After I finished teaching we had a season of worship that brought tears to my eyes. While I rarely understood what they were singing the Spirit of God permeated the room and I sensed Father's pleasure in our worship of Him. God is alive here in India and I believe that he is raising up a generation of people who will advance the Kingdom in amazing ways for God.

He has a great passion to reach the urban people of the state Andhra Pradesh. After reading Jay's master's thesis I realized that we were kindred souls. Our passions and our concerns were the same even thought we lived and ministered half a world away.

Holy Cow!

The expression "sacred cows" comes from India. White cows are considered sacred in this culture. It is not unusual to find these animals wandering through the country side, in towns and even in major cities. We watched this Holy Cow wandering through the marketplace in Rajahmundry a city of over 3.5 million

people. These animals can be found everywhere

wandering around and eating by the side of the road and even in the middle of crops.

One of the major reasons whey India has a hard time feeding itself when it allows these bovines to enjoy dining anywhere and everywhere they desire.
