

2014 Community Service Update –

to get a donation from someone you know who would willing to help the guild have enough baskets for our community service area of the quilt show. If you explain to them what we are doing and that the proceeds go to our chosen local charities, many will offer something to help out! We have baskets donations promised by vendors and some of you guild members. Anyone can donate a basket.

At the June meeting we revisited the charities that were nominated, 2^{nd} Chance, Alabama Children's Home's Friendship House in Oxford and a needs-based scholarship. This was followed by a ballot vote on these three charities. Results were 2^{nd} Chance, 25 votes; Alabama Children's Home, two (2) votes; and the scholarship, zero (0). The guild voted at the May meeting to purchase a refrigerator for the Oxford Adult Senior Center and to vote for a second charity to donate the remainder of the proceeds. Per the results of the voting, the two charities we will contribute to for 2014 are the Senior Center and 2^{nd} Chance.

QUILTER'S TIP

Always cut your bindings the same width and save your fabric left at the end of each quilt. Take these leftovers and join them together until you have enough to bind another quilt. Use on a scrappy quilt to enhance the scrappiness it! **Mystery Quilt**— All 5 parts of the mystery quilt have been given out and hopefully you have completed yours.

If you have yours finished, even if it is just the quilt top, bring it to this month's meeting so that we can see everyone's project. It is going to be so interesting to see what all of the different prints and fabrics look like out of the same pattern!

Also, we hope to see these quilts entered into the quilt show!

This was a short project that was a good pattern for you quilter's no matter what you feel your expertise level is!

UFO Challenge --

Don't forget your UFO projects in the midst of the quilt show stuff. Hopefully this challenge will help you to have some of your projects completed to enter into the show! Member Highlight! **Each month a guild member is highlighted in the newsletter so we can get to know our members better.

Meet Bernice Zaidel! Bernice currently lives in Jacksonville with her husband, Frank, where they have lived for the past five years. They have no children, however sometimes Frank is a child that she hasn't finished molding yet! She has been working on him for 32 years and has many more to go! Bernice presently works for FEMA and could probably be labeled as our government guru since she has worked for local, state and federal government agencies for the past 29 years. She is hoping to retire in six years. (We'll be helping count the time down!) Her most useful information to share from her work expertise is "Always be prepared for any event - think in terms of not just natural disasters; but also those events that may require your own individual survival skills. Lick Skillet Recipe Corner

Tortellini Bacon Broccoli Salad - Serves 10

- 2 9-oz packages refrigerated three-cheese tortellini
- 1 pound bacon
- 4 cups chopped broccoli
- 1 pint grape tomatoes, halved
- 2 green onions, finely chopped
- 1 cup bottled coleslaw dressing

Cook tortellini according to package directions, drain, rinse with cold water and refrigerate until cool, about 30 minutes. Place bacon in skillet and cook over medium-high heat, turning occasionally, until evenly browned, about 10 minutes. Drain bacon slices on paper towel-lined plate. Chop bacon into ½ inch pieces while still warm. Mix tortellini, bacon, broccoli, grape tomatoes and green onions in a salad bowl. Pour dressing on top, tossing to coat. Chill before serving.

Opportunity Quilt Update

Tickets sales for the opportunity quilt are going well. Many of you have gotten you tickets to sell. If you haven't gotten



yours, remember to get them at this month's meeting. We also have the post cards you requested to show when you sell your tickets. Remember, we have only a little over two months until the drawing.

The quilt is presently being display at Pickleweeds Quilt Shop in Douglasville, GA. They asked to display the quilt and get tickets to sell for us. They will be one of our vendors at the quilt show and have really been promoting it. If you are in the Douglasville area, please take a few minutes to visit their store. They are really great people and are working hard for our guild.



Educational Corner – Notions, Just What Do I Need? Quilters have incredible notion choices available. Walk into a quilt store and you will literally see walls full of gadgets just for quilting. If you are just beginning quilt, where exactly do you start? If you have quite a few quilting years on you, you may just learn something here or just be reminded of something you haven't been doing! Anyway, Happy Quilting!

Scissors are absolutely the most important tool you need, but not just any plain scissors that have been around the house and used by family members. You need your own personal scissors that comfortably fit into your hand and are devoted only to cutting fabric, trimming threads, and opening stitching lines. You need different scissors: something small to trim threads; something pointed to get into tight spots for trimming; something large to help you cut through several layers of fabric easily.

Seam rippers wouldn't be needed if every seam we sewed was perfect, but it just doesn't happen that way. If you create an heirloom, then you want to be able to fix mistakes. It means ripping out stitches, and seam rippers come with a sharp edge to cut fabric. Seam rippers get dull with use - don't forget to replace yours.

What about **needles**? We grab a needle from the pincushion and thread it to sew on loose buttons but don't if you are going to quilt either by machine or by hand. Look at Quilting Betweens if you are doing hand quilting: tiny, fine needles that go through fabric easily. Machine needles vary, depending on your needs. Needle sizes are important; the larger the needle size, the larger the eye of the needle; if you are working with specialty threads, a larger needle will keep the thread from breaking as you are sewing.

One of the best things you can do for your quilts is choose the appropriate needle. Basic straight stitching will use an 80 needle. and metallic threads a 90 needle. If topstitching or sewing heavy fabric like denim, look for needles that are specific to the task.

Which **pins** to use? You need to hold fabrics in place while you sew. Find pins that have glass heads to them; they are resistant to heat if you iron over them, and they are easy to see as you are sewing. Buy good pins. Cheap pins will pull threads and cause runs in your fabric.

Finding the right **iron** and **ironing board** matters. You do a significant amount of pressing when you are making a quilt. Pressing keeps seams flat and gives your quilt a professional look. Choose your iron carefully. Automatic shut-off is excellent, because you get involved and forget about whether or not you turned the iron off. Consider the weight of an iron: lightweight and yet durable enough for a lot of use. Don't forget your ironing board. You want a board at a comfortable height so you are not bending over while ironing. Replace your ironing board cover once a year. Covers get burned, get fusing on them, and generally wear out.

Thimbles are a personal decision. If you do a lot of hand sewing and quilting, look into a thimble. They come in simple metal, ornate metal, leather, and other materials. You want one that is comfortable and protects your fingers. Don't resign yourself to the first one you buy if you don't feel it protects your fingers. Try others until you are satisfied.

Everything else....Once you start quilting you will be amazed at just what is available for tools. Good things to have on hand are Fray-Check for making sure edges don't unravel; a needle threader for lower light or aging eyes; marking pencils to mark seam allowances, quilting lines, and cutting lines; and sizing to restore a crisp finish to fabric.

Shopping for notions can be daunting when you first start quilting. Remember that not everything may work perfectly for you the first time. Look for other brands if you are not happy with your first choice.

Don't go "cheap" just to save money. You are making an heirloom, and your efforts deserve the best tools you can provide!

Quilt Show Update — Can you believe we are only a little more than 70 days from our show! A lot of things are happening but there are many more to do! Shawnee will be giving a more detailed update at our meeting this month. As of now, this is where we are --

Carol Bentley, Sue Gardner and Joan Hayden have been storing mercantile and flea market items at the home for the show and the items are taking up a lot of space. A climate controlled storage unit has been rented at U-Haul Rental in Oxford at a rate of \$49.95 a month for three months to store mercantile and flea market items in until the quilt show. We have put some of the items in storage and ask that you bring your finished items to the guild meeting so they can be taken to storage. If possible, please have your items priced when you bring them in.

Merchant donations and/or ads are due now. We are hoping that each member will be able to get at least one ad for our program or a donation to be used in a community service basket or door prize. We would like to be able to give door prizes out hourly throughout the show. We need the information from you so that the program layout can be done. Remember, the cost is =\$100 for a 4"x5-1/2" ad, \$50 for a 3"x4-1/4" ad, and \$25 for a business card size ad, 2"x2-3/4" ad.

The community service area will have baskets, etc. available for customers to purchase tickets for chances to win. Ticket costs will be \$.50 for 1 ticket; \$5.00 for 10 tickets; or \$10.00 for 25 tickets. We will use theatre tickets for this event. Proceeds will go to the Oxford Adult Senior Center and 2nd Chance. A display will be set up to show the guild past community service projects. Mary Simmons and Molly Steenberg will be working on the display and may ask for help in gathering samples of our projects, setting up the area, etc.

An order has already been placed for T-shirts and Becky will be placing another order. Each member should be wearing a guild T-shirt while working the show so that we can all be easily identified. The shirts are \$10, with the guild paying \$5 and the member \$5. If you wish to get a second shirt, the cost to you will be \$10. A sample of each of the sizes available will be at the meeting for you to choose your correct size.

Again, GET THOSE QUILT ENTRY FORMS IN. Forms were given out at the June meeting and are available on line. We need these forms with a 4x6 picture of each quilt as soon as possible to allow John (setup) and Karen (programs) time to do their work and continued planning. Remember, we must have a form for each quilt you enter.

Posters have been ordered for advertising the show and should be in by this month's meeting. Let Anita know is you have ideas on where a poster needs to be placed. These posters are approximately 18x11. Also, if you need postcards to give out or place in any business or facility, see Anita. We are beginning to have inquiries from Birmingham, Sylacauga and other areas but we can never advertise too much.

Again, thanks for all you've done and all you will be doing!!!

<u>The Fabric Whisperer</u> -- Don't try to tell me that fabric is not a living entity. Of course it isn't but it speaks to quilters, and we all know it. Sometimes we speak to it as well. Maybe you don't, but I know that I do. There are moments that fabric seems to have real life, and I can imagine what it is thinking. Indeed, it may even feel like a relationship is formed between me and my fabric. For example:

I am a fresh new bolt of fabric, waiting to be sold and stitched into something glorious. I hope the quilter who picks me buys all ten yards, so we can keep the family together. Just think of all the possibilities.

Look here! See my pretty colors? Notice how my mid-size pattern repeats? Just imagine how I would blend with that lovely stripe across the aisle.

That was the fourth person today who unwrapped a few yards, then smashed me back on the shelf. If I had a voice, I would say OUCH loudly every time that happens!

Finally. This is what the cutting table looks like! I am just so excited. I really like the other prints and that lovely brown solid that are all stacked here with me waiting to be cut. I am going to be made into something wonderful, I can just tell.

Oh dear. Now I know why they call it a cutting table! Someone sliced a yard off of me, and now I am back here on the shelf once again. How will I know what becomes of that yard?

See? It spoke to me, and I simply had to bring a piece of it home. No, I did not have a particular project in mind, but, well, it spoke to me. What more can I say?
