

She left Africa for a better life, and after traveling America, realized that it was a dangerous jungle - too dangerous to have a family that lives. When Layla came to Maui, she found her peaceful place, but coping in a place where she felt so alone was harsh. Layla ran.

Running gave her a way to process all that was going on inside her, and the discipline to hardness what needed to come out. Firmly rooted in the concept that We are our brethren's keeper, Layla used her running as a tool to find her strength, resilience, and a plan.
