President's Preamble

Around Town

Some time ago we made contact with the Shire concerning three main areas around the town, these being the Youth (Guide) Hall, the traffic/parking issue in the vicinity of Tyabb Primary School and Flinders College and the roundabout at Mornington/Tyabb Road and Jones Road, and lastly, the full fencing around the Central Oval.

With regard to the traffic/parking issue, we understand the Shire is shortly to conduct a site inspection of the area which will hopefully lead to some positive and constructive action to resolve the serious issue. Let's just hope they didn't do their site inspections during the latest lockdown when the school traffic was virtually non-existent!

As mentioned earlier we are awaiting news on the Youth (Guide) Hall and also for the Central Reserve fencing. The neglect of the Youth (Guide) Hall is a real pity as we have been approached by local trades people ready and willing to assist.

On a good news story, the Scout Hall has been re-roofed by the Scouts managing to organise the materials and work, following much fund raising by themselves. Well done!

To date the Shire has not been willing to commit to the restoration of the Youth (Guide) Hall: the original, 130 year old, Tyabb Hall.

With a resurgence of being involved with the Junior Football/Netball Club and understanding the huge rise of children playing junior football and the added number of girls getting involved; this has increased the demand on playing ovals across the Peninsula. We at Tyabb are in a good position with both the Central Reserve and the two ovals at Bunguyan Reserve. However, the problem here is that the 'back' oval at Bunguyan Reserve doesn't have any infrastructure except the fence and is in desperate need for change rooms, toilets and lights. From initial discussions with the Club President, I was astounded to learn that they have been in discussions with the Shire for many years looking for assistance. They have access to a building ready to be relocated to the site, but obviously need Shire approval, along with other works. They like other projects around town also have access to trades people ready to assist.

It would seem that the biggest stumbling block for all these projects is the Shire; both lack of communication with our representatives and tardiness with any decision making.

Help to save 130 years of Tyabb's heritage and honour our pioneering families

Tyabb Youth Hall, latterly the home of the Tyabb Girl Guides is the oldest surviving civic building in Tyabb. In the last half of the 1800s the growth in European settlement in the district created the need for a Community Hall. In 1888 a 'Tyabb Hall Managing Committee' was formed to acquire the necessary land and build a town hall. Many of the names of that first committee will be familiar to us all today if only from the road names; McKirdy, Slocombe, O'Neil, Wilkinson, Thor-

nell, Mair, MacLaurin, Berry, Denham and King.

In an interesting contrast to today, it took only a year for the funds to be raised, the land to be purchased and the hall to be built! The site chosen was the north/east corner of Frankston Flinders Rd and The Crescent. The grand opening of the hall took place on the 17th March 1889 with a ball and "a good deal of speechifying" (Local dignitaries invited to the event included "the Hastings Constable" James Watt, the Great Grandfather of this newsletter's editor).

For nearly 70 years The Hall was the centre of the district's social life. From holding Tyabb's first religious services, to welcoming home veterans of the Great War to regular dances and dinner balls the Hall was the default venue for events large and small in the District.

By the 1950s the population of the district had outgrown the original hall and so again the community banded together to build a new larger one on the same site. The original 1889 Hall was relocated to its present site on land donated by Mr & Mrs Lillywhite and dedicated to the youth of Tyabb. Built in 1957 by local builder Gaza Shaw, the current hall was opened and with the Youth Hall continued to be managed by the local community. In 1974 the Shire Council (in those days Hastings SC) took over responsibility for the management of both halls.

The Youth Hall became home to a number of youth focused activities such as Tyabb's first Netball Club, a Boys Youth Club and in 1962 Tyabb Girl Guides. In 2001 the Hastings District Heritage Places study recommended the preparation of a conservation management plan for the Hall.

Sadly, at some time after the amalgamation of the Shires the Youth Hall appears to have been lost from the Council's asset register and for many years received little or no conservation or remedial maintenance. As a result, the Hall has deteriorated to such an extent that when the Council eventually inspected it in 2020 it had to be closed on safety grounds, and the Girl Guides relocated.

The estimated costs of stabilising Tyabb's oldest heritage building are: Short term remediation/rectification (make safe) of the Hall:

\$447,310

Full redevelopment to bring building Hall up to all relevant standards: \$1,477240

If you are concerned to save Tyabb's oldest Civic Building and to honour the early pioneers who built it, we urge you to write to the Shire and ask them to make at least \$450,000 available for the remediation of the Tyabb Youth Hall.

A huge thank you must go to Peter Davis and his team for pulling together all the logistics for the dawn service; an enormous undertaking with all the regulations needed under the COVID-19 conditions and last minute changes being made. Also, a huge thank you to the people of Tyabb for turning out to support one another and pay their respects.
