Field Trip Report

The field trip to the Bear Clan site and Little Black Mountain was cancelled due to bad weather. The trip will be rescheduled for some time later in the year.

Field Trip Info

The March field trip will be to Fort Pierce Wash and the Red Man site. This field trip will visit 2-3 sites in the Fort Pierce Wash as well as the Red Man site, also in the wash. The total hike will be about 5 miles round trip, with scrambling up talus slopes at least 2 or 3 times. This hike is rated 4 or 5 out five because of the length and the scrambling. 4WD vehicles are required because we will have to through about 3-400 yards of very deep sand to reach Fort Pierce. Time and energy permitting, we also will visit a "drive up" site about 1 mile past Fort Pierce.

The field trip date is March 19th. This will be an all day hike. Bring food for lunch and lots of water as warmer weather should be here.

Remember, you must be a member of DAS to participate in a field trip. You must be at the meeting in order to sign up for a field trip.

Meeting Report

Amber Van Alfen, archaeologist and resource manager at Pipe Springs National Monument, talked about the "Rock Art of Southwest Utah".



Her talk discussed:

- The methods that archeologists use to record, illustrate and photograph rock art sites.
- The theory, methods and issues of dating rock art.
- Preservation techniques and strategies for rock art sites.

Rock art sites are popular places for public visitation. The archeologists or cultural resource managers of public lands are tasked with balancing visitation while providing the necessary protection to preserve these unique and special resources.

I believe the key points from Amber's presentation are:

- The various government agencies wants to keep rock art sites open to the public, but with protections in place.
- The roll of DAS is one of education, explaining the cultural significance of rock art and its importance to both Native Americans but to the population in general.
- DAS members can be help by participating in the various site steward programs sponsored by the various land management organizations in the area.
