2 Corinthians 5:6-10 [11-13] 14-17

⁶ So we are always of good courage. We know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord, ⁷ for we walk by faith, not by sight. ⁸ Yes, we are of good courage, and we would rather be away from the body and at home with the Lord. ⁹ So whether we are at home or away, we make it our aim to please him. ¹⁰ For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each one may receive what is due for what he has done in the body, whether good or evil.

¹¹ Therefore, knowing the fear of the Lord, we persuade others. But what we are is known to God, and I hope it is known also to your conscience. ¹² We are not commending ourselves to you again but giving you cause to boast about us, so that you may be able to answer those who boast about outward appearance and not about what is in the heart. ¹³ For if we are beside ourselves, it is for God; if we are in our right mind, it is for you. ¹⁴ For the love of Christ controls us, because we have concluded this: that one has died for all, therefore all have died; ¹⁵ and he died for all, that those who live might no longer live for themselves but for him who for their sake died and was raised.

Mark 4:26-34

²⁶ And he said, "The kingdom of God is as if a man should scatter seed on the ground. ²⁷ He sleeps and rises night and day, and the seed sprouts and grows; he knows not how. ²⁸ The earth produces by itself, first the blade, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear. ²⁹ But when the grain is ripe, at once he puts in the sickle, because the harvest has come."

³⁰ And he said, "With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable shall we use for it? ³¹ It is like a grain of mustard seed, which, when sown on the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth, ³² yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes larger than all the garden plants and puts out large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade."

³³ With many such parables he spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it. ³⁴ He did not speak to them without a parable, but privately to his own disciples he explained everything.

Message: "I Got This!" – a Matter of Trust

Back in April I had the great privilege to be with Allan Wessels as he ran a once-every-five-years check on the emergency generator just outside of town. It was a test to ensure that the system was capable of handling the demands of the entire town of Strawberry Point plus supply current back into the grid for an assigned prolonged period of time.

Amid the sound of the diesel engines coming up to speed and the smell of fluids and the unique odor of electrical switchboards, I was taken back to my years in the Navy when I was assigned to the ship's turbine generator crew. We were responsible for operating and maintaining the machinery that provided electrical power for the entire ship while at sea. When something catastrophic occurs and contacts start popping, lights start flashing and sparks begin to fly, the frequent reaction of crews trained on this equipment is to reach for the board and start throwing breakers in an effort to stave off a further disaster. This is a mistake! In such a situation, the instructions to the switchboard crew is to put your hands in your pockets and take one step backwards!

The system is designed to fail to a safe condition, and any attempts to jump in and "help" inevitably result in much more damage and danger than if it had been left to function as the engineers had designed and constructed it. It's a matter of trust. The switchboard operator needed to be able to hear the voice of the engineer saying, "Wait for it...I got this!"

Not too long ago I saw the video clip of a young woman with Downs Syndrome, Amy Bockerstette, who is a champion golfer. Alongside Gary Woodland, a PGA pro, Amy had just chipped out of a bunker onto the green at the 16th hole of the prestigious Arizona course. Unsure if she had the skill to complete the hole, Gary asked her if she wanted him to step in and "help" – to putt it out for her. Her response has become legendary: "I got this!", she told him. And proceeded to sink the put! It was a matter of trust.

The scripture we heard from Ezekiel was the conclusion to a grim reminder to the people of Israel of who is in charge. Hidden amid the images of tender sprouts from lofty cedars was the repeated reminder that God has got this! "I myself will take, I will break off, I myself will plant, I will bring low the high tree and make high the low tree; I have spoken, and I will do it!" It was a painful reminder of a particularly devastating time in their history.

Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon, had planted Jerusalem on a good wellwatered soil so that as a noble vine, it could bear fruit without turning to Egypt. Ezekiel's allegory indicated that God had a plan in place involving Babylon and Nebuchadnezzar. But Zedekiah however, saw the Babylonian exile as nothing but a catastrophe and resolved to step in and fix it himself! He rebelled against Babylon and formed what he thought was an alliance with Egypt who promised protection. Egypt reneged and Jerusalem paid the price; he had failed to trust. Ezekiel's message that we heard this morning reinstates God's promise – a messianic prophesy that a noble cedar of God's planting will rise up and every kind of bird – all the nations – will find shelter in its branches: "I got this – wait for it!"

Although the farmer plays an important role in the cultivation of his field after all, he sows the seed—its growth occurs apart from his efforts, even as he sleeps; it sprouts and grows; he knows not how. Even today, many aspects of horticulture remain a mystery. The more one studies nature, the more one marvels at its intricacy, as well as the wisdom and power of its Lord. Even with our significantly more advanced scientific knowledge of agriculture and seed germination, there is still a level of mystery involved. For all our wisdom, we still don't know what really happens, what really allows for a seven-foot-tall corn plant bearing two or more ears with an average of kernels per ear to spring from a single seed! At some point it becomes a matter of trust. Even amid an increasing drought, imagine the catastrophe that would result if a farmer decided to dig up the seeds to "help them along"!

The earth does not actually produce growth "by itself". The plant owes its growth to the power of God, who both creates and sustains the natural order. Growth in the Kingdom is similarly the result of God's Word and Spirit, not the speaker or hearer. God's kingdom grows mysteriously of itself, at its own pace, and through the power of the Word. The Augsburg Confession declares that the Holy Spirit creates faith where and when he pleases in those who hear the gospel. This reality often causes frustration among us who eagerly long for a rapid expansion of the Kingdom, and all the more as we only have a short-term view of things. But God's kingdom grows according to His plan and timetable! We believe that by our own power and understanding that we cannot believe in Christ Jesus our Lord or come to him!

Luther reminds us in the Small Catechism that the First Commandment is that we should fear, love, and trust God above all things. Over and over in

our lives we need to listen to and trust His Word in Christ Jesus as he reminds us, "Wait for it...I got this!"
