CHOOSING CHERRIES, 1940

(from the painting The Cherry Tree, Le Cerisier, by Balthus, 1940)

Antoinette chooses cherries from a tree on a ladder. Balthus paints. The bushes bloom. Waves of soldiers move toward Gay *Paris*.

The landscape here in Champrovent's a sea of sickly green. The meadow gives a gloom. Antoinette chooses cherries from a tree

amidst the shadow. The angle and degree of filtered light reveal the season: June. Waves of soldiers site on Gay *Paris*

to sweep the undesirable...debris... He paints the heavens blue, the hillside hewn, as Antoinette chooses cherries from a tree,

and moves the shadowed mountain—she'd agree to add some light, some color, and some room. Waves of soldiers circle Gay *Paris*;

the darkening twisted branches lean to lee, although the wind has died. The sun sets soon. Antoinette chooses cherries from a tree while waves of soldiers enter Gay *Paris*.

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
