

True Presence of Jesus- The Eucharist

During the National Eucharistic Revival, we are reminded of what the True Presence of Jesus can do to heal the soul.

"If the angels could envy, they would envy us for Holy Communion." – Pope St. Pius X. With these words we are invited to consider the greatest Gift to ever be given to us on earth – Jesus Christ truly present in the Eucharist.

All the sacraments are truly blessed gifts, but only the Eucharist is given the title of the Most Blessed Sacrament. While each of the sacraments is a true encounter with Jesus Christ, the Eucharist is Itself, Jesus Christ. Here we have no mere symbol or representation of the God Who loves us so dearly but God Himself. St. Thomas Aquinas teaches us that Jesus Christ is truly present in the Eucharist "body, blood, soul and divinity." While our physical senses perceive what we call the "accidental" properties of bread and wine (smell, taste, appearance, etc.), our faith teaches us that the reality lying beneath such appearances has changed. This underlying reality is what we call "substance." Herein lies the heart of the Church's teaching on the Eucharist. The accidental properties of the bread and wine remain, but the substance has changed from mere bread and wine into the Body,

Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Jesus Christ. This is the doctrine of Transubstantiation.

What a tremendous gift Christ bestows on us. There is nothing more that He can give as He gives us nothing less than His very self. Every time we receive Holy Communion, our union with Christ – first received in Baptism – is strengthened and increased. This ties us more firmly together as the Church, the Body of Christ. But it also draws us closer to the entire Trinity. Christ is always in union with the Father and the Spirit. As such, when we are drawn closer to Him in the Eucharist, through Him we are drawn closer to the Father and the Spirit.

We can spend the remainder of our lives studying and meditating upon the topic of the Most Blessed Sacrament and never truly understand just how blessed we are. May we always cherish this greatest of all Gifts.

Assumption BVM, Mary Gate of Heaven, St Paul's, and Sacred Heart of Jesus comprise the four parishes in our district with active CCW councils. Our mission is to serve our parish and community and support each other in our spiritual journey.

Financially we raise money through bazaars, soup, pies, flower, and nut roll sales. These monies are then used to support our community.

Community outreach includes Christmas gifts to VA patients, nursing home residents and Lourdes House. We bring flowers to shut-ins. We supply families who have lost a loved one with a meal. We collect hundreds of pounds of food for the local food bank.

Our international efforts include participation in Boxes of Joy for Haiti and monetary support of a missionary in Syria. Spiritually we support each other by holding an Advent Ladies Candlelight service. In October, a Mass followed by a breakfast in honor of Our Lady of Good Counsel, and a one day retreat in our parish in May. Soup and Stations during Lent provides nourishment for the body as well as a gentle reminder to attend Stations of the Cross. A memorial to the unborn is being planned in one of our parishes.

The future goals of the district are to print a brochure highlighting all the parishes and their activities, and reinstate the thank you dinner for clergy, deacons and religious. My



eligious. My personal goal is to have the remaining churches in our district become active CCW members. We do all of this

with God's guidance and with the aid of Our Lady of Good Counsel.

COMMUNITY CONCERNS

Last year, we began the Spiritual Adoption Program on Mother's Day and celebrated the end of the program on February 4, 2023 with a baby shower at the Diocesan Center in Harrisburg.



We celebrated the 52 babies that were saved! The HDCCW Community Concerns, Family and Legislative Commissions would like to thank those who participated in the program. We would also like to thank those that attended the shower and made donations for the Life Pregnancy Care Center in Millersburg that serves the Mount Carmel/Shamokin area.

Around the Diocese with two Deacons

PART I

Seton District President, Kathy Wingert, sat down for a very enjoyable interview with **Deacon Rick Ramsey of Corpus Christi Parish** in Chambersburg.



Deacon Ramsey is also the Spiritual Moderator for the Seton District. He is a native of Chambersburg and a retired Federal employee. He married his wife Theresa in 1975, they have three children, 11 grandchildren and one greatgranddaughter.

Deacon Ramsey's Faith Journey

Growing up, Deacon Ramsey attended a United Brethren Church. When he started dating his wife, he began to attend Mass with her. They were married in the Church and a year later, in 1976, he became Catholic. Years later, he was reading the Catholic Witness and saw an advertisement for a new Diaconate class. It was not something he had ever thought about but the seed was planted. After discussing it with his wife, they decided to attend the presentation. With the support of his wife, he followed this calling, making the commitment to pursue becoming a Deacon. After attending classes twice a week, for 4 1/2 years, he was ordained a Deacon in May 2010. He was assigned to Corpus Christi, his home parish.

He has been a member of Corpus Christi for 48 years. Deacon Ramsey has been a wonderful asset to the parish and has a genuine gift of kindness and willingness to serve others.

What are a Deacon's duties in the Parish?

Deacons report to the Bishop but are supervised by the Pastor of the Parish. They are Deacons of the Word, the Altar and Charity. Deacon Ramsey can perform wedding ceremonies, funerals and baptisms. He preaches, fulfilling his responsibilities of Deacon of the Word and Altar, and assists the priests at Mass. Deacon Ramsey is the Director of Religious Education at Corpus Christi which includes CCD and RCIA. Among his other duties, he leads the Bereavement Ministry and supports families as they face the loss of a loved one.

He has also been appointed by the Bishop as Director of Pastoral Placement for men in the Diaconate formation program; there are currently 17 men enrolled.

Deacon Ramsey is an excellent listener and is always welcoming when approached by someone in need of his guidance.

What aspect of your parish faith community inspires you?

Deacon Ramsey's foremost inspiration is Holy Mass, and also celebrating the Sacraments and working with children as they grow in practicing their faith.

Do you have a favorite gospel parable?

Matthew 18: 10-14 The parable of the lost sheep. Jerimiah 21:11 – "For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the LORD, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope."

How can we enhance our devotion to Our Blessed Mother?

Through praying the Rosary and reading spiritual readings about her part in Salvation.



Has the Council of Catholic Women been helpful to you?

Deacon Ramsey expressed his admiration and stated that he is inspired by all that the women of our Council are involved in within the parish and community. He is always available to us and has helped our Council in many ways over the years.

The following interview with **Deacon Richard Owen of Sacred Heart**

Parish in Lewisburg was submitted by Northern District President, Marge Schmader.

How long have you been associated with your current parish?

I have spent 23 years at Sacred Heart of Jesus, Lewisburg. We moved here from Maryland when I was promoted to manage a paper converting plant in Williamsport.

When did you become aware of your vocation?

I have always been active in my church and had a calling to do more. After my children were older, my pastor told me that Bishop Kevin Rhoades was starting a Permanent Deacon Formation class, and asked if I would be interested? After much prayer and discussion with my wife, I applied and was accepted into the third Deacon class for the Diocese of Harrisburg. I was humbled to enter into Permanent Deaconate formation with such faithful and holy Catholic men in our Diocese.

Was your faith formation influenced by your family when you were younger?

I come from a large family of eight siblings and was able to attend Catholic Grammar School in Baltimore, MD. I thought of a vocation to the priesthood and in 1958 entered the Minor Seminary for the Franciscan Third Order Regular in Loretto, PA. I spent 7 years in formation. But just before professing simple vows, I decided to leave. My family was very devout in their Catholic faith, and I was blessed to be among them.

What aspect of your parish faith community inspires you?

We have a very active parish which includes Liturgy, CCD program, men's and women's groups, bible studies, RCIA prep, sacramental prep, and rosary groups. I am inspired by the men and women that devote countless hours in making these programs flourish. Knights of Columbus, TMIY, a mature Caring Community group, and our parish office are comprised of faithful and dedicated people who keep the Catholic faith growing and inspiring many to participate.

Do you have a favorite saint? Why does their faith journey inspire you?



Yes, Saint Joseph, protector of the Holy Family. His quiet and obedient example demonstrates to me what I must be for my family and parish community. Being connected to faithful and good people from my

church inspires me to stay close to Jesus.

Do you have a favorite gospel parable? Why does it speak to you?

Yes, the story of Thomas the Apostle in the Upper Room. "Until I put my hand into His side and finger into His hands, I will not believe." We all have doubts from time to time. I must learn to trust God in all things in my journey to eternal glory.
