She gave us a demonstration and some very useful info on how to sew hanging sleeves and ways to sew them on our quilts. Brenda also gave us a handout to guide us on making our own sleeves. She sews sleeves on all of her quilts before she finishes the binding and also does this with her labels. She showed a triangular label to use in the corner so you only have one side to hand sew. All of this will be very useful for those of us who haven't sewn a sleeve on a quilt, especially with our quilt show coming up in September. Thanks Brenda for some really good information!

February Program: Getting Your Quilt Ready for the Show

Great news! Our program for this month is going to be presented by quilter and instructor, Joan Knight from Prattville, Alabama. Joan owns Quilt and Things, a longarm quilting business, and is also a certified trainer and tester for Statler Creative Studio. She travels throughout the country giving classes, retreats, workshops and lectures, so we are very honored that she is willing and has the time in her schedule to come to our meeting. Joan will be giving us her lecture, "Win, Place, or Show" (what a quilt judge is looking for in an award winning quilt)!

Joan will be coming to our meeting the night after returning from Richmond, Virginia after giving a three-day class so let's please make every effort to give her a good welcome and show of members! We are inviting quilters from other area guilds and groups who are interested in hearing her lecture to attend at a cost of \$5.00. Although we are not "charging" our members we are going to have a "collection box" for anyone who wants to contribute. We are simply doing this in an effort to cover the cost of the lecture so that we do not have to take it from the quilt guild funds since we will be needing every bit possible for the quilt show! Quilt Care and Preservation -- So many people think that only old quilts are subject to damage, but new quilts are just as susceptible if not looked after correctly. No matter the age of your quilt, proper care increases the life and integrity of a quilt. Taking a few steps to carefully preserve your quilt will maintain its color and fabric, insuring it will last for generations to come.

Special care is required to preserve the appearance and integrity of any fabric. Textiles are sensitive to environmental conditions; such as climate, humidity, display technique, light, cleaning, storage and folding impact quilts over time. For the best results, keep a few things in mind when caring for new quilts or treasured heirlooms:

Climate - Fabrics fare better in a regulated climate, so keeping the temperature as stable as possible is important. The ideal environment ranges between 65 and 70 degrees with 40 to 50 percent humidity to avoid drying out the fabric and mold growth.

Display - Although the best way to display a quilt is spread out over a bed, some projects are intended to be hung as decorations. Quilters should be aware that the manner of display affects a quilt's lifespan. To increase longevity, it should be hung on display for no more than six months at a time. The ideal display distributes the weight of the fabric and batting evenly over the quilt's width. A fabric sleeve stitched to the backing fabric with a dowel threaded and then wall-mounted provides a workable solution with minimal wear. Nails, staples or tacks should never be used, as this creates holes in the fabric.

Light - Natural and artificial light fades the colors of all textiles and is irreversible. To slow the progression of fading, limit the exposure to direct sunlight or lamplight. This does not mean quilts should be kept in total darkness, but rather, they should only be subject to indirect lighting exposure instead.

Cleaning - Cleaning a quilt can prove damaging if done incorrectly, especially on antique quilts. Many quilts that are not used need no more than periodic gentle vacuuming or airing to remove dust and odors. When vacuuming, place piece of nylon, such as pantyhose over the vacuum's nozzle and carefully move it over the quilt being mindful not to stretch the stitching. This minimizes the suction to protect quilt fibers without interfering with dust removal. Airing a quilt is best done on a cloudy day to minimize fading. Shaking or beating the quilt is unnecessary to remove dust and odors.

If staining has occurred and more intense cleaning is required, dry cleaning is rarely a good choice for older quilts. Harsh chemicals can damage these delicate fabrics. Quilts in good condition may withstand a gentle hand washing and air-drying, but spot test for color fastness first. Antique quilts, on the other hand, may require a consultation with a professional conservator for cleaning. Use of an improper technique can lead to dyes that run or tearing of fabric.

Storage - The manner in which a quilt is stored can affect its lifespan. Ideally, quilts do best when stored flat, without stacking. Acid-free containers make a good choice for quilt storage. It is important that quilts not be stored in airtight containers as this can provide an environment conducive to mold growth. Also, acid-free tissue should be used between the folded areas to preserve the fabric. If this is not handy, cotton fabric, such as a sheet or pillowcase may be used instead. The cotton fabric should be periodically washed to reduce the accumulation of dust. To prolong the life of quilt, it should be removed from storage and refolded every now and then. The position and angle of folding should vary to lesson the wear on fibers over time.

2014 UFO Challenge Those who participated in the UFO challenge last year were so inspiring that we are already having a good many forms turned in for those wanting to participate this year! Remember to get yours in so that you can start showing your projects listed and begin entering the drawing for the end of this year! Once again, you aren't required to finish the projects you list; you are just being encouraged! The only requirement is that the project has to be started, meaning, it has to be at a minimum already cut, not just bought! If you didn't get a form, you can at the meeting or off the website in the Member Area.

The question was raised at the January meeting about putting the mystery quilt on the form. The answer is <u>yes</u> you can put the mystery quilt and the bridge challenge on the form if you have started them prior to the March 1st deadline for turning in the forms! Obviously, new members can enter when the join! Remember, we all have "So many quilts, so little time." Sooooo, get to quiltin'!

Mystery Quilt

Our mystery quilt project officially began in January! Part 1 of 5 was passed out at the guild meeting and should be ready finished and awaiting part 2. At the February meeting, someone will present to the group what was done on the first part and you will receive part 2. This will continue until all 5 parts are given out and you quilt completed shortly thereafter. Those of you who received the first steps probably have noticed that it isn't going to be a real challenging quilt. But we guarantee it will be a pattern you will like! Those of you who haven't got a copy of part 1 can get it from our website. Each month, the day of the meeting, you will be able to access the next part of the mystery! Again, if you stay on schedule, it should be ready in time to enter into our show. Also, if you get if started before the 1st of March, you can put it on your UFO list. We hope that everyone will participate!

Lick Skillet Recipe Corner

Easy Baked Manicotti

2 cups spaghetti sauce, divided

1 egg, beaten

1 3/4 cups ricotta cheese

1 1/2 shredded mozzarella cheese

1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese

1/4 cup pesto

12 manicotti shells, cooked and rinsed in cold water

Heat oven to 350. Spread ¾ cup sauce in bottom of 13x9 inch baking dish. Mix egg, cheeses and pesto together. Spoon mixture into plastic bag. Cut small hole in bottom corner of bag and squeeze cheese mixture into both ends of each shell. Place in dish; top with remaining spaghetti sauce. Cover with foil. Bake 40 minutes or until heated through.

QUILTER'S TIPS

A painter knows that to tone down green, you should surround it with red. This works with quilts as well as walls When applique or machineembroidered blocks aren't perfect, try using fabric pens in matching colors to fill spots, cover background fabric that is showing through, or outline a design that doesn't have enough contrast.
