#### Did you know?

#### September 15 to October 15 is National Hispanic American Heritage Month

We celebrate Hispanic Heritage Month to recognize the achievements and contributions of Hispanic American champions who have inspired others to achieve success. The observation began in 1968 as Hispanic Heritage Week under President Lyndon Johnson and was expanded by President Ronald Reagan in 1988 to cover a 30-day period. It was enacted into law on August 17, 1988.

# Over the Influence Recovery was founded by Gisselle Galloway a Latina, first generation American woman!

Her father was from Costa Rica, Central America and her mother born in the city of Mexico. Both of them traveled to the US and became US Citizens. Gisselle lived in Costa Rica from the age of 14 – 17 and is fluent in Spanish, speaking, reading and writing!

But did you also know....

The sharp increase in overdose deaths involving synthetic opioids in recent years is alarming and data show that the mixing of synthetic opioids with other drugs occur across populations. Synthetic opioids are affecting opioid death rates among **Hispanics**. In 2017, synthetic opioids accounted for nearly 55 percent of the opioid-related overdose deaths and 36 percent of the total drug overdose deaths for **Hispanics**, compared to 41-70 percent, and 25-43 percent of deaths, respectively, for all other race/ethnicities.
