The Confession of Sin

Almighty, eternal God and Father, we confess and acknowledge unto You that we were conceived in unrighteousness, and are full of sin and transgression in all our life. We do not fully believe Your Word nor follow Your holy commandments. Remember Your goodness, we humbly ask You, and for the sake of Your Name, be gracious unto us, and forgive us our iniquity which, alas, is great.

Beneath the cross of Christ, we come to know that ours is the guilt, but Yours the forgiveness; ours the condemnation, but Yours the gift of justification; ours the bondage, yet Yours the freedom of adoption and new obedience. Even the faith by which we profess our dear Savior's sacrifice was itself won for us by His death.

Therefore, we cry out to You in sorrow for our sins and in thanksgiving for Your gift. Give us the grace, we pray, to receive again this word of the cross, which alone can refresh us on our pilgrim way, and send us out again into the world.





"Book of the Covenant: The Rights of Slaves" | Exodus 21:1-11

I. <u>Introduction</u> A.Why need not Christians be embarrassed by this section?

B.What links are there with the Decalogue?

II. <u>Main Argument</u>

- A. Ordinances for Israel (v. 1)
 - 1. <u>The Book of the Covenant</u>: How are the *rules* given by God different from the Ten Commandments? How are they similar?
 - 2. <u>Rules from God</u>: What is God doing with these rules?
 - a. **<u>Application</u>**: How does this show us God's Law is for everyday?
 - (1) How did Calvin's liturgy in Strasburg reflect the ongoing role of the Law in the Christian life?
 - (2) **<u>Application</u>**: How does remembering what God is like help us to understand His Law better?
 - (3) <u>Application</u>: Who is in the wrong if we find something objectionable in God's Law?
 - b. What is the nature of the authority the Book of the Covenant had for Israel and has for us now?
 - 3. <u>For Israel</u>: How is Israel's Law different from the "Code of Hammurabi" in Babylon?
 - a. How is Israel's Law different from Egyptian law?

b. How does the Book of the Covenant establish "equal justice" under the Law in Israel?

B. Male Slaves (vv. 2-6)

- 1. <u>Reasonable Questions</u>
 - a. Is God wrong to fail to outlaw slavery here?
 - b. Does God condone or bless slavery?
 - c. Does God condone exploitation and/or human trafficking?
 - d. How are the Bible's regulations regarding slavery different from the way slavery was practiced in America or the West Indies?
- 2. Six Years a Slave (vv. 2-4)
 - a. Was God simply making a concession to sinful hearts here?
 - b. How did a Hebrew man become a slave?
 - (1) How does such slavery protect human dignity?
 - (2) What happened to the slave after six years?
 - c. What abiding principles can we draw from this?
 - d. Is it unjust that the slave leaves bondage in the same family condition as he entered into slavery?

(1) How is this different from selling a slave's family down river?

(2) How is this a means of protection for the wife and children?

- 3. <u>Permanent Part of the Household (vv. 5-6)</u>
 - a. Were there any abused slaves in Israel?
 - b. How did a man become a slave for the remainder of his life?
 - c. How does this ear piercing point us forward to Christ's work?

C. Female Slaves (vv. 7-11)

- 1. <u>Daughters as Slaves (vv. 7-9)</u>: why does abuse of the system not make God immoral, unethical, or unrighteous?
 - a. Why would a person's daughter be sold into slavery?
 - **b.** What protections does God establish for the maidservant...
 - (1) ... if she is displeasing?
 - (2) ... if she marries the master's son?
- 2. <u>Dignity of the Women (vv. 10-11)</u>a. Is God condoning polygamy? What does this show us?
 - **b.** What is a wife entitled to even if her husband "upgrades?"
 - c. How does this illustrate the work of Christ for us?
