From the Registrar

Hi Everyone.

Registrations of last year's foal are now taking place. It's business as usual for registrations and if you have any questions about names or what's permitted please contact me.

If you are micro chipping, please include a photo of the reader over the insertion point of the chip. This will give us an indication of where the chip is on your Shetland. We recommend that everyone micro chipping buy their own Universal Micro Chip Reader. It would be impractical for the Society to buy one & ship it around the country as some have suggested. I'm not sure it would survive the post.

If you are showing your foal, please make sure you foal record, so we know the sire & dam. Show Secretaries will query some entries with us. The form is available on the website or you can email me.

Spring has well and truly arrived and, depending on where you are in the country, Covid levels (soon to be traffic light statuses) are allowing some level of showing. With this in mind, here are some key dates that will be important to know – subject to Covid status on the date:

- 25th Annual Shetland Show 15th January 2022, at Ellesmere A&P Showgrounds, Leeston, Canterbury. Schedule will be up on Show Day online: www.showdayonline.com keep an eye on the Shetland Society Facebook Page. Our show schedule and entries will be accessible using this platform from November, 2021. There was an oversight with our booking which led to us losing our normal date. We have booked and secured our show date for 2023 and have the last weekend of January tagged for future Shetland Shows. The Ellesmere Show grounds is a wonderful venue with great facilities for us to hold our 25th Annual Show. We are planning this show with Level 2 in mind, just in case, so camping overnight is still available but we won't have shared food at lunch time. It will be a case of bring your lunch and eat while we are having the prizegiving. We will have Prize giving promptly at the completion of classes to accommodate harness competitors who are double booked at another event due to the change of date.
- 2022 AGM date will be the weekend 28th and 29th May. Details are yet to be confirmed but please put that date
 in your diary.

- New Zealand Summer Spectacular, Canterbury Agricultural Park Friday 26th to Sunday 28th November. Entries Close 20th November

Llewellyn Holly 291NZ

So often we hear talk about how great a stallion is and how well his progeny has performed and not much is said about the other side of the equation – the mare.

The mare, I have to say in the "Me Too Movement" times we live in, does the majority of the work and every now and then a great mare comes into your life.

I'd have to put Llewellyn Holly 291NZ in this category (Sire: Fenwick Aniseed (Imp Aust) 73NZ Dam: Llewellyn Tenacity 35NZ)

Holly was born on Christmas Eve and came into my life in October

1999. Diana Humphries

let me know that Lesley was selling a 2 year old filly that would be a great asset. I looked at the stud book & thought this one is for me. Coming from Llewellyn where there were only black ponies, she took a

while to settle amongst all the other colours I had.

Holly was shown as a 3 year old and won Young stock of the Year and the following year (2001-2002) won Shetland Pony of the Year. Holly loved all the bathing & preening for a show and would grow a few inches in the show ring especially if there was any applause. She still loves to be groomed and fussed over.

Her last foal Duncree Hickory Harlowe is just coming up 11 months old and is the last one of that cross. It was hard winter here in Canterbury after a drought, so this winter Holly who is now 24 years old had a cover and extra hard feed.

"The Mighty Malcolm"

The Mighty Malcolm sounds like the next super hero from the Marvel Movies, but he's a very clever Shetland pony who really does everything he is asked to do.

Malcolm is Llewellyn Checkmate 691NZ, a black gelding standing at 9.1hh. His Sire is Llewellyn Moritz 423NZ and his Dam is Glentare Bobo 285NZ. He was bred by Lesley and Paul Lewis of the Llewellyn stud and was born on 11th October, 2007. He was Glentare Bobo's last foal.





"I saw Malcolm when he was just a wee fella and was keen to have him, but he was promised to Malcolm Gallagher, but he changed his mind, so I got another Shetland pony", says Jean, "The name Malcolm just sort of stuck with him".

Jean has three other Shetland ponies (Beau, Rohan & CJ), a donkey (Nutkin) and a mini (El Nino). Malcolm was started in harness in 2013 and Jean did most of the work herself with the help of her friend Jenny Brown. Jean said it was like he

was born to be a harness pony.

"I can get him out of the paddock after a few weeks off, put the cart on and off we go without any fuss", says Jean. "He really is a go anywhere pony with an easy going nature"

As well as competing in harness competitions and doing a bit of in hand showing, Malcolm has done three Cavalcades and will do the 2022 Cavalcade. He has also driven the Otago Rail Trail, so his little hooves have travelled guite a few hundred



kilometres. He was the NZSPBS Harness Pony of the Year in the 2019/2020 season. Jean & Malcolm are now enjoying competing in the Pleasure Harness at local A&P shows.

His latest competition was the Christchurch Carriage Driving Society Inc. Show where he won Open Champion Shetland and Jean won Best Whip, which was a real highlight.



Malcolm lives at Selwyn Cottage on State Highway One on the banks of the Selwyn River. just past the Selwyn River Bridge between Dunsandel and Norwood. Selwyn cottage was built in 1865 and is category 5 Heritage Listed. It has been in Jean's family since 1933 when it was bought by her grandparents. The river has come close to the cottage in 2000 and 2021. It's never been flooded out in its 156 years but the water has come up to the back door step. "We got evacuated during the floods in May of this year and we are still finding all sorts of things that got washed across the property by the river", says Jean. "It was a bit of a worry to leave the ponies but we knew they were on the highest ground and would be safe".

Jean is retired now after working in messes at the Burnham Military Camp, which means she now has more time for Shetland ponies, her dogs and her garden.

Jean's Rough Coated Collie Amber, usually rides in the cart with Jean on her trips around the local roads. Jean uses an open bridle (no blinkers). "We meet all sorts of traffic out there from tractors with implements to milk tankers", says Jean. "Malcolm just goes from my voice and does so much for me. It's just beautiful and I'm lucky to have him in my life".

He really is The Mighty Malcolm.



This filly certainly has a survival story. When she was just a few hours old we noticed her breathing was very laboured that became progressively worse. The first vet diagnosed her as having a crushed oesophagus, she was given medication to help her breath. Day 2 our beautiful foal wasn't any better and just able to drink, hearing her trying to breath was horrendous and the medication wasn't working she was struggling to live. The day she was born we noticed the amount of milk that poured out of the mare when the foal went to drink, it was like someone had turned on the tap, we were sure the foal had inhaled milk into her lungs. It was a very bleak outlook for the foal. On advice from another vet we took the mare and foal into the Canterbury Equine clinic, the foal was placed on oxygen over two days and was treated for pneumonia. Our beautiful foal responded to the treatment thankfully and improved every day with the follow up medication we gave her back home. She is now back to perfect health, although she looks a little strange with being

clipped both sides to be X-rayed - we had to cover her on those


cold days. She just hasn't looked back and what a fight for life this foal had. John calls her our million dollar baby. He could be close to right!
