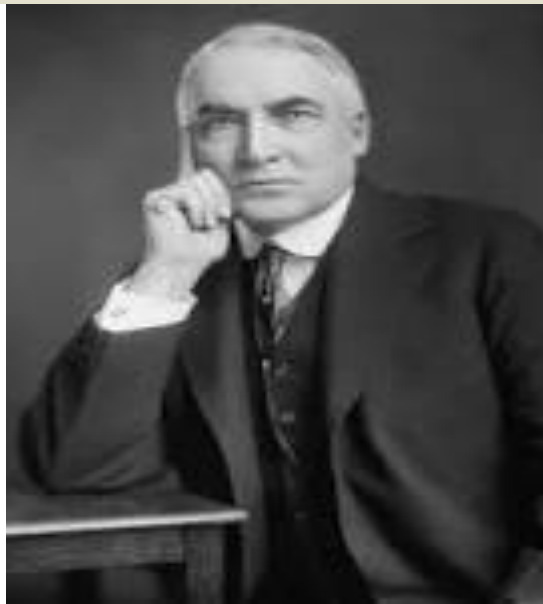





1920s Presidential Corner

1-Knowledge of the scandal is going to cause problems for the President.

2 The men running are people whose careers will be affected or ruined because of the scandal!

3 The scandal was over naval oil reserves (land where oil is & it is reserved for our national defense) . The land was wrongfully rented to private companies in return for bribes!!!

4 The place where the biggest scandal happened was in a place named "Teapot Dome, in the state of Wyoming.

1920s Politics

President W.G. Harding desires "normalcy" after WWI. Tries to protect American businesses with high tariffs on foreign goods. Insists on limited gov't role business and social reform. Helps U.S. economy begin to boom.

Appoints 'trusted' friends to various Executive Branch departments. They're from Ohio and come to be known as the "Ohio Gang" because of corruption and they embarrass the Harding Administration.

1920s Presidential Corner

President Harding Dies in office- August 1923, Harding dies suddenly

Vice President Calvin Coolidge becomes president.

President Coolidge restores faith in government.

Calvin Coolidge also favors minimal gov't interference in business, and business booms!

In 1928, Herbert Hoover, secretary of the U.S., is elected President and promises continued prosperity.

• A. The Impact of the Automobile

1. Cars change life—paved roads, gas stations, motels, shopping centers
 - a) Give mobility to rural families, women, young people
2. Workers live far from jobs, leads to **urban sprawl** (spread of cities)
 - a) Auto industry economic base for some cities, boosts oil industry
 - b) By late 1920s, 1 car for every 5 Americans

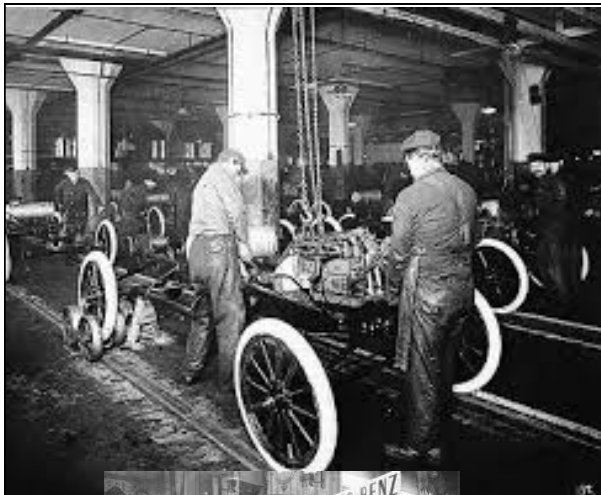

IV Social Issues Create Laws and Lawbreakers

- A. The Prohibition Experiment
 - 1. 18th Amendment launches Prohibition era
 - a) - supported by religious groups, rural South, West
 - b) **Prohibition**— It is illegal to produce, sell, or transport alcohol in the U.S.
 - c) Government does not budget enough money to enforce the law
- B. Speakeasies and Bootleggers
 - 1. **Speakeasies** (hidden saloons, nightclubs) become fashionable
 - a) People distill liquor
 - b) **Bootleggers** smuggle alcohol from surrounding countries

C. Organized Crime

- 1. Prohibition contributes to organized crime in major cities
- 2. Al Capone controls Chicago liquor business by killing competitors
- 3. By mid-1920s, only 19% support Prohibition
- 4. 18th Amendment in force until 1933; repealed (taken back) by 21st Amendment
