What's your Super Bowl?

I've been caught up in the NFL playoffs and it's been wonderfully enjoyable. The Cincinnati Bengals hadn't won a playoff game in 31 years, and all of a sudden, they've won two in a row, despite their quarterback spending quite a bit of time getting knocked over. By the time this is issued, the Bengals will have either had their run ended or will be headed to the Super Bowl, the pinnacle of NFL, the game towards which every snap, every play, every hit, is aiming. Everyone wants to make it to the Super Bowl -- there is no greater game if you're a football player. Even people who never watch football will gather to watch the Super Bowl, even if it is only for the commercials (rumored to be \$6.5MM for a 30-second spot in 2022). When you watch the Super Bowl, you should be watching people at their peak, people who have achieved the greatest height of the game.

Most of us will never play in the Super Bowl. But what's your Super Bowl? What does it look like for you to reach the pinnacle? Are you striving to reach the peak? When it comes to discipleship, it's easy to settle into a rut and do what we did the day before, but what if you approached your spiritual life with the goal of growing every day, of striving to reach the absolute pinnacle of your spiritual potential? How would you train? Paul talks about this in 1 Timothy 4 when he talks about how physical training has some value, but Godliness is of value in every way. Are you training for Godliness? Are you reaching? I think the Holy Spirit is calling each of us to take the next step, although that next step is different for each of us. Reaching for ideas? Isaiah 52:7-10 - English Standard Version (from Keith's daily Bible Study through email)

7 How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of him who brings good news, who publishes peace, who brings good news of happiness, who publishes salvation, who says to Zion, "Your God reigns." 8 The voice of your watchmen—they lift up their voice; together they sing for joy; for eye to eye they see the return of the Lord to Zion. 9 Break forth together into singing, you waste places of Jerusalem, for the Lord has comforted his people; he has redeemed Jerusalem. 10 The Lord has bared his holy arm before the eyes of all the nations, and all the ends of the earth shall see the salvation of our God.

What are you waiting for?

In some way, we're all waiting for something, be it someone or some event or some gift or some promotion. We're all waiting for something, and we invest countless hours thinking about how receiving that thing will change our lives. We spend much of our lives waiting, and it's so easy to invest so deeply in what we're waiting for that we can miss out on our current lives!

In the meantime, we're also waiting for God's Kingdom to come in fullness, and as we wait, we do so with such anticipation, such joy, that it should enrich our lives now, because it's active waiting. The joy we have in knowing that God's Kingdom will come, the confidence in knowing that all things will be set right, should prevent us from despair and give us hope that we can share, knowledge that we don't have to cling to what we have but can rather spread our blessings to others. The hope we have as we wait for the good news allows us to spread the good news while we wait! As we wait, we can break forth into singing now, that the world may be enriched as we wait, as we love, as we serve.

Our pantry is open from 12:00 - 1:30 the last two consecutive Tuesdays and Wednesdays of the month. Help us on Mid Ohio food delivery days. This happens on the first or second Thursday of most months. The truck leaves the pallets outside our parking lot entrance door. Volunteers carry the boxes down the stairs. Some boxes can be slid down a ramp. Some can ride down the chair lift. All require some lifting. It takes around an hour to get the job done. Using Hydrogen Peroxide: Deep Clean Your Cutting Board-Just wipe the board down with hydrogen peroxide every not and then followed by a sponge and it'll be as good as new. Clean Your Washing Machine -run a hot cycle after putting a cup of hydrogen peroxide in the detergent compartment. Be Very Careful With This One-Use this trick for a maximum of one time per week: swish some hydrogen peroxide in your mouth for approximately 30 sec, then spit it all out. Be very careful not to swallow any! Help Sprout Seeds-soak them in the chemical (just a little, around 3%) for around 20 min. If you forgot, just spray the damp soil with hydrogen peroxide, but make sure the water to chemical ratio is around 32:1. Wash Your Veggies- Use around ¹ / ₄ cup of 3% hydrogen peroxide per gallon of water to soak your vegetables. This will not only kill the bacte- ria but extend their shelf life. Treat Your Acne And	

Blemishes- Put a small amount of hydrogen peroxide on a cotton swab, and dab it gently on the area where you have a breakout. It should help subdue the pimple by killing the bacteria. **Turn Your Mirrors Squeaky Clean-** Just spray some onto a damp tissue or towel and clean your mirror the same way you usually would. **Reduce Canker** Just swish a tablespoon of it around in your mouth for around 10 minutes, as you would to whiten your teeth. After 10 minutes, spit it out and your swelling should subside significantly due to the disinfectant. Again, be very careful not to ingest the hydrogen peroxide - it's very dangerous.
