

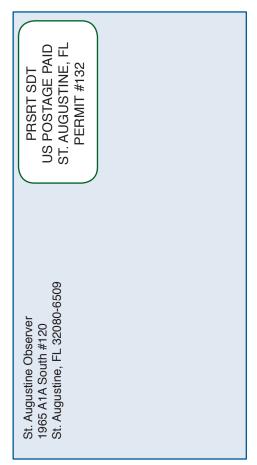


Saint Augustine Film Festival GOES VIRTUAL

The Saint Augustine Film Festival is going virtual in 2021. The 11th annual event will screen 129 films online from January 14-24, 2021. Originally scheduled for January 14-17 in St. Augustine venues, festival organizers have chosen a different option during the covid-19 pandemic, offering online moviewatching for a safe viewing experience. But over the last couple of days, we received final word from the City of St. Augustine and the National Park Service



that, due to Covid, those plans are now dust,' explained Gregory von Hausch President and CEO, Saint Augustine Film Festival.

"Hey, we understand completely we thought if everything was outside, then it could be safe ... but, this plague did not miraculously disappear ... and the next two months could be worse of all. With all of that in mind, especially the safety of our audience and staff, and not wanting to be socially irresponsible, we announce SAFF2021 will be a totally virtual event.'

The Saint Augustine Film Festival has a reputation of showing films you would not find anywhere else in North Florida. The films chosen are created by talented independent filmmakers from around the globe.

The film guide at staugfilmfest.com has descriptions of all the films, including the filmmaker, actors, a film trailor, the run time, and other details.

The cost of a Virtual Pass for all 129 films is \$100. A pass for 10 films is \$75; and a pass for 5 films is \$40. Passes are online at https://

saff2021.eventive.org/passes/buy In addition to the films streaming, an online auction will be held, featuring items such as gift certificates, hotel stays, original artwork, ando ther unique items.

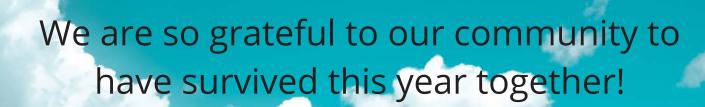

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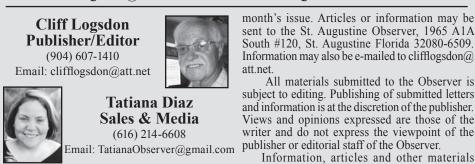

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The Wildflower Meadow

If you walk by the meadow these days, you may wonder about all the red flags. We carefully "planted" them and each marks a special plant we want to protect from the mowers when they come in January. Palmetto and coontie, especially, grow VERY slowly and we don't want them to have to start from the beginning again. You may also wonder why we didn't trim more of the tall Fakahatchee grasses. Doing so opens up the meadow and somehow makes it look cleaner but there's a down-side. Those tall bunching grasses provide protection for critters who live and visit the meadow. They also protect near-by plants from the cold, plants we hope will spread and bloom across the meadow in Spring.

the meadow in Spring. Notice that I didn't say "our" meadow and that's on purpose. The meadow is a space for Nature to be what it is and our goal is to protect it, not control it. We don't want to make it into something it isn't and, believe me, the learning is on-going. We want the meadow to be true to itself and we are its students, not the other way around.

What I call the crowning glory of the meadow this December is the salt myrtle tree. It came and grew in the meadow on its own and is in full bloom. It complements all the tall, native grasses, they in turn complement the salt myrtle tree, and all are gifts of nature for the meadow.

A special thanks to Becky and Russel for removing the broken fence post in the lower meadow. They "planted" a new one in cement so weather and insects won't cause it to decay ... as quickly as the last post.

Early in December we walked in Moses Creek Woods South and thanks to Marlene for her photos.

We meet at the meadow near the Riverview clubhouse at about 8:30 the first Saturday of each month and usually work for a couple of hours. We also try to have a hike once a month. We're an informal group without officers or dues and hope you will join us. You can join us for hikes only, work in the meadow only, or both.

The City of St. Augustine is offering the opportunity to get rid of the old in the new year by recycling certain items during its annual Sustainable St. Augustine Recycling Event from 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. on Wednesday, Jan. 6.

There are two drop-off recycling sites: Francis Field, located at 25 W. Castillo Drive, and 840 West 16th Street on Anastasia Island, behind the St. Johns Parks & Recreation Administration Office



Some of the items the City will accept are used cooking oil, holiday lights and batteries (including car batteries) and a slew of electronic devices - laptops, tablets, digital cameras, printers, and more. For a full list of acceptable items to recycle, visit the City of St. Augustine's website at www.citystaug.com/522/ Recycling-Program.

Free year-round recycling is also accepted at several sites throughout St. Johns County at 501 Riberia St. by the Waste Water Plant and the Solid Waste Department; Red Cox Road behind RB Hunt Elementary School; North City by the Las Palmas condos

on San Marco Blvd.; and the parking lots downtown by trash compactors on Toques Place, Tolomato and Spanish Street.

Your balance system is much like a choir: a combination of vision, proprioception (your sense of where your limbs are in space) and the vestibular system (information from the inner ear). Information from your eyes, your brain, and your vestibular system integrates to keep you upright. This helps you navigate through your environment, gauging how far you are from objects and preventing you from falling. When one part is out of tune, the others can usually compensate

Balance can be affected by a decrease in strength, a more sedentary lifestyle, vestibular impairments, vision changes, decreased sensation or proprioception, and dizziness. A physical therapist can assess the cause and develop a plan to get you back to the things you love to do, safely. Having good balance and motor planning is important in keeping independent and healthy longer.

Often as people age, vision can get weaker, mobility can lessen, both effecting balance, putting people at an increased risk for falling. Out of fear of falling, many people stop doing their preferred activities or favorite past-times, like walking on the beach or playing golf.

Another part of balance is how we receive information from sensors in our joints and muscles. This is called proprioception. This information tells us how high we need to lift out feet in order to clear the floor with each step. Proprioception can be hindered by muscles and joint tightness but can be re-trained with stretching and exercise.

A third component of balance comes from the Vestibular system, which is in the inner ear. Vestibular Dysfunction is

fairly common and may be the reason for poor balance. Very small crystals in the ear tell your brain which way is up regardless of position. Sometimes these crystals become displaced, provide faulty information, and often results in vertigo. Vestibular Dysfunction may also be caused by decreased input from the nerves of the inner ear. In either case, a faulty vestibular system may distort a sense of uprightness resulting in a higher risk for falls. Simple tests performed by your physician or physical therapist can tell you right away if your vestibular system is working properly. Treatment may consist of specific exercises to retrain the inner ear, balance and proprioception training, and treatments designed to relocate displaced crystrals (otocona).

Falls are the leading cause of injury in people over 65 years old. If loss of balance, fear of falling or dizziness is a concern, a vestibular trained therapist can help decrease the symptoms by assessing the crystals in your inner ear and helping reposition them through specific maneuvers/exercises.

Time for New Year's Financial Resolutions

Ideally, such a fund should be kept in liquid, low-risk vehicles and contain at least six months' worth of living expenses.

• Focus on moves you can control. In response to pandemic-related economic pressures, some employers cut their matching contributions to 401(k) plans in 2020. Will some future event cause another



such reduction? No one knows – and even if it happens, there's probably nothing you can do about it. Instead of worrying about things you can't control, focus on those you can. When it comes to your 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored retirement plan, put in as much as you can afford this year, and if your salary goes up, increase your contribution.

• Recognize your ability to build savings. During the pandemic, the personal savings rate shot up, hitting a record of 33% in April, according to the U.S. Bureau of Economy Analysis. It fell over the next several months, but still remained about twice as high as the rate of the past few years. Of course, much of this surge in Americans' proclivity to save money was due to our lack of options for spending it, as the coronavirus caused either complete or partial shutdowns in physical retail establishments, as well as dining and entertainment venues. But if you did manage to boost your own personal savings when your spending was constrained, is it possible to remain a good saver when restrictions are lifted? Probably. And the greater your savings, the greater your financial freedoms – including the freedom to invest and freedom from excessive debt. When we reach a post-pandemic world, see if you can continue saving more than you did in previous years - and use your savings wisely.

These aren't the only financial resolutions you can make – but following them may help you develop habits that could benefit you in 2021 and beyond.
