





Paris Haldeman & His California Gold Rush

Several years ago, current Society members Henry Breneman Haldeman (1923 -), a great grand-son of Professor Samuel Steman Haldeman (1812-1880), and his wife Audrey, kindly donated transcripts of about 275 Haldeman Family letters to the Society. They include letters written and received by the Professor and letters written from California, Texas and numerous European cities (London, Paris, Berlin, etc.).

Four of these letters were written by Paris Haldeman (1831-1893), a younger brother of the Professor. These letters, which set forth Paris's "Gold Rush" plans and experiences, were written to a cousin, his mother (2) and an unnamed brother. They will be presented verbatim in our next three newsletters as follows:

Installment 1 (Found in summer issue)	April 29, 1846 April 23, 1849	Manor (Locust Grove?) St. Joseph, Missouri
Installment 2	Sep 15, 1849	Sacramento City (CA)
Installment 3 (CA)	Oct 28, 1849	Reading's Dry Diggings

The Professor and Paris were two of Henry Haldeman's (1787-1849) eight sons. Henry was married twice. By his first wife Francis Steman (1794-1826) he had seven sons: Samuel, Edwin, Henry, Leander (died young), Horace, Lorenzo (died young) and Cyrus. His second wife Margaret Armstrong (1804-1867) provided him with his son, Paris, and daughter, Helen.

By all accounts, the family members were very close, as is evidenced by the contents of Paris' letters and the many others Henry and Audrey have given us. As we learn from Paris' letters, the Professor liked to use his family members' travels as opportunities to collect insect specimens from far & wide.

Sacramento City Sept.15th.1849

Dear Mother,

It gives me the greatest pleasure to write home and let you all know that we have safely arrived in California in excellent health and spirits. We succeeded in getting our wagon and all our animals through, to the first gold diggings by the 5th. of September. We arrived in the city yesterday and intend taking a load of provisions, and go to mining. The amount made at mining is from one to one hundred dollars pr day, the average amount made by washing is 1 oz pr day or sixteen dollars. The city is composed of some frame and hundreds of canvass buildings, seven thousands persons is the population. It is a great business place, many vessels are unloading and hundreds of wagons are engaged in hauling provisions and merchandise to the different mines which lay in every direction. The city is laid out in lots from the Sacramento river back to Sutters fort which are selling from one to eight thousands dollars, I believe they were owned by Capt. Sutter who resided on Feather River having rented his fort for a hospital. The city is one of the greatest business places I ever saw whole sale stores, auction stores etc. etc. eating houses, bowling and gambling salons, every way to get your money, ten dollars will not buy as much here as one will at home, a pie costs one dollar a water melon from one to five dollars. You can hardly get any thing under one dollar. We think of going to mine on Yuba river and perhaps mine there. We have gotten through in very good season there are many behind that I fear will never get through at least with any of their animals for the last hundred miles our mules and horses had nothing but oak leaves to subsist upon. The mountains are very hard to cross. I never saw such rocks on any road before. We came through a canyon of five miles which took us a day and a half, here we saw some fifty wagons that had been broken to pieces in trying to get them through, in places we had to let our wagons down with ropes we saw several dead mules lying by the road that had their legs and necks broken over the rocks. Before we reached Carson river (this is the Mormons river route) which we follow into the mountains, we had a desert of some forty five miles to cross, no water at all except wells of salt water and the latter part of the road deep sand, here hundreds of wagons have been left, their animals not being able to draw them and having to double their teams to one wagon, I have here seen thirty two oxen to one wagon, with but eight or ten hundred lbs. in it . We drove our wagon within eight miles of the river, where drove our stock to grass and water and returned next day for it. Some of us were nearly dead for want of water hardly being able to speak when we got to it. Hundreds of animals have been left on the desert to die for want of water. Their owners not being able to drive them across.

We have lived on nothing but bread and coffee for the two last weeks of the journey our meat etc. having run out. We were indeed glad to get into the settlements where we could get what we wanted. We paid 50 cents per pound for pork, sugar the same and every thing else in per portion.

I have understood today that Gen. Smith is buying mules etc. to the amount of two hundred thousand dollars, to send out and assist in getting the emigrants across the mountains before it snows there.

The climate here is delightful, the rainy season does not commence



before Christmas. When I suppose it will be very disagreeable in the mines. I can hardly tell how long we will remain in California. I wish to get home very much for I am tired of camp life, and I shall return post haste as soon as I can get a few thousand in gold dust. I would like to send you some of my digging as I suppose you have not seen any. People will hardly carry silver here.

I suppose there are letters at San Francisco for me which I hope I can get for I am very anxious to hear from home, I hope you are all in good health.

I would write more but my time is short and I am so badly situated to write, in the air and the wind blowing so hard that it is with difficulty that I can write at all. Give my love to all. I shall write from the mines at every opportunity. Please write soon and often direct to Sacramento city. Tell Helen I shall write to her soon. Also the folks at Chiques, an they all shall do the same.


I shall try & write often so farewell.
