Girls In Action **hosted it first "Readers Are Leaders" Book Club meeting,** Saturday, June 4, 2011 at 4PM. We had a total of 12 girls in attendance and 3 volunteers.



We have three (3) groups in the GIA Readers Are Leaders Book Club. The three groups are tweens (8-9), pre-teens (10-12), and teens (13-16). Each group was assigned to read a different book. The tweens read and discussed "Brand New Ruby Brand New School" while the pre-teens read and discussed "Worst Enemies/Best Friends" and the teens read "Getting Even." The books were all based on the general subject of "Friendship" and "How to be a good friend." The teens informed us that the girls in the book "Getting Even" were in a group similar to Girls in Action called the "Good Girlz." The girls were asked to think about the main character and give reasons "Why or Why Not" they could relate to them. The tweens were asked who made a positive change in their book. And, how can her/his character help them make positive choices in the future. They were also reminded to take notes in their journal about what they would like to share at the next meetings.

The GIAgirls were really excited about discussing the book and lots of stories to share. They were also excited about the next book selections, "Judy Moody and the NOT Bummer Summer" and "Caught Up In the Drama" The tweens and pre-teens are both reading the Judy Moody's books so they can compare and contrast the book with the movie at our next book club meeting.

"Who I Am Without Him?" Grade 7 Up-Written in the vernacular of urban African-American teens, which Flake captures flawlessly, these 10 stories have universal themes and situations. Some are funny and uplifting; others, disturbing and sad. In "So I Ain't No Good Girl," a teen wants to be with a good-looking popular boy, so much so that she tolerates his disrespect and abuse. In "Wanted: A Thug," Melody writes to a columnist for advice on how to steal a friend's boyfriend, unaware that the friend is the columnist's younger sister. Two of the stories are told from a boy's point of view. The concluding story, "A Letter to My Daughter," in which an absent father gives his daughter his advice about boys and men is sad, poignant, and loving. Flake has a way of teaching a lesson without seeming to do so.
