

Drones in Integrated Pest Management (IPM) for East and Central Arkansas Vegetable Growers

Agricultural growers are striving to find alternatives to crop management that will allow them to protect their plants without harming the people who will eventually eat them. Chemical pesticides can be toxic for both people and the environment. ALCDC is working with vegetable growers using drones to augment IPM strategics. Drone can help growers identify pests earlier, remediate them faster, and use less pesticides. The ALCDC project includes training for project participants on Biotic stresses (living organisms including fungi, bacteria, insects, and weeds, and viruses) and Abiotic stresses (water, temperature, wind, agrochemicals). The Biotic and Abiotic training is essential for facilitating the drone flight data analysis.

In a typical application, ALCDC staff manually flies a field as illustrated in the adjoining picture and save individual waypoints (GPS position and altitude changes) along the path so that the same path can be replicated in future flights, facilitating comparative analysis. ALCDC will fly instrumentation packages for early detection, whole field surveillance, edge of field coverage, normalized difference vegetative index (NDVI) as well as thermal temperature analysis

Waypoints can also be used to mark exact location of points of interest for precise pesticide application, as well as for Abiotic stress factors remediation High resolution cameras for collecting imagery of pests in the early stages of infestation will allow for precision application of mitigation methods, resulting in minimizing pesticide application and environmental damages in urban farm communities.

A major output of the project will be a Manual/Guidelines for Drones in Pest Management for East Central Arkansas Vegetable Growers.

Washington previously served as the Acting Deputy Chief for Management and Strategy for USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service. Prior to serving as the Acting Deputy Chief, she served as the USDA Director for the National Water Management Center in Little Rock. Washington has over 34 years with USDA as an expert in crops and natural resources science. She has hands on experience serving as a District Conservationist, Acting State Conservationist and National Team Leader for Administrative Transformation for NRCS. She has received many awards throughout her career including the USDA Honors Award for change management within the federal agency. Washington is a United States Army National Guard Veteran with over 10 years of service as an Officer in the Arkansas Army National Guard.

As SED, Washington will be responsible for overseeing the delivery of FSA programs to agricultural producers in Arkansas. These commodity, conservation, credit, and disaster assistance programs ensure a safe, affordable, abundant, and nutritious food, fiber, and fuel supply for consumers.

"The State Executive Director is a pivotal leadership position for the Agency and for the agricultural producers we serve," said Marcus Graham, FSA Deputy Administrator for Field Operations. "These leaders, appointed by the Biden-Harris Administration, bring a wealth of knowledge and expertise to their respective states. We are happy to have them on board and wish them much success."
